

The word "trade mark" is not, as many people erroneously suppose, confined to a registered trade mark, but includes that sense of the word. Trade mark has been defined by the United States supreme court to be just what Webster's Dictionary defines it, "a distinguishing mark or device used by a manufacturer on his goods or labels, the legal act of congress of March 2, 1881, provided for registering trade marks of aliens, as well as citizens, by causing to be recorded in the pat-ent office a statement specifying name, domicile, location and citizenship of the party applying, the class of merchandise and the particular description of goods comprised in such class to which the particular trade mark has been appropriated; a description of the trade mark itself with fac-similes thereof, and statement of the mode in which the same is applied and affixed to goods, and the length of time during which the trade mark has been used. This application must be accompanied by proof of its veracity and the rights claimed. The certificate when issued remains in force for thirty years, and can be renewed. The government fee is \$25. The manufacture, sale, offering for sale or dealing in any goods substantially of the same descriptive properlent trade mark is punishable by a fine not ceeding two years, or both. The same fine is imposed on those who fraudulently refill trade marked packages.—American Analyst.





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

A change in receiving Chicago and Milwaukee mail, such as is here sug gested, would mean a saving of one day's time to the business men of Houghton and part of Marquette counties, if made. Letters could be answered on the same day, and business communications would arrive before the close of banking hours, instead of coming in at an uncomfortable hour of the afternoon or evening. There is but one way to secure the change in mails here suggested, and that is for the press and business interests of all of the Marquette and Houghton towns to unite in demanding better mail facilities. While in this locality ample opportunity was afforded the members of the expedition to make an exhaustive study of the habits and peculiarities of this most remarkable of all species of the vegetable kingdom. By a series of carefully conducted experiments it was found that this plant would feed on any kind of metal placed at its roots and in a few days take on the characteristics of that metal, and in the case of the softer metals often but a few hours were required to effect a complete metamorphosis of its fiber and color.

Being curious to know how fire would affect a growing plant of this species, preparations were made for the test. Large quantities of seasoned wood were procured and piled in a long row covering about thirty of the metal plants and a fire biseled.


