LOUISVILLE, Dec. 26.—Louisville is experiencing the heaviest snow storm that has visited this section in years. Snow began falling about 9 o'clock this morning and it is estimated at midnight that fully ten inches have fallen and it is still coming down.

HUNTING THE SLY MUSKRAT.

The Fur is Valuable, and There Are Many Ways of Catching Him.

The number of skins of very small and common animals in demand in the fur business nowadays is surprising. The increasing scarcity of handsome fur-bearing animals has compelled a multitude of ingenious imitations from the far of more ordinary creatures.

But the favorite pelt now is that of the muskrat. It has a thick, well-rooted hair, and if killed at any time between September 1 and May, is very durable. Its natural color is grey and glossy, but it also takes all dyes better than any other known skin.

Throughout the farming districts every boy and man does more or less trapping during the fall and winter months. Of course, the big or wealthy farmers do not bother with such business, but their hired hands do.

ABOUT THIS SEASON THE TRAPPING AGENTS in earnest. The muskrats are setting about building their homes for the cold season, what the Ojibway trappers of Ontario call the "winter lodge of the muskquash."

When the rat has been caught it is useless to leave the trap in the same spot for no other will touch the bait. It must be moved and set in some new nook.
