MINING LAWS IN RUSSIA. Landholders Have the Right to Mine or Sell Their Lands. Metallurgical works, in the present sense of the word, were first established in Russia in the reign of Peter the Great, who also founded the first separate official mining administration. An ukaze of Peter the Great, dated December 10, 1719, and entitled "The Mining Privilege," forms the first Russian mining law and the basis for all subsequent governmental measures for the regulation of mines. Entire freedom in the establishment of a mining in-dustry in Russia was proclaimed, with the right to prospect for ores and all kinds of mineral deposits, not only on all governmental property and on that of proprietors, but also on the lands of other proprietors, even without their consent. In case of the appropriation of the property of others for metallurgical works or mines, the owners of the enterprise were obliged to pay owners a thirty-second part of the profits, besides a special indemnification for the lands occupied by the mines and works, and for the forests required to supply fuel for the furnaces. 

### ROMAN STANDARDS.

# Military Ensigns by Which the Troops Wer-Guided.

In the Roman army there was a very highly-developed system of military ensigns, which, just as among modern nations, were regarded not merely as a rallying point for a given body of men, but as an emblem of the state, and were therefore surrounded with a veneration which degenerated into idolatry. From a tactical point of view the Roman standards were of more importance than the flag of the present day, for the movements of the troops were entirely regulated by them

According as they were raised and carried forward, planted in the ground or turned toward the rear, in obe ence to the sounds of the horns of the "cornicines," the army broke up its camp and marched, or retreated halted. In the camp the standards were planted before the general's tent, where their presence sanctified the spot as though it were a temple, and rendered it a safe depository for the booty collected by the legion. It was to the standards the soldiers swore allegiance, and the first step of a pretender who sought to become emperor was to seize the standards as he thereby secured the fidelity of the legion.

On feast days the "dusty, awe-inspiring standards," as Pliny calls them, were anointed with perfumes and decorated with garlands; on days of mourning they were stripped of their ornaments, and if, when the order to march was given, their bearers found it difficult to loosen them from the earth, it was looked upon as a fatal omen.--All the Year Round.



NEW YORK, Oct. 12 -- Charles Hanson, forty years old, who claims to reside in Rothschild & Bending. Chicago, was held under bail at Trenton, N. J., last night, charged with securing money from the local banks under false pretenses. Hanson came to Trenton some Liquor Dealers. weeks ago and opened accounts with the

Mechanics' bank, Trust and Safe Deposit company and Broad Street bank. All the accounts were for small sums. He drew the full amount within two or three weeks' accounts were for small sums. He drew the full amount within two or three weeks' time and then presented another check, re-lying on the teller's memory of his face and signature for payment. Both banks allowed him to overdraw. At the Broad Street bank a certified check was given him instead of allowing him to open an ac-count, and he reappeared soon and asked for a new check, saying the original had been lost. The bank refused to issue a new one unless double security was given, and he was found today in New Brunswick trying to float the certified paper. Hanson has been operating on a similiar plan in other cities, according to his own confes-sion. He had bank books on the Uniov Trust company, No. 715 Chestnut street, Philadelphia, in account with C. Hakanson: Marine National bank of Pittsburg, in ac-count with John Anderssen; and Camden National bank, under the name of Alfred Peckson. 


