President Cleveland Will Assemble Congress to Pass a New Tariff Bill.

PRECISE DATE HAS NOT YET BEEN DETERMINED.

But the Extra Session Is Certain and It Will Be in September or October

ISSUE IS FAIRLY FACED. WASHINGTON, March 29 .- Mr. Cleve land has decided that he will call an extra session of congress to dispose of the tariff question. No definite time has been set but the session will begin either in September or October. Beyond the decision to call the extra ses sion no details for the consideration of congress have been arranged and the

subject has progressed no further than the determination to have congress meet in one or the other months named. Mr. Cleveland, it is said, was led to call the session by the Republican defeat of 1890, following so close on the enactment of the McKinley tariff law. He believes that a fair test of a new tariff law cannot be had in a few months and therefore has deemed it
