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

ARE NEGLIGENT OR WORSE SPRINGFIELD, Ill., April 4.-There is considerable excitement among the laboring element of this city over the apparent apathy of the police and county authorities in dealing with Franklyn Ridgely, the son of a millionaire, who shot and probably fatally wounded John Burps, a blacksmith, last Thursday evening for trespassing on his farm. The shooting is alleged to have been almost without provocation, but as yet neither the city nor county officials have taken steps toward making an investigation nor has any attempt been made to place young Ridgely under arrest, notwithstanding the physicians attending Burns state that he is at the The shooting is alleged to have been alattending Burns state that he is at the point of death.

Ridgely is the son of Charles Ridgely, the president of the Springfield steel mills and of the Central Illinois coal combination. The affair was hushed up for several days, but the complaints of Burns' friends have become so loud that it is probable some action will have to be taken to prevent more serious trouble.

The shooting is being discussed by Burns' friends and companions all over the city today, and angry groups of of switchmen and mill hands are denouncing the authorities for shielding a murderer wealth.

According to Ridgely's story, he was at his father's stock farm just outside the city Thursday evening when he heard some men carousing in a field not far from the house. He took a Win-chester rifle and going over where they were ordered them to leave. They responded, he says, by deriding him, but made no move to obey his order. Seeing they did not intend to go, he fired several shots, he says, "just to scare them." with the result that one man was shot through the body and another through the arm.







It consists of fuor coils, two in series, and is so connected with the machine that while the current is of proper strength a bar of metal is magcause the bar drops and the whistle lever is pulled, the size of the whistle being determined by the distance from which the engineer is to be called. In practice the alarm has worked splendidly and has never failed to speak up when anything has occurred which made it necessary to call out the lineman. Mr. Retallic before assuming his present position a few days ago alternated with Mr. Reynolds in the care of the road's electric plant. There was not a night night when the need of a reliable and automatic alarm was not manifest and it was this fact which set both men to work on an invention which promises to be a very valuable one.
