FORT SMITH, Ark., April 23.-James Warren and Joseph Jackson were executed here to-day for a murder committed in the Indian Territory. They anticipating a respite, United States Marshal Carroll postponed the hour of execution until af-ternoon. At 2 o'clock the prisoners were dressed and the death warrants read. They were then ironed, and after bidding their fellow-prisoners good bye were taken to the scaffold. At 3 o'clock, before taken to the scaffold. At 3 o'clock, before being handcuffed, Jackson attempted to cut his throat wite a bottle that some of the prisoners used as a flower vase, but was prevented by gurrds after he had cut an ugly gash in his neck. 
