

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

WIND IN GEOLOGY.

Causes Meteorites to Disappear in Bubbles and Dust.

The part played by the air in geology is turning out to be more important than was generally believed. It is not only that it shifts the sands of the desert or the shore, and abrades the rocks with a kind of natural sandblast, and conveys the ashes of volcanoes to great distances, says the Boston Globe.

By the friction of the atmosphere it

fuses meteoric stones, and scatters their dust far and wide. A peculiarity of this meteoric dust is that it contains numerous little hollow pellets and tubes, as well as scales and angular fragments of vitreous matter.

These pellets are discovered in ordinary air by the microscope, on the towers of cathedrals, and on the snows of he Alps, as well as in the Arctic regions. Moreover, they are found in the coze at the bottom of seas and oceans, and also in the sedimentary rocks which have been deposited by ancient

They are formed by the air acting on the melted surface of the metcorie stone, and are, in fact, a kind of air bubble of microscopic size.



When they entered his room he slid out of the bed and tried to get

under it.

Williams is a stranger here and does not know either of the men. He is employed by J. J. Leffler, the butcher, as deliveryman. It is said that Jacobson and Sirister were after Evela, the saloon keeper, who had enraged them that evening by refusing to give them liquor. Williams is not seriously wounded but he will be unable to leave the house for a few days at least. 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
