- XV.-It shall be the duty of the Chair to preserve order, and to call to his aid for that purpose the Sheriff of the County. The Chair shall suppress any disorderly conduct and shall strictly enforce the rules and regulations of the Board.
- XVI.-It shall be the duty of the Auditing Committee to meet at least one day previous to each meeting of the Board to carefully examine and consider all claims against the County, which may have been filed with the Clerk five days previously, in order that their report may be ready for action of the Board upon its assembling.
- XVII.-Cushing's Legislative Manual is hereby adopted for the government of the Board, except as above provided.

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
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
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

The following communication was read and proposed plan accepted by the Board: April 21st,1910.

Mr.Frank G.Jenks, County Clerk, Marquette, Michigan.

Dear Sir :- Replying to your letter of April 11th, I will say that I shall be glad to

appoint a warden in your county with the understanding that he is to act one-half of the

year as county warden and be paid by the County, and the other half of the year as state warden and be paid by the state. I should, of course, perfer to pick out a man myself, as I want to get the best available man in the County for the position, but should be glad to have the Board recommend a man, and I would be glad to follow the recommendation, providing in my judgment and from my investigations he was the proper man for the position. In my judgment the one appointed should be from Marquette, inas much as there is a regular state deputy at Negaunee, and a man at Marquette would be in a position to look after the conmercial fishing without taking very much of his time and he would also be better located to look after the good hunting territory along the Marquette and Southeastern, that is, up in the Big Bay country and west of there. One of the men that was recommended to me when I was there a few months ago impressed me very favorably and I think he has the making of a good warden, and if the arrangement goes through I think I should appoint this man. I think the arrangement spoken of would be a first class one for your county for the reason that you have some three or fourhundred dollars that must be spent in this way or turned into the state treasury. Under this arrangement you would have one deputy that would spend practically all his time in the County and another state deputy who would spend considerable of his time in the county. If the Board takes favorable action at its meeting on April 27, I shall be glad to make the appointment at once so that the man may begin work on May 1st.

The report of the building committee of the Tuberculosis Hospital was read and adopted and ordered filed:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County, Michigan.

Gentlemen: Your committee having in charge the erection of the Tuberculosis Sanatarium at Morgan,would respectfully report that the contract for the main building let to Mr. Wilson at \$14,347.00,has been completed and accepted by your committee,except a small amount of painting to be done on the outside in the spring,which we allowed to stand over until that time.

The contract for steam heating, to the Lake Superior Steam Heating Company for \$1,390 is also completed, as is also the contract let to Mr.E.J.Sink for the plumbing at \$955. We have, after consulting authorities on sewage, installed the Ashley Ceptic sewer system with proper manholes and tanks, at a cost of \$81.50. The installation of same, including

ditches, pipe, manholes and tanks, cost \$1,195.34. Have also sunka well 85 feet deep through clean sand and gravel and put in a five inch galvanized iron pipe in same at cost of \$616.10, and have thirty feet of clear pure water standing in well. Have also installed the Kewaunee pumping system for supplying water to be run with an electric motor. Have installed a small gasoline engine in connection with same to be used in case of emergency. Cost of pumping plant delivered was \$680. Cost of gasoline engine delivered was \$111.60. Installation of same cost \$95.36. After excavating the ground for the pumping plant, forms were put up for a cement wall around it, and then covered for the winter. The cement wall

and roof are to be finished in the spring. We arranged with the Electric Light Board of the City of Marquette to erect a pole line from MrVandenboom's farm to the Sanatarium for light and power purposes for \$1,959.48. This has also been completed and the current turned on. We have shipped to the plant one car of coal and have installed a man temporarily to look after the building and keep it warm until such time as a perma nent nurse and other efficient help is engaged and the building properly equipped with furniture and other paraphernalia ready to open to the public for the purpose it is designed for. Arrangements are being carried out for installing the proper fixtures for lighting by electricity, power for same to be furnished by the Electric Light Commission of the City of Marquette. Since installing the water plant we have tested the well by pumping 6,000 gallons per day continuously for five consecutive days, without any sign of the water diminishing, thus assuring us an abundant supply of pure water, and samples of which have been sent to the laboratory of the State Board of Health, at Lansing, Michigan, for analysis, but have not yet received returns from same. We have also the matter up of installing a plant in the laundry as early as possible and after this is completed and a few other things finished up, according to the resolution passed by the board July 27th last, your committee will consider their work completed ; unless further instructed by the board. Total cost to date is \$21,431.38.



Your committee appointed at the meeting held February 15th, last, to represent the Board of Supervisors of Marquette County at the meeting of the Upper Peninsula Development association, held in Menominee, February 21st, beg leave to report briefly the work undertaken and the organization accomplished, although we presume the members of the Board have already learned through the newspapers of what was done at such meeting.

There was a large and enthusiastic attendance, all of the fifteen upper peninsula counties being represented.

The object of the association is to conduct an advertising campaign and bring to the attention of the country at large the great agricultural possibilities of the upper peninsula and bring in settlers who will develop and make valuable these resources.

To this end it is proposed to raise a fund of \$ 50,000 to be apportioned to the different counties on a basis of population. Land holding companies and corporations to be assessed one cent an acre; the railroads to be asked to contribute on a mileage basis and the various county boards to be requested to give their share.

The plan of organization is that each dounty shall be represented by five directors, making the total number of such Board of directors seventy-five. The directors from each county shall select one of their number as a member of the executive committee of the association which shall have charge of the active management of its affairs.



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



The following report of Special Committee on Morgan Heights Sanitarium was read and adopted.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan. Gentlemen: -

Your Morgan Heights Sanitarium committee respectfully report that up to October 1st, the cost of all buildings, the installing of sewerage system, water supply plant, the building of electric light and telephone lines and roads, improvements on the farm, and installation of furniture, and other paraphernalia, also team, cows and poultry and necessary farm implements now amount to Forty-two thousand one hundred fifty-two dollars and ten cents (\$42,152.10).

The improvements on said institution are now about completed, except what may be necessary in the way of building additional shacks, for the accomodation of more patients, and clearing up more land otherwise beautifying the place.

The said institution was opened May 1st, for the reception of patients, since which time there has been admitted twenty-seven of which nine have been dismissed. In comment on those that have left the institution, of this number one was cured, four received great benefit, and four left of their own accord, after being there for a short time, being able to follow treatment in their own homes.

Deaths resulting from tuberculosis has been two, both were advanced cases when admitted to the institution, cases in the hospital at present are sixteen, one insipient case, eight moderately advanced, and seven far advanced.

We found on starting this institution that we had a large number of advanced cases to take care of, most of which are incurable, but we believe that in the future the cases admitted, will be of a more insipient nature, and more liable to be benefited from the treatment at said institution, and percentage of cures will be very much greater in the future. And your Committee are very much gratified at the excellent results so far attained, and believe with careful management and proper support, the institution should receive at your hands, it will prove a great benefit to Marquette County .





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

It will be noticed that the quarters for ward patients are now overcrowded. Provision should be made for additional quarters as the large majority of the cases admitted are advanced cases, which cannot occupy porch quarters.

There are at present three applications from this county: two of which are advanced cases, for which we have no room at present, the other is an incipient case, and will be admitted as soon as arrangements are made by the doctor. It is of the utmost importance to accomodate the advanced cases for which the capacity, as stated above, is already overcrowded.

During the year there was received from patients and paid over to the County Treasurer \$945.31. There is at present outstanding \$141.00. This is considered collectable, which will make a total of \$1085.31.some of which has been paid by patients who are paying in full and some only in part for their keep.

The present cost for keep of each patient is about \$9.00 per week. This includes meals, medicines, heating, lighting and the running expenses. This cost has been decreased as the number of patients has increased, and would be still further reduced with more patients. It is expected that during the coming year the cost for each patient will be somewhat further reduced, as we expect to raise all of the farm and garden produce necessary to supply the institution.

It is the earnest desire of the committee to have the citizens of the county interested in this institution. We desire particulary to have them visit and inspect the building and grounds so that they can judge as to the attention and care the patients are receiving.



## Ishpeming, Mich, October,8, 1912.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Marquette County.

Gentlemen: At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners held October 8, 1912, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved- By the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette, that it be and is hereby determined that the amount of tax to be raised in the County for the year 1913, and spread on the assessment roll of the townships and cities of the county for the said year be and the same is hereby fixed and determined at the sum of \$47,000.00, to be expended as follows:
