BILL WOULD SAVE SMALL LOGGERS THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS

WASHINGTON - A bill introduced by Rep. Bart Stupak, D-Menominee, would require the Internal Revenue Service to apply the same tax guidelines for Michigan loggers that it uses in other states.

"The Michigan Association of Timbermen called our attention to the fact that one provision of the tax code, the collection of taxes on rental payment for chainsaws to the employees of logging companies, is not being applied equitably," Stupak said.

"In fact, Michigan is the only state where the IRS is collecting taxes on rental payments retroactively for the years 1990-92"

The bill, introduced in the house last week and referred to Ways and Means Committee, address problems arising from a 1989 change in the tax code, which affected a method of payment of employees used in logging activities for decades.

Under this payment procedure, logging firms allocated 20 percent of an individual logger's salary as rental for the use of that logger's chain saw.

The IRS, however, has determined that such payments are wages, subject to withholding of payroll taxes, unless a specific "accountable plan" has been put into place to track all chain saw expenses.

The IRS, Stupak said, targeted Michigan for enforcement of this determination, auditing logging companies and demanding back payment of payroll taxes.

When interest and penalties are included with the back taxes, individual small family-owned logging operations in the state face payments ranging from \$10,000 to \$30,000, according to the Michigan Association of Timbermen.

Stupak's bill would set 1993, a benchmark year used in Montana to address the same issue, as the earliest year for which retroactive payments could be collected.

The measure also seeks relief for logging companies that have paid the assessments for 1990, 1991, and 1992

"This bill addresses a matter of critical concern in an industry vital to the economic health of the First Congressional District," Stupak said.







During this last week before Christmas, I had made up my mind that I was going to brave the weather and the crowds and attempt to travel to the big city to do a little final Christmas shopping. My brother Ted, and nephew John were kind enough to volunteer to accompany me and assist me in getting in and out of the car, into the shops and see that I didn't end up with more problems than I started

Since I'm still using a walker to navigate with, and I had wheels put on it to help facilitate a more realistic walking gait, by moving along with a wheeling walker rather than having to lift it up with each step, special caution had to be exercised to spot those clear, icy patches where the walker could accelerate faster than I could.

Because I couldn't manage long. spells of walking, I chose to hit the stores who were thoughtful enough to provide electric carts. I've had enough use of these

wonderful vehicles now, to know which stores had ones that were in good condition and easy to operate. One of the problems is the baskets get filled up so quickly that soon merchandise protrudes through the sides, out the front and sometimes impairs your vision as to what is just ahead. What with the narrow isles, rushing people who are so busy looking for items, they pay no attention as to whether or not they're headed for a collision with another shopper, or heaven forbid, with someone wheeling an electric cart, the challenge to get your shopping done, and get out of there with no serious mishaps, is a great one.

Most of the carts do have a type of brake on them, but it's almost impossible to hit that brake in time to stop instantly. On a lot of the carts you must push an arrow if you want to go forward, or backward. It's a real thrill driving these when you happened to hit the back-up arrow instead of the forward, then accelerate. and away you speed backwards, bumping into shelves or anything in the way. I really was never too good at backing up, even in the car. While my adult children or

other grown ups, may not think it's funny, my grandchildren think it's hilarious. Corners are especially dangerous on the aisles, since there is no "right or wrong" traffic pattern. Shoppers may be on the right, the left, in the middle, nor are they even watching or caring who might be coming along. It's the driver who must respect the pedestrian, even here, and be responsible enough not to go mowing people

The greatest challenge is to maneuver the cart through narrow aisles crowded with merchandise without emptying all the racks. That's when I wish the inventors of these carts were there to drive them. Some of the jams I've got myself into take a lot of maneuvering, back and forth, back and forth, before finally finding an escape. there's someone around I try to pick up all I've knocked off the racks, if not, I just scoot.

Usually my helpers find they have their own shopping to do, though I really think they just don't want anyone to know they're with me, or much less, related to me. Usually it's my own kids who accompany me.



The kids did real well with volleyball and basketball this past weekend. The cheerleaders are doing a great job too.



Tis the season to . get new computer stuff for Christmas? maybe right after Christmas would be better.

There are a lot of computers in town that might like to have more and a change appearance. Microsoft "Windows 95" could be the answer.

"Windows 95" is doing great and offers features such as dial-up networking and Internet access MSN (Microsoft Network) for a little less than some of the other providers. That's AOL (America On Line), CompuServe and Prodigy. Making up the big four.

But always remember your phone bill. No provider is concerned about your cost if you have to dial a long-distance number to get access. Detroit is the closest I've found so far for the MSN.

Explanation: Each provider has specific numbers throughout the world for you to gain access. PUTTING TOGETHER AN EMERGENCY FOOD SUPPLY

Alger County and the rest of the U.P. have been severely hit by winter storms this month. Has your family been prepared for these severe conditions? Here are some tips to get yourself ready for the next storm that is sure to come. Winter isn't over yet!

Winter power outages can be an inconvenience if they last any length of time. First, you have the problems of keeping warm and feeding your family during the outage. And second, it can cost you money if you have to toss out food that spoiled while you were without power.

When preparing for winter storms and power outages, stock your cupboards with food that do not need refrigeration. Canned food is better than bottled food for winter storage because glass jars and bottles can break if they freeze. Canned foods can be kept for up to a year as long as they aren't leaking or bulging.

Keep plenty of canned foods, such as ready to eat meats, fruits and vegetables on hand. Be sure you have a manual can opener on hand. You may have to eat the food cold, or you can heat it up with a candle warmers or chafing dishes in the house. If you're not literally snowed in and can get outside, you can use a charcoal grill, hibachi or camp stove to heat food. If you are heating it in the can, be sure to remove the paper label so it doesn't catch fire.

Other items to keep on hand for winter emergencies include

- * Smoked or dried meats such as beef jerky
- * Canned juices, milk and soup.
- * Instant coffee, tea and hot chocolate.
- * Powdered milk.
- * High energy foods -- peanut butter, jelly, crackers, nuts, trail mix
- * Cookies, candies, sweetened cereals.
- * Vitamins.

Avoid having foods that are high in salt and increase thirst. You may not have running water during the emergency.

It's important to have enough water stored to see you through an Volunteers are needed, and will emergency. Figure one gallon of water per person per day. > Don't forget to keep extra canned and dried pet foods on hand, too. After the crisis, you will need to evaluate the potential safety hazard of foods that were in your refrigerator or freezer.

> In a well - filled freezer, food will probably stay frozen for 15 to 20 hours if you keep the door closed. If the power outage is likely to be longer than that and you're not snowed in, consider moving your food to another location that's not experiencing the power outage. If that's not possible, considering buying some ice to keep the temperature low. If you still have ice crystals in the food after the power comes on, it should be safe t refreeze it immediately.

Foods stored in refrigerators pose a greater food safety risk. If cooked foods such as cooked meat, poultry, pot pies, casseroles, stew and chili stay at a temperature higher than 40 degrees F for more than two or three hours, they should be discarded because the potential for bacterial growth is high. Remember that food does not have to look or smell spoiled for it to pose a food safety problem.
