

In the opinion of Captain Beck, agent for the Uncompagre reservation, the opening up of the mineral lands to settlement, as above proposed, would result in all the gilsonte lands passing into the hands of a monopoly in a short time. He explains why this would be inevitable by saying:

"Difficulty is experienced in getting the gilsonite to market. The Denver & Rio Grande, which is the most accessible road, is 125 miles away, and at present the gilsonite mined by the St. Louis Gilsonite company, which is all that is being taken out, is put into sacks and carried to the railroad in wagons. This makes the mining of the mineral very expensive.

"It is figured that the actual cost of mining the gilsonite is 871/2 cents a ton and the expense of hauring it to the railroad amounts to \$12 or \$15 a ton. Railroad freight to St. Louis or Chicargo amounts to \$9 a ton, making the total cost of mining the material and transporting it to the market in Chicago or St. Louis about \$25 a ton. 'Now if a man had only forty acres

it would hardly pay him to get out the gilsonite. He would be forced to sell out to a syndicate with sufficient capital to work the asphalt mines on a large scale. Such a syndicate would, of course, build a railroad from the mines to connect with the Denver & Rio Grande, and thus greatly cheapen expected for some time. the cost of getting the asphalt to market. They could then afford to cheapen the price without lessening their profits, and it would at the same time create an increased demand. Or, if they desired, they could regulate the output and keep up the price.

Michigan Crop Report.

Lansing, Mich., Nov. 9.-The average condition of wheat in this state on Nov. 1 was 82 per cent., as shown by the official report just issued, the comparison being with vitality and growth of average years. The condition in the southern counties, where 85 per cent. of the crop is grown, is 13 per cent. lower than one year ago. On fields favorably situated it is looking well, but a large proportion of the fields are more than ordinarily spotted. Recent rains have been of great immediate advantage, but heavy, soaking rains are yet needed to place the ground in the usually wet condition at the opening of winter. The estimates indicate that the area seeded to wheat this fall is 6 per cent. greater than sowed in the fall of 1896.

The average yield of corn per acre in the state is estimated at sixty-one bushels of ears, equal to about thirty bushels of shelled corn.

The area of cloverseed harvested is large, at least much larger than in any late year, and the estimated average yield higher than ever yet reported in the farm statistics. The yield in the state is estimated at 1.92 bushels

Potatoes are estimated to yield in the state 64 per cent. of an average crop.



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

BOUND TO GO AHEAD.

Copper Country Men Fully Decided to Put in An Italian Miner Has a Narrow Escape from a New Telephone System There.

A. F. Heidkamp of Lake Linden and Paul H. Grierson of Calumet, who have been in the county since Sunday, principally on business relative to the establishment of a new telephone system in the copper country, will return

Speaking of the new project yesterday, Mr. Heidkamp said that the company will, perhaps, not have as easy sailing up there as the Marquette County company had here, as there are a number of influential men of that region indirectly interested in the Bell company. Jas. R. Dee, the copper country manager of the Bell company's affairs, is one of the most popular men up there, and he has many friends who will stick to the Bell on his account. This, however, is not going to stop the promoters of the projected company rom going ahead with their enterprise.

Mr. Heidkamp says there is room for both companies. The promoters of the new company have received such encouragement that they think the venture will prove a paying one. He says they have already been promised about three hundred and fifty subscribers and these were procured almost without an ef-It is possible that double that number can be obtained if the proper effort is made. The men who have agreed to take stock in the new company are starting out with a determination to put as many 'phones in use as possible. They are not going into the business blindly, but are receiving advice and pointers from other companies having experience in fighting such opposition as the Bell people have been putting up. Mr. Heidkamp says the new company will soon be organized with a capital stock of \$100,000, This will be sufficient to onstruct the entire system and still eave a surplus in the treasury to work on during the first year. When the Marquette County company began business the capital stock was placed at just one-quarter of that amount. The officers of the local concern have advised the copper country men to go in heavier than they did, so far as the capital is concerned, as it will take more than \$25,000 to construct the system. It cost the local company about \$40,000 to complete the system, but the extra \$15,000 was required to enable the system to meet a larger demand on it for service than the projectors originally figured on. Had they realized that so many instruments would have been called for the first year they would have started in with a capital stock of at least \$50,000. Despite this mistake, the company has made most wonderful advancement, and now the system is about paid for and there is ome money in the treasury besides.

The management of the Bell company must have realized from the start that the men who were at the head of the new project in the copper country meant business, as General Manager Forbes of Detroit was on the ground a few days after the announcement that an opposition company was to be organized was inade public. The men who were pushing the thing were seen by the Detroit man and he advised them to let the project drop. They would lose money, he said, if they put in the system. Mr. Forbes then announced that the Bell company would reduce its rates in the hope of killing off the opposition. He was struck in the face by the soft ore and sent back several feet. His face was covered with dirt and powder and it was feared that both of his eyes were destroyed. He was taken to the Ishpeming hospital and placed under Dr. Andrus' care, who examined Garso's eyes carefully and announced that the sight of both of them would be saved, but that one of the eyes is badly injured. Had the blast been in hard ore, instead of soft hematite, Garso would surely have been blown to pieces, as the charge in the hole was a heavy one. As it was, he was very lucky, indeed. He will be laid up for some time as a result of the accident.


