SUPPRESSION OF HISTORY.

The Minneapolis Tribune is another American paper which does not take kindly to the idea of having historical truth perverted or suppressed to the end that the youth of America may be kept in ignorance of the causes which produced the revolution of the American colonies when they were driven to throw off their allegiance to England, or of the arrogance of England which led to the war of 1812, and also of the unfriendly attitude of the British government toward the union cause when the southern states attempted to disrupt the union.

Bishop Doane, in his annual address to the clergy of the diocese of Albany, deprecated, as any one must, the cultivation of the "jingo" spirit among the people of the United States and England; but it appears to us that he approached dangerously near the verge of politeness and displayed a lamentable lack of patriotism when he suggested that "if the old revolutionary spirit that regarded England as a tyrant is still kept alive by our school books of history, then it is time that the text books were changed."

His argument, as embodied in his address as a whole, is that inasmuch as the British people are growing very impatient at the recklessness of speech indulged in by Americans, and mutual recriminations may provoke active hostility, we should suppress or falsify history and cease to instruct the youth of the land as to the origin of our government and the development of free institutions on this continent.

BEHIND THE TIMES.

London was the scene, last Friday of a great conflagration, comparable only to the one which nearly destroyed that city in 1666. The destruction of property was enormous, but fortunately there were no lives lost.

The constable who first detected the flames blew his whistle loudly for assistance, but several minutes elapsed before the alarm was heard by any of his comrades. As soon as assistance reached him an officer was dispatched to summon the fire brigade.

There is not a city of any size in the United States where it would take "several minutes" to turn in an alarm; nor where twenty minutes would elapse, after the alarm had been given, before the appearance of the first engine. In fact, so perfect is the alarm system in the large cities that it has happened the first knowledge of the occupants of a business block had of a fire in their building, was the appearance of the fire department at their doors, and the hurried entrance of the firemen, asking the location of the fire; which was found to be just starting in a remote part of the structure; and the alarm had been turned in by an automatic mercurial alarm apparatus, which being set to operate at 100 degrees Fahrenheit, turned in a call for the fire department when the temperature reached that point.

**Henry George's Property.**  
 The only property left by Henry George is his house and land at Fort Hamilton, worth \$12,000, and about fifteen hundred dollars in the bank. The sale of "Progress and Poverty" is large. But much of its circulation has been in foreign countries—over one million two hundred thousand copies in Great Britain alone—and from this Mr. George received no return except \$25 for one English edition. Nobody had any interest in his copyrights. He received a royalty on all books sold in this country, but while this was duly credited to him on the account books of his publishers, it generally happened that when he called for a settlement he was in debt to them, because his interest in the promulgation of his principles led him to order his publishers to distribute to members of labor unions many copies of his books, and they were, of course, charged to his account. As this will change now, there will probably be a fair income from his books, especially from his new work that was nearly finished at his death and which Henry George, Jr., will probably see through the press.
