The other legislation, under which work would be handled, if we cannot work under the Aldrich Measure, is at present not fully defined and we cannot, at this time, make definite recommendations as to the season's work, but we consider it highly desirable to build the Negaunee-Balmer Road this season instead of repairing the existing road, as our program calls for, if this is at all possible.

We presume that the new state plan will be very materially modify our method of handling work and particularly as to the prescribed distribution of our funds. We, therefore, request authority from your body to transfer the appropriations as voted in October from the various funds to any other fund, where it may be most advantageous to use it in connection with money to be available from the State, and we will make a more definite report on the matter at your next session, by which time we hope that matters with the State Highway Department will have been brought to a definite head.

Our reason for asking this, at this time, is that we will probably desire to close one or more contracts before your next meeting and this authority will be necessary before such action is possible.

Gentlemen:-

I am addressing you in regard to the salary of the County Commissioner of Schools for the ensuing four years.

The minimum salary of the County Commissioner for Marquette County as fixed by law is \$2,000. This minimum was not paid until the last half of this school year. The salary during the previous three and one-half years of my term was \$1800.00 per year.

It is not necessary for me to argue with you gentlemen in regard to the relative purchasing value of \$1800.00 in 1915 and 1919. The continued high cost of living is one thing that strikes me all more forcibly each day. In the report on salaries for administrative officers for 1919 the committee on salaries of the Michigan State Teachers Association has the following to say: Unless the community is on the decline the salary of the superintendent should be the 1913 salary plus an increase of 45 per cent in order to make the purchasing value of the 1919 salary the same as the 1913.

A comparison of the salaries paid the city superintendents and several of the township superintendents in this county will show you that the commissioner's office is not paid in proportion to the number of teachers directly under his charge.

County Commissioner:

- 76 teachers directly under his charge.
- 64 teachers indirectly under his charge.
- 140 teachers Total.

Salary- \$1900 for 1918-1919.

City of Ishpeming:

84 teachers. Supt. salary \$3,960

City of Marquette:

67 Teachers. Supt. Salary \$2,900.

City of Negaunee:

61 Teachers. Supt. salary \$2,500.

Forsyth Township:

24 Teachers. Supt. salary \$2,400.

Republic Township:

21 Teachers, Supt. Salary \$2,000.

These are the 1918-1919 salaries: substantial increases for next year will be given them.

Iron County is paying at the present time \$2,400. with a present minimum required by law of \$1,500.00. Houghton with a required minimum of \$2,000 has been paying \$2,200 during the past four years.

Gentlemen:-

There is a piece of road on the state trunk highway connecting Negaunee and Escanaba and particularly situated between Gwinn and Little Lake, which has been a township road in the past, and has come into quite a bad condition.

This highway must be properly maintained or it may menace our maintenance agreement with the State.

Forsyth Township had provided in their budget for the reconstruction of this road, but the funds therefor will not be available until March 1920. Further, the road building plant of Forsyth Township is not adequate to handle this deal as speedily as is expedient.

Because of the above conditions, the Forsyth Township Board has passed a resolutions and applied to the County Road Commission to take this road over into the county road system and to build the same, the said resolution setting forth that Forsyth Township will pay to Marquette County 40% of the cost of the construction of this road in March 1920. The other 60% of the cost of such road, as you know, is the State's portion as provided in the Aldrich Act.

In their letter of transmittal, they emphasize the fact, that it is very advisable that this road be built this year, if possible. You will see from the first paragraph hereof, that we also consider this to be the case.

At the Board meeting held on May 10, 1919, this proposition of Forsyth Township was accepted and the road adopted, and proceedings have been taken to receive bids for building this road, the bids to be received until May 31, 1919.

Any action taken towards awarding a contract on such bids or doing work on force account should all bids be rejected, must be subject to your Board approving that money therefor may be borrowed for the use of the County Road Commission to finance this project until the money now raised and to be paid by Forsyth Township in March 1920 and the money to be derived from the State are received. Commenting on this, we desire to point out that the interest on such money would not equal the cost of the necessary temporary repairs to keep this road in condition, reasonably fit for traffic.

We, therefore, respectfully request that you authorize making all transactions necessary to carry this matter through and your concurrence in the actions so far taken.

1. The Township of Marquette must raise and deposit in a special fund for the construction and repair of said Sugarloaf Mountain Road the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) and said amount must be raised either by the Township of Marquette or jointly by the Township of Marquette and the Township of Powell, and subscriptions, but State aids or rewards for or on account of said highway shall not be included therein.

2. Marquette Township must place the said Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) so raised by the Township in a special road fund, in the Treasury of said Township of Marquette to be used exclusively upon said road.

3. Any State aid or reward or other financial assistance received or accruing on account of the improvements made upon this road shall be added to the money raised as above mentioned and used exclusively upon this road.

4. The Township of Marquette must apply for and secure the supervision and control of the Board of County Road Commissioners over all work done with the money raised for the construction and improvement of said Sugarloaf Mountain Road. The Engineer of the Board of County Road Commissioners shall have control and supervision over all work done with said money appropriated by the County, Township or otherwise for the construction and improvement of said road. Any and all contracts entered into for the construction and improvement of said road must be approved by the engineer of said Board, and payments from said fund shall be made only upon certificate of the engineer of said Board. All work done and materials furnished shall be subject to the inspection, estimates and certificate of said engineer and no money shall be paid from said funds or for or on account of said work except upon the warrant or certificate signed by the engineer of said Board.

5. All contracts entered into in connection with said road upon which payments are to be made from the money hereby appropriated or from the fund raised for the construction and improvement of said highway, must be approved by the Committee on County Roads and Bridges of this Board as well as by the Board of County Road Commissioners.

6. All costs and surveys, investigations, maps and expenses necessary to properly lay out and execute the work on said road shall be considered a part of this cost of the road, the same as costs of actual construction thereof.

Said sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) is appropriated by this Board and payment thereof is contingent upon compliance with all of the conditions set forth in this resolution. The Board of County Road Commissioners and the engineer of said Board shall furnish to the County Clerk satisfactory evidence that said conditions have been complied with and thereupon the Chairman of this Board and the County Clerk shall draw orders upon the County Treasurer for said appropriation and said orders may be drawn from time to time and in such amounts as may be necessary.

Sirs: The undersigned received a letter from the State Highway Commissioner dated June 5th, submitting estimates for two routes for a highway through the northern portion of this county, and pursuant to Section 3 of Act 334, Public Acts of 1913, requested the election by the undersigned of one of them, to be determined by him as a trunk line, upon our election as is provided.

The present rate of 90 cents for publishing proceedings in three newspapers in the county was too low at the time it was made, several years ago, and was the result of overzealous bidding. The combined legal rate for the three papers would have been \$2.10 and actually most papers that print this matter get the legal rate.

The last legislature passed a bill providing that the legal folio rate on this class of business should be \$1.20 and this rate is now being charged by most newspapers handling this class of public business. In the interval since the old rate for this county was made, and it was in the beginning hardly a remunerative rate, there has been a constant increase in all costs in printing, particularly during the past few years, and we respectfully request a revision of this rate in accordance with these conditions in the printing business and with due regard to the present legal rate.

It would seem to us fair that the county should allow two legal rates for the printing of these proceedings in three newspapers, i.e., at the rate of \$2.40 for the three insertions. We hope that your honorable board will see the reasonableness of this request.

At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette held in Ishpeming, September 26, 1919, the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

"Resolved by the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette, that the amount of tax to be raised in the County Road Fund in this County for the year nineteen hundred and nineteen, and spread on the assessment rolls of the townships and cities of the County for the said year, be and the same is fixed at and determined at the sum of One Hundred Twenty-three Thousand and Sixty (\$123,060.00) Dollars, being two dollars on each one thousand dollars of assessed valuation according to the assessment rolls of the last preceeding year in such County to be expended for the following purposes, to wit:

On August 22, 1919, our Superintendent, Mr. Sawyer, arrived at an agreement with Mr. Frank F. Rogers, State Highway Commissioner of the State of Michigan as follows: The State will accept applications for building:

First: The Baraga trunk highway in its entirety, building all drainage structures of permanent type, that is, concrete or steel, building a 22 ft. graded earth road from the Baraga County Line to the junction and a 24ft. graded road on the two forks, viz: from the junction to Negaunee and from the junction to Bancroft, and pave these forks with a 16 ft. concrete roadway. A four to five year period to be recommended for construction.

Second. Regrading and building the Little Lake-Lathrop stretch of the Palmer, South Road, including all drainage structures of bituminous carpet coated, waterbound macadam. A three year period for construction to be recommended.

Third. Grading and building the Mud Lake-Princeton Road, waterbound macadam roadway, bituminous carpet coated. Construction in calendar year 1920 to be recommended.

Fourth. Rebuilding all bridges from Palmer to Green Creek in 1920 and putting gravel or macadam top on this stretch, gravel to be recommended north of Suomi and macadam south thereof, and a three year period for completion. Macadam to be carpet coated.

Fifth. Rebuilding or resurfacing the Marquette South Road from the Marquette South Road from the Marquette City limits to Green Garden and building all necessary drainage structures. Concrete and bituminous macadam surface 15 feet in width to be considered. Completion in 1920 to be recommended.

And that the State will proceed to let contracts and build the roads aforesaid, all upon the conditions that pursuant to the terms of Act 19 P.A. 1919, under which such work will be handled, and when required as is by said Act provided, the County will enter into a contract with the State to pay its statutory portion of twenty-two and one-half (22 1/2) per cent of the costs of such work in stallments of not less than one million on the assessed valuation of the County per year and further that the County must signify its intention to raise sufficient additional money in the County road tax to pay its share of forty-five (45) per cent of the maintenance cost in the County each year and to make such additional payments upon the contract from time to time as may be possible to the end that the entire statutory share of the expense for the above work to be borne by the County shall be paid to the State in a period of years substantially equal to the period of years necessary for the entire completion of all work above mentioned.

In conformity to the above, the county road tax is determined to be expended in accordance to the following estimate, to-wit:

Constitution of Marquette County Agricultural Society.

1. This Society shall be known as the Marquette County Agricultural Society.
2. This society shall be controlled by a Board of Directors: said Board of Directors shall be elected as follows: One member from each township and city in the County of Marquette. After the first election directors will be chosen as follows: In the year 1920 and every third year thereafter directors shall be elected from Marquette City, Chocolay, Skandia, Champion, Ishpeming, Powell and Richmond townships for three years. In the year 1921 and every third year afterwards directors from Negaunee City, Marquette, Sands, Michigamme, Tilden, West Branch and Turin Townships for three Years. In the year 1922 and every third year afterwards directors from Ishpeming City, Negaunee, Republic, Ely, Humboldt, Forsyth and Wells townships for three years. Said election of firectors and to fill all vacancies shall be made by the County Board of Supervisors at their regular October meeting. The county agricultural agent by virtue of his position in the county becomes a member of the board of firectors as a member at large for the county. At least one-third of the members of the Board of Directors are to be members of the Board of Supervisors at the time of their election.
3. The annual meeting of the Board of directors shall be held on the last Wednesday of November, at which time the secretary and treasurer shall make their reports on the preceeding fair. At this meeting shall be elected a president, two vice presidents

a member at large of the executive committee, secretary and treasurer of the society for one year or until their successors are elected. The Secretary and treasurer need not be members of the board of directors. Three members shall be chosen to audit the books of the society before the next annual meeting.

4. The president, two vice presidents, three members of the board and one member elected at large, three of whom shall be members of the board from the cities of Marquette, Ishpeming and Negaunee, shall constitute an executive committee.

The executive committee shall make any changes or alterations they may think necessary in the rules and regulations of the society and make all necessary arrangements for holding an annual fair.

The executive committee may employ a manager and fix his salary as well as the salary of all other appointed or elected officers of the society.

The executive committee shall have power to fill all vacancies in the offices of the society.

5. The fiscal year of this society shall close on the thirty-first day of October in each year, and its annual meeting shall be held on the last Wednesday in November in each year. The secretary shall give at least ten days notice of such meeting by publication in one or more newspapers of the county, place thereof to be fixed by him, and give at least ten days notice by mail to each member of the society.

6. The annual dues of this society shall be one dollar, the payment of which shall constitute any resident of the county a member of the society for the then current year. All members shall be given a certificate which entitles them to three single admission tickets and the right to enter articles of all kinds for premiums.

7. The president, or in his absence one of the vice presidents, shall preside at all meetings of the society and of the board of directors.

8. It shall be the duty of the secretary to keep a true record of all the proceedings of the society and the board of directors, also to keep a true record of all the entries for premiums, and to draw all orders on the treasurer for same: also to do business usually pertaining to his office, and to provide sufficient and competent help at times when needed to do the business with dispatch and correctness, and to make his annual report to the annual meeting on or before the last Wednesday in November of each year: also make his annual report to the State Agricultural Society, to the County Board of Supervisors and other reports as provided by law.

9. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to receive and hold all money belonging to the society, and to pay out the same upon orders drawn by the secretary and countersigned by the president, and he shall make his report at the annual meeting. He shall give bonds for the faithful performance of his duties in such penalty and with such security as the executive committee may require.

10. A meeting of the board of directors may be called by the president, the secretary, or by any three directors, whenever they shall deem such meeting desirable.

In connection with the above, the new directors for the Fair not being elected until October, 1920, it was moved, supported and carried that a committee be appointed at the April meeting of this board to arrange and take care of Fair matters this Fall.

Supervisor Vandenoorn spoke in behalf of the State Farm Bureau association, stating that it was their purpose to make a membership drive throughout the county, and asked the Chair to appoint one delegate from each township to meet with the Secretary of the association together with Messrs. Walker and Weston, on or about April, 19th, for the purpose of outlining this Campaign, with expenses to be paid by the county. The motion was duly seconded and carried by the following yeas and nays vote:

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors,
Marquette, Michigan.

Gentlemen:- I am addressing you in regard to the salary of the County Commissioner of Schools.

As you no doubt know, the salaries of men, and women in the teaching profession everywhere have, in the past two years been brought up to a level more equal to salaries of other professions.

The minimum salary of the county commissioner for the county of Marquette was fixed by law some ten or twelve years ago at \$2,000. Since that time the salary has been increased \$200, making the present salary just 10% above this minimum. The cost of living as computed by conservative estimators has gone up over 100%. This statement alone will prove to you gentlemen that I am far behind in meeting living expenses and upkeep of my home.

Five years ago township superintendents of this county having from five to twenty teachers under them were receiving from \$850 to \$2,000. At the present time their salaries run from \$1,900 to \$3,000 per year of ten months. The county commissioner has seventy-six teachers directly under his supervision and receives \$2,200 for a twelve month year.

All of us who have been associated with her as members of the County Board of Community Service have known her most favorably and look upon her not only as an indefatigable worker, but a young woman of trained mind, strong initiative and full grasp of the objects and methods of Community Service work. We feel that she has laid the foundation on a wide scale for work of a very valuable character that can be conducted with increasing efficiency as time goes on. We are glad to commend her to your consideration.

We hope that this experimental work inaugurated last spring will be continued at least during the coming fiscal year and we have to request that an appropriation be included in your budget, an amount that shall show no increase over the estimated monthly expenditures for the fraction of a year now ending, but only be larger by the proportionate amount necessary to continue the work through the entire coming twelve months.

At a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette, held in the City of Marquette, Michigan, September 25th, 1920, the following resolution was unanimously adopted.

"Resolved, by the Board of County Road Commissioners of the County of Marquette, State of Michigan, that it be and is hereby determined, that the amount of tax to be raised in the county road fund in this county for the year nineteen hundred twenty and spread on the assessment rolls of the townships and cities of this county for the said year be, and the same is, fixed at and determined at the sum of one hundred twenty-six thousand four hundred and sixty dollars (\$126,460.00), being two dollars on each one thousand dollars of assessed valuation according to the assessment rolls of the last preceding year in such county, to be expended for the following purposes, to wit;

Whereas, on December 6, 1919, our Board has entered into an undertaking with the State Highway Commissioner of the State of Michigan in accordance with the terms of our determination for the year 1919, wherein the said State Highway Commissioner agrees to build within a period of four years, within this county, the following roads, to wit

First. Job 35-5. The Baraga trunk highway in entirety, including drainage structures, all of either concrete or steel of the so-called permanent type. To grade such road from the Baraga county line to the junction station 1998 with a twenty-two foot wide roadway, so handling the earth work as to make a completed passable roadway with the best available soils and gravel on the top thereof, and to grade the two forks thereof for a twenty-four foot road and to pave these forks with a sixteen foot concrete bed.

Second. Job 35-6. Re-grading and surfacing the Mud Lake-Princeton road.

Third. Job 35-7. Re-grading and surfacing the Palmer-Green Creek road and reconstructing all drainage structures to a permanent type thereon.

Fourth. Job. 15-7. Re-surfacing the Marquette-Green Garden road and reconstructing some of the drainage structures thereon.

And in consideration whereof the county is obligated to pay $22\frac{1}{2}$ per cent of the cost of such work on certain portions of this work, as is provided in Act 19 of the P.A. of 1919 as amended, and is further obligated to pay such percentage, when the same shall have accrued to the State, provided that a sum equal to not less than one dollar on each one thousand dollars of assessed valuation within the county shall be the maximum payment to which the county is directly obligated in any one year, and,

Whereas, said Act provides and said undertaking contemplates the proper maintenance of all county highways and there exists a mutual understanding between the State Highway Commissioner and our Board, that undertakings will be entered into pertaining to such maintenance year to year.

Therefore, in conformity to the above, the county road tax is determined to be expended in accordance to the following estimate, to wit:

Seventy-nine persons have been inmates of the county infirmary at different times during the year, and thirteen hundred ninety-six people have received temporary aid, two hundred thirteen being in the First district, ten hundred four in the Second and one hundred seventy-nine in the Third district.

We regret that we have overdrawn our account this year to the amount of nine thousand three hundred sixty-two dollars and seventy-six cents (\$ 9,362.76) owing to the increase in hospital rates, undertakers' charges and the general high cost of living; also the high wages of all County Farm labor, and feel that in order to take care of this deficit and of the poor for the ensuing year it would not be wise to ask for less than \$85,000.00.

Therefore, your Superintendent of the Poor request that your Honorable Board appropriate the sum of eighty-five thousand dollars (\$85,000.00) as relief for the poor of Marquette county for the ensuing year.

We note the following supplies on hand at the County Farm, estimated, viz; 7 tons hay; 1½ tons cornstalks; 950 bu. potatoes; 40 bu. beets; 30 bu. carrots; 35 bu. parsnips; 300 heads cabbage; 500 heads celery; 10 bu. tomatoes; 25 squash, and 800 cords 16 inch wood.

Report Highway & Bridges Committee

October, 11th, 1920.

That on Saturday, October 9th, your committee met with the Board of County Road Commissioners in the office of the said Board, at which time, the accounts of the said Board, their determinations and reports were reviewed and found in order. Thereafter, the application from Powell Township for assistance in their road work, and the work being done in Marquette Township, was brought under discussion and we beg to report the following;

We find that work is in progress on the jobs for which Marquette Township was given assistance; that a new grade is being built from Buckroe to the Marquette-Powell Township line, most of the corrugated culverts are installed and the beams are upon the ground for the construction of the bridge across the Garlic river; that a turnpike is under construction between the Sugarloaf Mountain and Harlow's creek, that most of the old wooden culverts along the entire line have been replaced with corrugated iron culverts; and that the beams are upon the ground for the rebuilding of the bridge over Harlow's creek.

Further, we desire to point out with respect to the Marquette Township work, that it appears, that all work reasonably to be expected is being received from the funds made up of the assistance given by your Board to Marquette Township, and the funds supplied collaterally thereto by the township.

Further, we desire to suggest, that in our opinion, a grade of road, which can be successfully maintained along the line of this so-called "Sugarloaf Mountain Road" in Marquette Township, and which will be continuous over its whole length, is going to require expenditures of considerably larger sums of money than those heretofore raised and used upon this road, which at the best permitted of but partial improvement of bad stretches on the road.

We further find, that Powell Township has accomplished excellent results in the building of a state reward gravel road and that a very fine road extends from a little south of Antlers to the end of the township road at Five Forks. We find that the township has made preparation by building the grade, and over a portion of this distance, by constructing the lower course of gravel to complete the balance of the road in their township to the Marquette Township line.

We desire to commend the Township of Powell and express our appreciation of their work and our admission that they are deserving of support.

In the matter of giving financial assistance, we beg to recommend that we consider the work within the Township of Powell and that within the Township of Marquette to be inter-related as to its necessity and purpose, and that, to date, we cannot see that the request of Powell Township for assistance will in any way solve the whole problem, even if granted in full. We believe, that a proper solution of the whole problem can be worked out, whereunder the costs will fall where benefit accrues, and to that end, we believe a joint meeting should be held in which this Board should participate by a committee and in which the Township of Powell and the Township of Marquette, the City of Marquette and the County Road Commissioners would be asked to participate and the whole situation met squarely and thrashed out, and either a method of accomplishing the construction of this road in its entirety worked out or else the present methods of temporary relief abandoned and to that end, we respectfully recommend that your committee be granted more time and directed to call such meetings as will develop this situation to some conclusion.
