SPANISH CABINET APPROVES THE SCHEME OF REFORMS.

Weyler Arrives at Barcelona, but the Demonstration There in His Honor Falls Rather Flat - More Americans Freed from Prison.

CATALAN DELEGATES TURNED DOWN. Barcelona, Nov. 23.-General Weyler, former captain general of Cuba, arrived this morning. He landed beneath the Columbus monument and was ac-

claimed by twenty thousand people. Addressing a number of friends Cuba, adding that he was particularly annoyed at the attitude of certain newspapers which declared he favored the insurgents. Continuing, the general remarked: "The Spanish soldiers, however, have the same contempt for these

papers as they have for filibusters." Referring to the concentration of Cuban peasants near the towns of that island, Weyler explained that he deemed such a step necessary because they "are spies and most devoted friends of the enemy." In regard to autonomy, he said: "Autonomy in Cuba will be most unfortunate for national industry. The riches of Cuba belong to Spain, and autonomy means the disappearance of Spanish workmen and complete misery throughout the island.

Continuing, the premier expressed the hope the Cuban assembly would elect a commission which would co-operate with a Spanish commission in determining the commercial relations between Cuba and Spain by consulting their mutual interests.

This is interpreted as meaning that the cabinet will adopt the scheme of Senor Moret, minister for the colonies, who announced to the Catalan delegation he had fully considered the general interests of the colonies and was convinced that his policy alone would lead to a peaceful solution. Senor Moret also explained to the delegation that in dealing with the colonies national, and not merely certain industrial, interests

must be considered. El Impercial today strongly opposes granting tariff autonomy to Cuba, declaring that unless Spanish products are admitted to that island on preferential terms geographical conditions will compel the peninsula to renounce the

Cuban market. El Liberal strongly supports the proposition to give Cuba autonomy in tariff and publishes documents tending to show that all Cubans, even the Spanish

colonists, desire autonomy. Later-The cabinet has approved the article in the autonomy scheme giving the Cubans control of the customs. In addition to granting an autonomous tariff for Cuba the following reforms are proposed: The chamber of deputies of the island shall be composed of between forty and fifty members, a deputy for each 40,000 of population. The governor general is to choose from this chamber five members to form an executive committee, consisting of a presdent and ministers of the interior, finance, justice and public works. The governor general shall have the right to veto legislation.

The report speaks in high terms of the operations of the naval militia and is approved by Mr. Roosevelt. Commenting on the inspection made by himself, Secretary Roosevelt says.:

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

governor. Thanksgiving being a national holiday business will be practically suspended for the day. All the federal, county and city offices will be closed and the postoffice will follow the usual custom and observe Sunday hours.

The Mining Journal force will also observe the holiday, in consquence of which there will be no issue tomorrow. though Friday's paper will come to its readers replete with news of the holiday sports and more serious events.

Today will be a busy time with grocers and market men who are right in the rush of the Thanksgiving buying and it will be late tonight before the last chicken and turkey has been delivered.

In common belief Thanksgiving is the day when turkey is king, but the butchers say Christmas outranks it, though to the native American a Thanksgiving without a turkey seems as incomplete as an oyster without a

Turkeys are a little high this season, in consequence of which many people been located. are buying chickens from motives of economy. The butchers are getting from a shilling to fourteen cents a pound for the gobblers while the humbler biddle can be bought for ten. Turkeys are scarce but there is the usual abundance of chickens and ducks.

The reason for the scarcity of turkeys is that they are late this year, and most of them haven't had time to grow to proper size and plumpness to yie'd a good profit. The farmers, calculating on the Christmas trade, with a probably higher price, are holding them back to give them a chance to get bigger. This makes them a little scarce just now, but at Christmas time they will probably be as plenty as ever.

The proprietor of one of the largest of Marquette's eleven markets said yesterday that he expected to sell nearly twice as many turkeys for Christmas that he did for Thanksgiving, yet the local consumption of turkeys alone to morrow will amount to several tons.

Besides the turkey dinners and the dinners with chicken and ducks there will be a large number of dinners where vension will be the principal delicacy.
