ALL ARE WAKING UP NOW.

Citizens' Association Directors Follow Good Example of Opera House Men and Secure Headquarters.

LIVELY ANNUAL MEETING OF BUILDING AND LOAN ASSOCIATION.

Most of Old Directors Re-Elected—Facts and Figures That Make a Splendid Showing—General City News.

"Marquette Board of Trade."
The Citizens' Association got down to solid business yesterday and is sharing in the general progress of Marquette. A well-attended directors' meeting was held in the office of the president, Mr. John M. Longyear, and measures taken to open headquarters and proceed with the intended work of the association. The committee on quarters, Messrs. E. B. Palmer, Vannier and Call, made a report advising the lease of the rooms in the front basement of Campbell & Wilkinson's bank. The report was accepted and the president and secretary authorized to make a lease at not to exceed \$325 per year. Secretary Asire's salary was fixed at \$25 per month, with power to raise if necessary. Messrs. Call, Palmer and Vannier were appointed a committee to secure furniture and sign. Messrs. Longyear, White and Clark were appointed a committee to devise an order of business and a list of standing committees.

On motion of Mr. F. O. Clark the headquarters of the Citizens' Association will be called the "Board of Trade." There is considerable of a sentiment among many members of the association that the name should be so amended as to include the words "board of trade," but to do this will require a general meeting.

The directors discussed the work of the association very thoroughly and carefully. The room will be fitted up at once, and Secretary Asire expects to move in about the end of the week. The Citizen's Association has an important work before it and gives every promise of carrying it out faithfully and well. Its work will be to disseminate information regarding the manifold advantages of Marquette as a business, residence and manufacturing point and to look after the interests of the city generally. Among the most important matters it will probably take a part in is that of securing an adequate appropriation for the harbor. There is much to do in the way of advertising Marquette to the outside world, the collection of statistics and information regarding its resources. The directors are energetic and public-spirited business men and will see to it that this absolutely necessary work is well and thoroughly done.

Flourishing Building Association.
For the first time in its history the annual meeting and election of the Marquette Building and Loan association showed some excitement. The contest over directors was a lively but good-natured one and resulted in the election of thoroughly competent men. The association has in its two year of existence made a most creditable showing and amply proved its usefulness. By its means many men have been enabled to build their own homes and are now paying for them with the money that would otherwise go for rent. Especially in the additions in the northern part of the city is the good work of the association seen. Dozens of houses now going up in that quarter are building by the funds collected through it. And the good work never ceases, but goes on endlessly, month by month.

Promptly at 8 o'clock Vice-President James E. Sherman called the association to order in the recorder's office. After reading the report of the auditing committee, an abstract of which will be found below, the election of directors was taken up. It was stated that there were five directors to be elected for two years and two for one year, to fill vacancies, Messrs. Cochran, Peters and Wallace holding over. After some discussion it was decided to elect the directors one by one. Mr. Dan H. Ball was re-elected unanimously, 1422 shares voting. Mr. James E. Sherman was re-elected next, receiving 1195 votes out of 1208 cast. Dr. H. W. Banks was also re-elected, obtaining 1082 votes out of a possible 1142. Mr. M. E. Asire the efficient secretary, was re-elected of course, getting 1219 votes with only thirty-three for other candidates. For the last of the two-year directors Dr. R. C. Markham was elected by 1029 votes, Mr. Peter White getting 213 and Mr. J. A. Vannier, twenty.

For the first one-year director half a dozen candidates were put up, but Mr. Charles Rossiter, foreman of the South Shore machine shops, got 888 votes out of a total of 1232 and was declared elected. The election all along had been lively enough but for the last place an element of hilarity was injected by the respective supporters of Messrs. Geo. W. Hager and J. A. Vannier declaring that this vote should decide which was the handsomer man. The palm of pulchritude was awarded to Mr. Vannier by 683 votes out of a total of 1281. Mr. Hager getting 315, Mr. White ninety-three, Mr. E. B. Palmer, 11, and

Mr. Sampson Rice, 70 votes. On motion of Mr. Hill a vote of thanks was tendered the retiring directors, especially Mr. Hager, for his untiring devotion to the interests of the association. Mr. Hager returned thanks in a few appropriate words and the second annual meeting of the Marquette Building and Loan association was over.

The figures which follow are taken from the report of the auditing committee, as submitted last evening, and well show the splendid work done by the association. The committee also recommended that a new set of books, better adapted to the growing business of the association, be obtained, and called attention to some minor details in which the directors had failed exactly to observe the requirements of the statute.

On April 1st of the current year the association had issued 3,546 shares, in eight series. The actual value at that date of each share in the several series was \$14.72, \$12.70, \$9.49, \$7.06, \$5.31, \$3.61, \$2.03, \$0.50. Total of loans was \$42,200. In April \$2,600 more was lent and about the same amount in May.

This may be called a remarkable showing. A particularly noticeable item is that of "expense," only \$939.89 for two years. The stockholders have paid \$28,803.40 in installments and \$532.92 fees. Against this the association has \$42,200 lent, all secured by first-class bond and mortgage. The actual value of each of the first series of shares is \$14.719. Against this there has been paid on each share \$13.125. Thus the net profit of the first series is \$2.594, or 21.4 per cent per share. The holders of the other series are faring equally well, considering the time they have been in.

Altogether the Marquette Building and Loan Association has been a magnificent success. The MINING JOURNAL feels a pride in it because this paper persistently advocated its organization in the face of doubt and opposition. For men of small or moderate means no means of saving money is so good or investment so safe. By the end of this year the associations thirty-five hundred shares should be increased to ten thousand.

New Commission House.
Mack Bros. have opened their commission business in the Armour warehouse at the corner of Main and Lake streets and report a flourishing trade already. They keep on hand a large supply of flour, hay, feed and salt, and are constantly receiving fresh consignments of butter, eggs and other produce. Their large cold storage rooms and well arranged building give them every facility for their business. They are also agents here for the celebrated Anna River brick, and deal in cement, plaster and wood. They are both active and enterprising young men and deserve all possible success.

Will Make It a New House.
Mr. John H. Jacobs will shortly begin thoroughly to remodel his residence on Front street. The front will be widened, the roof raised, and a second story built on the present rear part. Two large bay windows will be thrown out on the south, the interior partitions removed and the rooms rearranged. In fact a new house will be made out of the old one. Architect Charlton is now working on the plans and the rebuilding will probably be begun inside of two weeks.
