WASHINGTON NEWS. WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.--Land Commissioner Groff rendered a decision upon the application of James W. Barry, of the Fargo, S. D., land district, to transmit under section 2 of the act of March 2, 1889, his pre-emption filing for a quarter section of land made October 18, 1888.

SUBJECT TO DON PEDRO'S ORDERS. WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.--Mr. Valente, the Brazilian minister, says the crown jewels as well as those belonging to the emperor and empress and the other members of the imperial household, were placed in the treasury vaults subject to the orders of the emperor.

A ROUGH PASSAGE. The British Steamer Cromma Encounters Terrific Gales on the Way Over!

NEW YORK, Jan. 2.--Captain Lord, of the British steamer Cromma, which arrived to-day from Middleboro, reports: "We experienced the roughest weather I have ever known. Up to December 17th we had a succession of furious gales. The ship was blown off into the trough of the sea, although going at full speed, and became unmanageable. We stopped the engines and used a plentiful supply of oil, which materially aided in breaking the crests of the waves.

"On the 18th it blew a heavy gale and on the 20th the wind again attained the force of a hurricane. During the night we shipped a tremendous sea over the bows. It swept away everything, carrying the wreckage from the main deck over the upper bridge, about twenty-five feet high, and finally making its exit over the stern. This sea washed a fireman from the foremast onto the main bridge, lifting him about twenty feet and landing him among the debris under the starboard boat. When picked up he was insensible. He received dangerous injuries. Thence to this port, we experienced various kinds of weather from moderate to heavy westerly gales."

MILWAUKEE, Jan. 2.--A special to the Evening Wisconsin, from Merrill, Wis., says George Handler, who murdered saloonkeeper David Sarvis, and wounded two policemen, has pleaded guilty to the charge of murder and is anxious to be taken to Waupun. He says he is glad he killed Sarvis, but is sorry for the police officers.

Official Notice of an Execution. WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.--The department of state is informed by the minister of the United States to Mexico of the execution by shooting at Guaymas, on the 9th of December, of J. J. Taylor, who assaulted a train of the Sonora Railway company in May 1888, twelve miles from the Arizona frontier; in which assault two American citizens, Conductor L. Atkinson and Fireman W. Forbes, were killed and the train was robbed.

An Anti-Cigarette Ordinance. FRANKFORT, Ky., Jan. 2.--At a meeting of the council of the city of Frankfort an ordinance was adopted prohibiting the sale of cigarettes within the limits of the corporation. The law went into effect yesterday, and to-day not a cigarette is to be had in the city.

Over a Trivial Matter. ST. LOUIS, Mo., Jan. 2.--There was a fatal stabbing affray at the corner of Tenth and O'Fallon streets early this morning, the result of a quarrel over a trivial matter between Fred Schroeder and Toney Guedde. Both men drew knives and the latter fatally stabbed the former. Schroeder was a contractor and Guedde was one of his employes.
