





DAVITT'S DISCLOSURES,

English Government Doing Its Utmost to Break Their Force-"Red" McDermott's Statement.

BRITISH GUNBOATS ENTER ZAMBESI RIVER AMID REJOICING OF NATIVES.

Another German Spy Arrested in a French Barracks-Gladstone Receives an Ovation at Edinburgh.

ENGLAND.

LONDON, Oct. 20 .- The government is doing its utmost to break the force of Davitt's recent disclosures concerning its part in an aileged conspiracy having for its object the organization of dynamite plots in the United States and to which the British consul at New York was declared to be a party. The notorious "Red" Jim McDermott, who is declared by Davitt to have been one of the agents of the government in the scheme, has made a statement in scheme, has made a statement in which he says that prior to the recent publication he had several interviews with Davitt, in which the latter said that he believed that McDermott had in that he believed that McDermott had in his possession certain documents which would liberate the dynamite prisoners now in Chatham, and that if they were

given up he would publish

of McDermott's death that would rid him of the assassins that have been him of the assassing that have been following him for years, and thus allow him to end his life in peace. Accord-ing to McDermott, Davitt went on to say that these papers would doub'less incriminate Lord Spencer and Sir William Harcourt, but he did not care if they incriminated Mr. Gladstone himself so long as they secured the himself, so long as they secured the liberation of the dynamite prisoners. Davitt, in an interview, denies the bulk of McDermott's statement, but says that the latter, clever as he is, has been outwitted, and that his period of usefulness to the government has come to a close. The idea, he says, that there is any papers in existence compromis-ing either Gladstone, Spencer, or Harcourt, is ridiculous.

TALK OF THE TABLE.

A Chicago Woman's Way of Making Meals and Aiding Digestion.

Apropos of dinner table talk, there is a family not many miles from Chicago whose feminine head has solved the problem of that brightest hour in the whole day to perfection. She has served her apprentice ship in running a household to please two, has altered her plans and increased her resources as one by one other lives have been added to and grown up in the family, until today she caters to the tastes of three grown up sons, a bright eyed lassie of 15 and a widowed sister of her own, besides the one whose ideas for many years she has suc-

ceeded in pleasing. From the time those children were old enough to come to the table she has inisted upon an absolute rule that unless each one had something bright and inter-esting to relate of the day's occurrences she preferred to excuse them from dining with her. Their dinner would be sent up, they might dine later or-as the boys grew older-they might dine out; but she was fond of bright and cheerful society, would especially enjoy having it surround her in her own home, and if they could not offer her something interesting in exchange for her care in providing an excellent dinner she preferred they should dine elsewhere. Moreover, she is best pleased to have them talk of the events of the day, as one of her theories is that each day should bring some

brightness, some pleasant episode, if not experience, seen or heard. No greater contrast could be fancied than the scenes in that house of the breakfast table and the dinner table. This woman who thinks, says people are not sufficiently awake at breakfast to converse. They may talk a little if they like, make plans for the day with each other, but she decidedly pre fers that they all read their newspapers and look over the morning mail. More over, they are seldom all asembled at the early meal, for another of her theories is that because it is either necessary or con-venient for one of the family to breakfast at an early hour, or vice versa, the others should not be forced to do likewise. Their breakfast is the simple one of European nations, combined with the American fruit and oatmeal, and besides a notion or two

of her own. At a certain hour the urn of steaming coffee is placed on the table, with the lit-tle alcohol lamp burning underneath. A chafing dish, with a lamp also burning, is placed at the other end, and kept filled with water which the lamp keeps at boil-ing heat. Beside this stands a silver wire basket containing a dozen or thereabouts of eggs, and nearby is the hour glass. the sideboard is arranged the fruit for the morning. No servant is in attendance this meal, and each arrival walks up to the chafing dish, drops in an egg or two, turns the hour glass and then proceeds to help himself to fruit, or the touch of the bell will bring a servant from the kitchen with a plate of oatmeal and a hot roll or a bit of buttered toast.
