In response to the reference to me of the claim of Harrison County for \$100. advanced to my Solicitor as expressed in the case of Hannah Fuller, issued by your (or your) that under Section 1920, Howell's Statutes the expenses for the confinement and support of an insane person sent by our County to the Asylum, may be charged and collected from another County provided that the proper steps are taken to notify the officials of the latter County that such insane person is claimed as a resident of such latter County and no proof to the contrary is made.

I find that the Treasurer of this County has cautiously since his confinement in the asylum paid to the Treasurer thereof all bills presented for the support of Hannah Fuller, and from Harrison

County, but after considerable inquiry I am unable to find that any statutory notice was ever given whereby said persons would know a proper charge upon this County, although the same might have been given.

The charge made by Harrison County being found very large and apparently for the purpose stated, and not being on its face sufficient explanation a legal charge, I cannot recommend that pending further inquiry as to whether the law has been complied with necessary a charge this County for any of such expenses be referred back to Harrison County for an explanation.

point to the Moore-Benjamin combination as the one directly threatened, but it is understood that if that goes down it will carry with it Burton and his associates. The statement is freely made that the efforts of Moore, Benjamin & Co. to bridge over their financial difficulties have failed completely, in which case disaster is inevitable.

The sale of their interest in the Aurora mine—the best property in their possession—denotes that Moore, Benjamin & Co. are sorely in need of funds, and tends to confirm the rumor that they have "lost their grip" on the immense interests that they secured control of while the boom in Gogebic mining properties was at high tide. They probably sacrificed this property in the hope of being thus enabled to save the others in which they are interested, but if the reports mentioned by the Oshkosh paper's informant are well-founded, they are menaced with utter ruin.

The MINING JOURNAL earnestly hopes that the catastrophe which appears to be hanging over the Gogebic region may be averted, but it has not been free from a fear that just such trouble would result from the reckless operations carried on in mining properties there last year, and previously, by mere adventurers, who used the reputation of a few really valuable mines to float the stock of innumerable mining companies, flooding the market with securities representing entirely worthless properties.

A BUSTED BOOM.

Perhaps the most dilapidated boom in the country to-day is that which was at its highest point of inflation about a year ago, and had for its foundation the possibilities lying dormant in undeveloped iron properties on the Gogebic range. Its condition is told in the following extracts from Yenowine's News, of Milwaukee—which city was extensively worked by the Gogebic boomers, and where thousands are now mourning the blind confidence with which they invested their money in the stocks of "wild-cat" mining companies while the craze was on:

The iron mining situation continues to grow worse, if anything, every day. The dozen or fifteen city iron stock exchanges have closed their doors, one by one, and the managers have gone into other business. The hundreds of local stock-holders in the Burton and Benjamin properties are quietly waiting for the dates when the new syndicates agree to pay them money for their stock. A good many well posted iron men who are not in these deals tell me that they believe the syndicates will tender new stock and not money for the original stock. If such proves to be the case there will be a terrible howl along the whole line.

The original stockholders in the different mines want money—they don't want the new syndicate stock for the old that they have surrendered in trust. Thus far I have not heard of the syndicates raising any very great sums of money, either in the east or abroad, with which to buy up the old stock. I sincerely trust, for the sake of the city, the state at large and the hundreds of poor fellows who have put all of their money into these stocks that the syndicates will raise the funds necessary to carry out their plans and to pay the prices agreed upon to the holders of the original stocks. I haven't heard much about Burton's plans and properties lately. All of the Moore and Benjamin mines, with the exception of the Aurora, have been compelled to shut down for lack of funds to operate them. The firm claims to hold large amounts of gilt-edge notes, given by the purchasers of ore, but they cannot realize another cent on this paper for the present. They have advanced \$300,000 or \$400,000 to keep the mines going, but had to shut down a few days ago, as no more money could be raised to carry on the work. It is said that the new syndicate will take charge and furnish the means to operate the mines within a few weeks, but I don't take much stock in this statement.

In the meantime hundreds of miners have been thrown out of employment, winter is at hand and the outlook on the Gogebic is anything but rosy. Many of the companies which have been digging for ore owe large sums to their employes, and as scores of other alleged mines and explorations have been entirely abandoned during the fall, the army of idlers and unpaid workmen has been growing by degrees until it is now very large. What the outcome of all this trouble will be I can't imagine. The Colby, Norway, Ashland

GENTLEMEN:—In compliance with the act governing my appointment as mining inspector, I herewith submit my second annual report. In the absence of any prescribed form by the law, I have had blanks prepared, one of which is filled for each mine or quarry, the vital statistics, being those carefully kept by me during the year, and which are herewith filed.

My visits to the various mines during the year have been governed by the conditions of the several properties, and have been as frequent as official attention seems to have been demanded.

It affords me great pleasure to report that the several managements have strictly complied with all requirements of the mining law, and in most instances have taken extraordinary precaution for the security of their respective mines—in a number of cases exceeding the real contemplation of the law.

I have attended all inquests held, and from a careful consideration of the evidence adduced, have coincided with verdicts which have, in every instance, exonerated the mining companies from all blame.

In summarizing the accompanying report, it will be found that of the forty-seven iron mines, eight gold mines and two stone quarries, employing 10,047 men, there were but thirty fatal accidents, which shows a gratifying decrease in the fatality as compared with the report of last year, being but about one-half the per cent.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County:

GENTLEMEN:—In submitting my annual report as inspector of mines, it affords me the highest satisfaction to say that there has been a substantial decrease in the number of casualties as compared with the record of any former year. This decrease is marked, and in my opinion may alike be accorded to the increased care of the employes and the improved equipments of mines, and of the methods of management. By way of making the report comprehensive in general and in detail, I have prepared blanks, one of which is used in connection with each mine; showing the date of the accident, name of person, occupation, cause, nationality, and nature of injury. In a compilation of these various reports the result is reached that of the 12,000 men employed in and about the mines of the county there were but forty-five fatal cases, and five permanently disabled, a record that may be pointed to with the greatest confidence, and one

which will compare favorably with that of any of the industries employing alike of skilled and common labor. Having examined every mine of the county this last year carefully, I am especially gratified to be able to state that there has been no failure on the part of any mining company or mine owner in supplying any demand that might in the least contribute to the safety or healthful condition of the respective mines.

Without being able to report cases of neglect or of making suggestions of importance, this report is herewith respectfully submitted

At the July, 1889, meeting of the board the sum of \$2,000.00 was appropriated for the purpose of repairing and improving the road to the Salmon Trout River, and the undersigned was appointed a committee to supervise the work, and would now report that the repairs were confined to that portion of the road lying between the bridge across Dead River, at the powder mills, and the Sauks Head River crossing, beyond which point a fair road existed, and it was not deemed advisable to use any portion of the money appropriated beyond the point named. That bridges were constructed over the streams known as Compeau's Creek, Harlow Mill, Little Garlick and Sauk's Head (or Big Garlick) rivers. To the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Marquette, Mich.: Sir—You are hereby notified that a state tax has been apportioned to the several counties of the state, according to the last returns of the aggregate valuation of taxable property therein made to this office, and as equalized and determined by the state board of equalization, at their session in August, 1891.

The amount of state tax apportioned to your county, under various acts of the Legislature, is as follows, to wit:

STATE OF MICHIGAN. GAME AND FISH WARDEN'S OFFICE, CHARLES S. HAMPTON, WARDEN, PETOSKEY, MICH.

To the Board of Supervisors: GENTLEMEN:—Inasmuch as the enforcement of the fish and game laws depends very largely upon the deputy wardens in the various counties, and I take the liberty of addressing you this letter, requesting that this present session you take action that will secure efficient support from deputies in your county.

When the law was passed in '87 most of the counties voted liberal compensation to deputies, and as a result there was more attention paid to violations than ever before. But in too many cases the deputies were satisfied with drawing the salaries allowed by the boards, without earning them, and quite naturally the supervisors became disgusted, and in many counties cut off all compensation entirely, while in most of the others the compensation was placed so low that it was impossible to find men who would give the office the attention that was necessary to secure proper observance of the law.

Believing that I can rely upon your honorable body to second to any reasonable extent my efforts for the enforcement of the laws of our state, I appeal to you to provide suitable compensation for the deputies in your county. You can, if you desire, by fixing a certain amount per day, or for each complaint, instead of allowing a stated salary, avoid all dangers of paying for work not done, and I submit the enclosed for your consideration.

You are doubtless aware that the term of office of all deputies under Hon Wm. Alden Smith expired with his resignation December 31st. Your county clerk has since been notified of deputies since appointed by me. My deputies are furnished with blanks similar to the enclosed, and I shall be careful to certify only those bills that I am sure are reasonable.
