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

KAISER'S WORD DOUBTED.

Had Notified the French Officials That Breyfuss Was Not a Traitor.

London, Nov. 22.-The Paris correspondent of The Daily Chronicle says: 'The name of Emperor William is now persistently connected with the Dreyfuss affair. It is current that at the time of the trial he wrote Casimir-Perier, giving his word of honor as a man that Dreyfuss had not betrayed France for Germany, adding that, if necessary, he would give his 'word as an emperor, with all its consequences.' President Casimir-Perier communicated this to the cabinet. Soon after Captain Dreyfuss was condemned.

"The emperor was much hurt and instructed the German ambassador at Paris to ask if the incriminatory documents had been procured on German territory. Casimir-Perier made a guarded reply, but in view of the fact he had been kept in ignorance by the cabinet of what was going on, and had to sanction the sentence upon Dreyfuss despite the kaiser's word of honor, he decided to resign the presidency and seized the first occasion which occurred, namely, the overthrow of the Dupuy cabinet.

"The Gaulois says it was in order to avert the grave consequences arising from Emperor William having given his word of honor that the court-martial was held with closed doors and certain documents, in accordance with the request of the emperor, were not produced at the trial."

GRIM REAPER DECREED OTHERWISE. Gen. Ordway Expires on Verge of Reconciliation With Wayward Daughter.

New York, Nov. 21.-General Albert Ordway died tonight at the Hoffman House in this city. The general's death was doubtless hastened by the sad and recent events in connection with his wayward daughter, Bettina Girard. The latter, a complete wreck, was a day or two ago transferred to a private sanitarium from Bellevue hospital. Owing to the pleading of his wife, who had become reconciled to her daughter, General Ordway finally consented to the return of the prodigal and a reunion of the family in Washington was arranged. Mr. Ordway's death is attributed by the attending physician to jaundice and p'eurisy, which developed from a cold contracted in Paris.

BEHIND THE TIMES.

London was the scene, last Friday of a great conflagration, comparable only to the one which nearly destroyed that city in 1666. The destruction of property was enormous, but fortunately there were no lives lost. The account of the fire is very curious reading to one who is acquainted with the American methods of fighting fire in our great cities. It seems incredible that London, "the Metropolis of the world," should have no electric fire alarm system, but still trusts to a penny whistle in the mouth of a "constable." But here are the words of the dispatch:

The constable who first detected the flames blew his whistle loudly for assistance, but several minutes elapsed before the alarm was heard by any of his comrades. As soon as assistance eached him an officer was dispatched to summon the fire brigade. But here again there was an unaccountable delay of twenty minutes before the first engine appeared. Then the fearful dimensions of the fire were apparent, and it was decided to circulate a call throughout the whole metropolitan dis-

There is not a city of any size in the United States where it would take "several minutes" to turn in an alarm; nor where twenty minutes would elapse, after the alarm had been given, before the appearance of the first engine. In fact, so perfect is the alarm system in the large cities that it has happened the first knowledge the occupants of a business block had of a fire in their building. was the appearance of the fire department at their doors, and the hurried entrance of the firemen, asking the location of the fire; which was found to be just starting in a remote part of the structure; and the alarm had been turned in by an automatic mercurial alarm apparatus, which being set to operate at 100 degress Fahrenheit, turned in a call for the fire department when the temperature reached that

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




