

How a Comet's Picture Was Caught by a

A shout, in which terror was mingled with surprise, went up from a crowd of Egyptians, gathered on the banks of the Nile, around a camp of European astronomers, when the sun disappeared behind the moon, on the 17th of May, 1882, and among the silvery streamers of the corona gleaming in the semi-darknens of the eclipse appeared a short, bright, sword-shaped comet. exposed to secure the picture of the corona the little comet also stamped its image. In less than two minutes the spectacle vanished, as a flood of sunshine burst from behind the moon.

This was the first time that a comet's picture had ever been caught by phoography in such circumstances; but there was a similar occurrence during the eclipse of April 16, 1893. Prof. Schæberle, of the Lick observatory, who went to Chili to observe that eclipse, afterward detected on his photographic plates an object which looked like a comet entangled, so to speak. among the streamers of the corona.

Quite recently Prof. Schæberle has obtained copies of the photographs of the same eclipse made by the English observers in Brazil and Africa, and has found the suspected object depicted on them also.
