

There are a great many receipes for bread-making, but it is easy to remem-ber that one heaping quart of flour, one pint of water, half a cupful of liquid yeast or one quarter of a com-pressed yeast cake will make one medium-sized loaf. A teaspoonful of su-gar and half a one of salt make the bread more palatable, while half milk and half water for the "wetting" makes the bread tenderer and riche

You would first put in the milk, then the water, then the salt and sugar, lastly the flour? Quite right, but when do you use the yeast? That is dissolved start the yeast plants growing. If you put in too much in the mixing or kneading you will give the yeast dwarfs and the busybody carbonic and they will be disheartened, and

your bread will be stocky and hard. The best time to re in, and your dough will be sour. Sometimes a little biearbonate of soda issolved in water and stirred into the lough will put Miss Acetic Acid to light, but oftener the dough is spoiled.

In the morning you will find your ough grown immensely. Stir it down and turn it out on a floured molding-board. Sift flour over it and on your hands, and knead the dough over and over again. Put it back into its dish and it will soon be double its size. Mold it again and put it into grease pans. Let it rise till half its size again, and it is ready for the oven. Battles Won With the Bow, Which Guns Were Slow in Supplanting. The history of the great English vic-

tories on French soil is the history of a successful resistance by well-posted archers to a gallant but blundering charge of feudal cavalry over bad ground. As the harquebus and culverin came in, as French gunners improved in their art, the English supremacy dwindled. At Falkirk (1298) Edward's cavalry cut up the Scotch archers, while his archers destroyed "the dark, impenetrable wood" of Scotch spearmen. At Bannockburn, Bruce's cavalry scattered the English archers, while the pits and were lamed by his cal-throps. But in later fights the Scotch seldom, if ever, executed the necessary maneuver of dispersing The bow was thus the mistress of

war, and the strong, well-trained Enlives of armies at their girdles. But by 1429 light artillery, culverins which could be rapidly wheeled about, came in. A gunner like John, of Lorraine, or Noiroufle, the Cordelier, could aphimself. 
