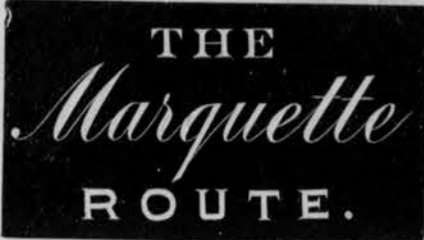

### COPPER COUNTRY NEWS.

**Copper Falls Mine Has Resumed Operations After Idleness of Several Years.**

**SINKING OF NEW TAMARACK SHAFT HAS BEGUN.**

**Mining School Annual Reception Aug. 15—Escanaba vs. Calumet Saturday—Notes.**

#### MINING NEWS.

The mission of Mr. Harry C. Southworth, for several years engineer of the Quincy, on his recent visit to the copper district was the examination of the Copper Falls mine in Keweenaw county with a view to resumption of mining work there. The trend of his report to the management may be inferred from the starting up of work at that property one week from the day Mr. Southworth left for Boston. Twenty men were set at work Monday morning at the Copper Falls. The mine is copper from water so that the customary tedious delay of three months to a year caused by pumping out will not be met with. There will be a couple of weeks' work putting skip roads in repair, laying tracks and doing the work which is always required after several years' suspension of activities about a mining property, but the delay will be much less than is usually the case in starting up an old mine, and the Copper Falls will be producing copper before the end of August. Since the death of Captain J. H. Moyle, which took place last winter in Chicago, Captain Wesley Clarke has been appointed agent and from his intimate personal knowledge of the property is well fitted to manage it successfully if success is possible of achievement at the mine. The present force will be considerably increased in the near future, as soon as the additional men can be employed to advantage. The Copper Falls has a fine stamp mill—probably the best in Keweenaw county—and will enter the list of producers on short notice. The matter of consolidating the Copper Falls and Arnold has been discussed for the past two months, but it cannot be learned that anything definite has been done toward such a joining of forces, though big holders of Arnold stock intimate that it will be done. The Arnold has no stamp mill, but possesses some very rich rock. The extent of this rock is a matter on which mining men are not altogether agreed, the partisans of the Arnold insisting that there is plenty of rich stamp rock to be taken out on short notice, while the general opinion of those who have no prejudice for or against seems to be that the Arnold has a small amount of very rich rock, with fair prospects of finding more, but nothing absolutely certain. With the exception of the score of men employed at the Central since the partial shut-down last fall, nothing in the mining line has been doing in Keweenaw county until the resumption of work at the Copper Falls.

Sod was cut yesterday for No. 5 shaft of the Tamarack. Preliminary work has been under way some time, the brush and surface obstructions having been cleared away from the site, which is quite swampy, and a drainage well having been put down beside the site of the shaft. There is sixteen feet of sand on surface, before the trap rock is reached, and in order to keep the water from annoying the men sinking the shaft until such time as the ledge is reached, the shaft will be sunk through the sand and bottomed in a string rock. The new shaft is located at a point nearly equidistant from No. 2 and from No. 3, but to the northwest of the center of a line intersecting the two shafts named, so that No. 5 will cut the conglomerate and create a depth of more than any shaft yet sunk, the estimated depth of the lens from surface being almost 5,000 feet. Judging from the success in bottoming the four Tamarack shafts which are now in the lode and the Red Jacket shaft of the Calumet & Hecla the actual depth of the vein will vary less than ten feet from the estimated depth. It is a considerable satisfaction to the owners of the three big mines developed on the Calumet & Hecla lode to be able to figure out just where their productive ground runs and to start about tapping the vein at the depth of a mile with the same cheerful confidence that everything will be found as anticipated that is manifested by the employees of the water department when they set about tapping a water main for the benefit of some household.

The Quincy adit for taking off surface water has been completed. The adit was finished in a little over one year and is 2,300 feet in length, showing rapid progress. Its southern end is on the hillside 165 feet above the level of Portage lake, and it starts from the mine on the seventh level at No. 4 shaft.

#### HOUGHTON.

The students have issued invitations for the reception to the graduating class of 1895, the affair to be given at the Armory on Thursday evening, Aug. 15. The legislature was so generous that the board of control did not feel financially able to afford the reception to the graduating class, which has heretofore been a prominent feature of the school year, but the boys of the school set themselves to work and have raised the necessary funds to make a reception all that its predecessors have been in the past, and all that could be expected of the present.

A large number of copper country people will go to Ishpeming this morning, while others will go down to the iron country later in the day. Of those going the majority will remain several days, many proposing to make the most of their outing and return Saturday evening.

Invitations have been issued for a musicale to be given this evening by Mr. Francis Walker of Crystal Palace, London, at the residence of Judge and Mrs. Jay A. Hubbell, East Houghton, beginning at 7:45 sharp. Mr. Walker will be assisted by Mr. A. W. Collins of Fond du Lac and local musical talent.

In addition to the musical portion of the program Mr. Walker will give a lecture on the Derthick Federation of Musical-Literary clubs, an organization which has met with remarkable success in many sections of the country, and now has in the United States over 225 clubs with a membership of 5,000 persons.

**CALUMET.**  
The Escanaba ball club will play with the Calumet team on the home grounds the coming Saturday.

A special meeting of Red Jacket lodge No. 129, A. O. U. W., is called for Thursday evening of this week to arrange for attending the upper peninsula Workers' celebration at L'Anse Aug. 22.

The rather unusual spectacle of a sleigh being drawn through the streets of Red Jacket in August was witnessed on Monday afternoon by people happening to be on Fifth street. Sleighting in June is not uncommon, but sleighting in August is rather unusual.

Province of Tu Kien, China, in State of Rebellion and Mission Burned.

FOREIGNERS THERE GREATLY IN NEED OF PROTECTION.

More Particulars of Ku Cheng Massacre—Great Britain Demands Punishment of Culprits.

ANOTHER OUTBREAK FEARED.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 6.—Dispatches report that the province of Fu Kien is in a state of rebellion and the mission at Fung Fuk, in that province, has been looted and burned.

HONG KONG, Aug. 6.—The survivors of the Ku Cheng massacre declare that the outrage was perpetrated in a most diabolical manner; that it was entirely unprovoked and was evidently pre-arranged.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—The British minister at Peking has been instructed to demand the safety of all British subjects in the disturbed districts and insist on a full inquiry into the massacre and punishment of the culprits.

NATURAL GAS GOING OUT.

Cool Again the Fuel in the Large Pittsburgh Foundries.

The Supply of Gas Has Also Failed in Other States—Since 1888 the Demand for Coal Has Been Increasing.

The first rolling mill that used natural gas exclusively was the Etna iron works, in Allegheny county, a few miles above Pittsburgh, and this establishment has been one of the last to abandon this fuel in the Pittsburgh district. After twenty years of dependence upon natural gas, says the Philadelphia Record, the proprietors of this plant have removed the pipes and are now returning to the use of coal, long after most of the other mills had surrendered to the cheap bituminous fuel which had always been the cheap foundation of Pittsburgh's great industrial prosperity. The diminishing supply and the consequent increase in cost have necessitated the abandonment of natural gas by most of the large manufacturing establishments in the Pittsburgh district, and its use is being more and more restricted to domestic purposes. Pittsburgh has again become the smoky city of fifteen years ago, although in some measure by the use of fuel oil and manufactured gas, which have assumed importance with the decline of natural gas in the last four or five years. Natural gas was not a factor of very great importance in the Pittsburgh district until early in the '80s and the point of greatest consumption was reached in 1888, after which the decline began. It has never been feasible to ascertain with accuracy the quantity of natural gas consumed each year, but Joseph D. Weeks, of Pittsburgh, has prepared for the United States geological survey an estimate of the value of the coal displaced by natural gas, which has been accepted as the most practical measure of the consumption of gas. In the period of its largest use the natural gas consumed in Pennsylvania, measured on this basis, was valued as follows: 1885, \$4,500,000; 1886, \$9,000,000; 1887, \$14,749,500; 1888, \$19,293,375; 1889, \$11,503,950; 1890, \$9,551,025; 1891, \$7,834,016; 1892, \$7,376,251; 1893, \$6,486,000.

In Ohio the supply of natural gas has fallen even more rapidly than in Pennsylvania. The largest consumption in Ohio was in 1889, when it amounted in value to \$5,215,000, but in 1893 it had fallen to \$1,510,000. The suddenness of the failure of the supply has caused much inconvenience and loss to manufacturing establishments, which in many instances were deprived of fuel almost without warning. While the supply of natural gas in Pennsylvania and Ohio has been diminishing a new productive region has come into prominence in Indiana, and interest in natural gas is now centered in that state. In 1886 the value of the gas consumed in Indiana was estimated at only \$900,000; in 1888 it was figured at \$1,330,000, and in 1893 the value was placed at \$7,715,000. The opening of this new field has stimulated the development of iron and steel and glass enterprises in Indiana in a marked degree. Notwithstanding the abundance of the present supply in Indiana there is no assurance of its continuance for a longer period than in other states, and a return to fuels more stable, if less convenient, is merely a question of time. In fact, it is claimed by geologists and gas experts that the point of greatest supply has been reached. While it lasts there is no fuel that possesses so many advantages as natural gas. The uncertainty of its duration is its only disadvantage.

Deaconsfield and Spurgeon Were Both Liberally Endowed.

Among the company, says the New York Post, was a farmer in the neighborhood, a son of the Emerald Isle, and a red-hot radical. **AMERICAN CONSERVATISM.**

The Power and Influence of the Supreme Court of the United States.

The supreme court is not an elective body, and I suppose that might seem to the English radical a sufficient reason for sweeping it away, says the Nineteenth Century. The judges are appointed for life by the president and they are responsible to no popular tribunal—not even to public opinion. They sit as a court of pure law, the final authority from which in all America there is no appeal. Their jurisdiction, strictly defined though it be, is coextensive with the whole union. It is the one instance in history in which popular sovereignty, acknowledged as supreme in the long run for every other purpose and every other authority to which it has delegated power, submits to a master whom it did not appoint and cannot remove and cannot escape. Everybody submits; the states themselves, sovereign as they still are for certain purposes, submit; congress and the president, the army and navy, the people themselves, all submit.

In the hands of the supreme court democracy itself, if it seeks to pass an unconstitutional law, is powerless. A unanimous vote of the people, a unanimous vote of the house and senate and the approval of the president would not make a statute law if this tribunal says it is not a law. But do you ever hear of a proposal to abolish the supreme court? Why not? It is not only that the court has been a great court of great judges, its honesty and ability and wisdom alike recognized, but because the American democracy has the good sense to see that, under a written constitution like that of the United States, such a tribunal is essential to the working of all its parts, and that, check and all-powerful check though it be upon democracy, it is also a guaranty to the American people that, in the words of the preamble of their great charter, justice shall be established and the blessings of liberty preserved to themselves and their posterity.

### SOUTH MARQUETTE'S GAIN

Street Railway Will Make Available Many Fine Residence Sites There.

ROAD MAY BE RUNNING LATE THIS WEEK.

Pythian Dancing Reception at the Hotel Superior Tonight Promises to Be Very Enjoyable.

### MADE MORE ACCESSIBLE.

Owing to a series of difficulties it is hardly likely that the new electric line to the Hotel Superior will be running before the end of this or the first of next week. The electric part of the work is fully up to the farthest point it can go at present but the track layers have not made the progress some thought they would when the construction was begun. The rails were down yesterday to the Hotel Marquette but the curve at Champion street and Blenbauer avenue proved a more difficult job than was anticipated and from that point to Front street the steel was little more than bolted together. The excavation is practically complete to the foot of the Front street hill and the materials are all at hand for the completion of the work. It is understood that some difficulty has been found in getting really skillful tracklayers and that some delay has been caused by the scarcity of that sort of workers.

While the delay is of course provoking to the builders of the road it is not attended with the inconvenience that was anticipated when the effort was started to get the work done by the opening of this week. That effort was largely based on the expectation of some six or seven score guests at the hotel in one party this week. But for reasons already set forth in these columns the number of visitors in this special party came nowhere near what was anticipated. Hence the good bus service to the hotel is able to accommodate its present guests easily and the lack of the electric cars is felt no more than it was at the opening of the season.

With the building of the electric line and the improvement of streets in that quarter residence property in South Marquette ought to begin to look up considerably. Persons with an eye for the picturesque have always considered certain districts in that part of the city among the most desirable for homes. But fashion set the pace the other way and even those who might disregard its foolish dictates hesitated because of the lack of easy communication with the business quarter. All this will be changed now and there should follow quite an improvement in the annual number of buildings erected in that section of the city.

The electric light board or the council ought to put an arc lamp at the corner of Champion and Fisher streets at once. While the lights at Front and Third served well enough before there was a railway track at that point they are not enough now and the corner is dangerously dark for drivers and even for pedestrians.

**Hypnotic Experiments.**  
The Flints drew another good audience to the opera house last evening to witness their amusing and remarkable hypnotic experiments. Some of the best of the tests formerly shown were reproduced and several new ones. Some of the most amusing features were those where two subjects were made to believe themselves fish peddlers and to go through the audience hawking their wares in stentorian tones; where one was made to adjust his dress before an imaginary mirror; where another—who by the way has not been married very long—was made to soothe an imaginary fretful baby; and, funniest of all, where one beardless youth was made to believe himself badly in need of a shave while another subject was convinced that he was a tonsorial artist and was set to work shaving the first with a huge wooden razor after carefully lathering him with a feather duster.

This evening the rock-breaking act will be repeated for the last time in this city. Miss Flint in a hypnotic sleep will be suspended across two chairs and Owen O'Neill will break upon her body the slab of brownstone which now lies at the door of the opera house. The engagement will close Thursday night but those who wish to see the rock-breaking feat must attend this evening, as it is quite a severe strain on Miss Flint and will not be given here again.

**The Pythian Ball.**  
The Knights of Pythias of Marquette issued yesterday cards of invitation for the dancing reception which they will give in honor of their visiting brethren from Chicago at the Hotel Superior this evening. The members of the order regret the unavoidable shortness of the notice to their friends in this city but trust that all who can will attend. Guests are requested to present invitations at the door where tickets may be procured in exchange. Tickets will be one dollar per couple, including supper. It is not yet certain whether the ball will be in the new pavilion or in the dining room, the choice depending something upon the state of the weather today, but in either event the occasion is certain to be a large one.

Carriages and busses will run from the terminus of the street railway to the hotel and the fare in the former will be 25 cents and in the latter 10 cents each way. They will be out in sufficient numbers to transport the guests comfortably to the ball and to take them home again. Members of the Uniformed Rank will appear in full uniform at the ball.
