There is also a good general store owned by Frits Bros. George M. Frits, the senior partner of the firm is an old resident of Newberry. He started business on a very small scale less than two years ago. Now he has worked up a considerable business and since starting has found it necessary to enlarge his premises from time to time as his increasing trade demanded. Mr. Fritz holds several offices in the twwnship such as treasurer and justice of the peace. The latter office is a mere nonetity as the dwellers of the burg are law abiding citizens, he has not found it necessary to uphold the majesty of one solitary case.
