A STAY OF PROCEEDINGS.

Great Activity in Lake Superior & Ishpeming Railway Circles Yesterday But No News.

DEAD RIVER MILL TRYING TO OPEN THE RIVER.

Progress With the New Fire Alarm System—J. W. Spear Resumes Business—A Very Busy Decorator.

WILL BE DECIDED THIS MONTH.

Mr. George W. Hayden was down from Ishpeming yesterday for an important conference with parties here who own or control real estate which will be affected by the construction of the proposed Lake Superior & Ishpeming railway. In an interview with THE MINING JOURNAL Mr. Hayden stated that although it had been expected that the plans of the company would be definitely known by this time it is now probable that there will be nothing ready for the public until very near the close of the month. As Mr. Hayden is expected to go east in a few days it is entirely fair to suppose that another meeting will soon be held in New York at which definite plans regarding the road will be adopted. Mr. Hayden is very confident that before the end of the month all the facts connected with the enterprise will be laid before the public. Hence Marquette must do a little more waiting.

Meanwhile it would appear that every step which is possible prior to the letting of the contract is being attended to carefully by the L. S. & I. engineers and the city is full of railroad builders and contractors almost every day. They come here to gather all the information possible regarding the different portions of the line and when bids are finally called for dozens of them can be expected to be ready in very short order.

Starting Under Difficulties.

Yesterday the officers of the Dead River Mill company gave up the task of waiting for Dame Nature to open the ice-bound river so that they could get logs down from the banks where the trains are unloaded to the mill hoists and tackled the job themselves. It was at first proposed to let dynamite do the whole job but finally saws and ice plows were started and the work of cutting a channel was commenced though explosives may be used to hasten the job today. It is hoped that logs can be got down so that the mill can commence sawing today.

The New Fire Alarm System.

Mr. Knott of the Gamewell Fire Alarm Telegraph company, has completed the work of putting up the three main circuits in the city's new fire alarm system and the work of making the box and house connections will now be tackled. The instruments in the house house are nearly all in place and a neat cell room has been arranged for the battery, which will consist of seventy-five cells. The work of putting in the striking apparatus for the fire bell in the tower is also nearly completed and by the end of the week the entire system should be in working order.

H. Gooding's residence on Hewitt avenue and is putting on plastic with blended ceilings in Myron J. David's residence on the same avenue while he has just completed a thorough overhauling of the decorations in Bishop Vertin's residence. All of his patrons are thoroughly satisfied with Mr. Trethewey's work and as his stock of papers this year is more elegant than ever before while he employs none but the best of workmen in every branch of decoration that he undertakes their satisfaction is not surprising.

Rapid Work at the Fair.

From THE CHICAGO TRIBUNE of Saturday THE MINING JOURNAL takes the following amusing account of the rapid progress being made on the Michigan mining structure in the Mines and Mining building before described in these columns; a cut of the structure as it now appears was also given in THE TRIBUNE:

The occasional visitor is apt to think when strolling about the grounds at Jackson park that no amount of labor will ever accomplish the work which is promised to be completed by May 1. To one who goes to the grounds every day, however, and sees the progress made from day to day no problem presents itself. The rapidity with which work is pushed in the various buildings is something which must be seen every day to be appreciated. In no building on the ground is this more noticeable than in the Mines and Mining building. It is not even surpassed by the work in the Manufactures building where pavilions and buildings have gone up as if the workmen were under the direction of magic. As an illustration of the rapidity of work in the Mines and Mining building take the Michigan building. Monday the stone walls were not a foot high. Thursday three sides of the structure were up. The allegorical figure surmounting the arch will be finished by the time the readers of THE TRIBUNE read the facts herein stated. The corner is of brownstone, quarried in Michigan, and is fifteen feet high. The central figure of the group is six feet. The sculpture was so high that he could not be questioned by the cur-

ious visitors who stood and watched him in his work. So they piled the masons on the walls with interrogatories.

"Is that the coat of arms of the state of Michigan?" asked an old gentleman, pointing to the allegorical figures.

The mason said it was. The old gentleman looked at the sculpture intently for a moment and then said:

"That central figure is an angel."

"Well, what of it?" asked the mason.

"I did not know there were any angels in Michigan," was the reply.

"Where do you live?" asked the mason.

"Milwaukee."

"That accounts for it," said the mason; "a Milwaukee man don't think there ain't no angels anywhere 'cept Milwaukee."

The Milwaukee man turned and looked backward and for a moment seemed startled. The iron obelisk being erected in the German exhibit had grown six feet while he had been talking.
