Candidate Bryan Given a Series of Demonstrations at Indianapolis.

HIS ADDRESSES.

Has Received During His Entire Trip.

ENTHUSIASTICALLY WELCOMED. INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 6 .- The reception accorded Mr. Bryan on his arrival at Major McKinley then took up the Indianapolis today was nearly as great as any he has received during his entire trip. He made five speeches here, two in the afternoon and three tonight,

the Indianapolis Republican Silver club and the Gray club acted as escorts.

PACKED WITH HUMANITY.

After dinner Mr. Bryan addressed the largest crowd of the day at the state house. Every inch of available standing and climbing room was taken. The park in front of the state house was packed with humanity. Probably less than one fourth of the audience heard his speech, but those who were able to get within sound of his voice were enthusiastic to a degree. It would be an impossibility to estimate the crowd so great was it. Mr. Bryan began talking at 3:15 o'clock and made half an hour's

After the nominee had concluded his remarks at the state house he was taken to Tomlinson Hall, where he spoke to as many people as could be rotten into it, and in front of the balcony where he stood. At this meeting he was also enthusiastically received. Tonight he spoke to three more au-

ATTACKS THE 'NATIONAL' DEMOCRACY.

At his state house speech, Mr. Bryan said: "I come today to defend principles which are Democratic in the broadest sense of the term, because when you come to the fundamental principles of democracy they are loved and accepted and applied by all, irrespective of party name, who believe in a government of the people, by the people and for the people. This city enjoys the unique distinction of being the birth-place and death-bed of a so-called party. My friends, I know that I am not obeying the Bible injunction 'let the dead bury their dead' when I speak of this so-called Democratic party.
But this party occupies a peculiar place in history. It calls itself the 'National' Democratic party when it does not expect to carry a single county in the whole nation. It calls itself a Democratic party when it was organized for the express purpose of electing the Republican candidate for president. Swifts Are the Rarest as Well as Shyest of the Flyers.

swifts are entitled to the highest regard among the rare and interesting birds of California, for, in addition to their rarity, they are among the most difficult of the feathered tribes to capture. This is due to two causes. First, they inhabit only the most inaccessible places in the rocks, where it is almost impossible for man to get at them, and consequently there is only little known of their habits or of their nests and eggs. Second, as their name indiof all birds in their movements, having exceedingly long wings with sharp edges, enabling them to fly with the greatest velocity and at the same time offering the least resistance to the air. HOUGHTON, - -

Taken all in all, they are birds which

seem primarily adapted to powerful flight and long endurance. This, in one way, is attested by their legs and feet, which are exceedingly small and undeveloped for birds of their size, the probable explanation being that through disuse these members have become smaller and weaker, until now the reduced size of the legs has become one of the chief characteristics of the bird. they almost cross at the tips, while the mouth, like most of the other members of the tribe, including the night hawk and goatsucker, is very large in proporand goatsucker, is very large in proportion to the size of the bird, enabling it to catch insects on the wing with almost unerring accuracy. They came nearer and nearer the ground, until suddenly darting up the canyon one by one, they disappeared behind a waterfall which tumbled 50 feet from an overhanging rock. Now the strangest thing of all happened. As my specimen was lying on the top of an immense granite bowlder, where I had placed it to dry, the mate returned, but no sooner had it flown over where I was sitting than it fluttered to the ground and fell over backward into the stream. When I picked it up I was perfectly astounded, and, examining it, found that it was very thin, its stomach being entirely empty, while its mate, the male, had been well supplied, having in its stomach 58 black tree ants and three winged beetles. Probably the mother bird, weak from hunger, had succumbed to her exertions and fell fainting in the stream .- San Francisco Examiner.

DISINFECTION OF THE SKIN. Soap and Water Does Not Remove All the Impurities.

The New York Herald's European edition reports some interesting experiments of M. Lauenstein, a Hamburg physisian, upon the disinfection of the

It is generally supposed that a little soap and water will remove all impurities from the skin. But these experiments of M. Lauenstein prove that it is Ly no means easy to disinfect it, even "by minute washings and the most severe antiseptic applications."

In 147 operations he first removed a small piece of epidermis; 23 of these cases had merely been washed with water, whereas the remaining 124 had had the operative field disinfected with ether, alcohol and solutions of subilmate of chlorine. The little pieces of skin taken from the latter and tested by the usual methods of culture were found to be exempt from germs in 49 cases only.

The practical conclusion to be drawn from these experiments is that disinfection of the skin is difficult to realize, that a quantity of baths must be given (9-10-tf)

As regards hospital practice M. Lauen-stein's experiments show that it is far preferable not to operate on patients as soon as they are admitted, but only when they have been subjected to repeated and thorough cleansing and disinfection. For greater security it is advised to have a series of washings with soap and of frictions with alcohol, ether, corbolic acid and sublimate, the portion of the body to be treated being protected during each seance by a fresh antiseptic dressing as the only security against fresh microbian contamination. CHINESE GIRL DOCTORS. Young Orientals Graduated with Honor PARK AND CEMETERY COMMISS from Ann Arbor.

Two young Chinese girl physicians arrived in Oakland recently en route to their native land from Ann Arbor, Mich., where they have just completed a four years' course in medicine and surgery. They graduated with distinguished honors, and they are the first Chinese women to graduate from this celebrated university of Michigan. They will be the pioneer Chinese women physicians of central China. Only one of their nativity and their sex has preceded them. She has been practicing in the missionary and government hospitals of southern China for a year past.

No Premium on Columbian Haif Dollars or Isabella Quarters. Three years ago everybody wanted a Columbian half dollar and an Isabella

quarter, and wanted it bad. If any body who wanted either of the world's fair souvenirs bad enough to pay over a dollar for it, he could generally get it without much trouble. Sentiment, sweet Kentucky girl—a girl of flesh and blood, a product of nature untrammelled, a blushing bud on a wild rose bush in whose love affairs one takes. of the fair to-day could probably be persuaded to part with a Columbian half dollar for about 51 cents, and hand over the Isabella coin for about a cent plus a quarter of a dollar.
