



The storm is now traveling much slower than during the early period of its existence, the total distance covered having been about twelve hundred miles. The center now appears a little southeast of Nassau. The weather bureau officials were surprised to hear that Ponce was not warned of the approach of the storm, as

stated in the press dispatches. 300 DROWNED AT PONCE.

Ponce, Porto Rice, Aug. 11.-Wire communication has now been partially reestablished and serves to fully confirm the earlier reports that Tuesday's hurricane was by far the worst storm in Porto



Ex-Cannibal Gives Father Galligan a Critical Opinion.

"I don't suppose that there are many men in Chicago, if any, who can say they have seen and talked to a cannibal on his native heath.' Yet I have done so. and the occasion was one of interest to me and one I will never forget." The speaker was Father Galligan, the

Tonga group, down in the South Pacific. I had been making a tour of that little known section of the world and while on one of the larger islands of the group stopped at the house of a priest, a simple, noble hearted man, who had devoted his entire life to mission work among the natives.

HIGH PITCH OF EXCITEMENT.

The shooting of "Bob" Humes, which was then believed to be fatal, was yesfterday the topic of conversation on all hands and the greatest indignation prevailed among all good citizens. Rumors of all kinds were current, but mostly that he was dead or that the assassin had been captured. Neither of these reports were true, though it may be the police have the right man among the crowd which is still in the lockup. It was Humes' own idea that he had

been decoyed and shot by gamblers as suppressing their illegal business, but this theory has been shaken, though, perhaps, not absolutely disproven. One thing is certain and that is the telephone message was bona fide, as was afound later on investigation.

The call came from the house of ex-A.German Hamill, who rang up Chief Maney's residence to tell him of the holdup on his son Floyd and ask him to send an officer up to investigate. The chief was not at his house neither was he at the hose house. Then Alderman Hamill telephoned to the Queen City restaurant and asked that someone be sent out to find an officer and send him up to Front and Prospect street as there had been a robbery up there. A boy who took the message twisted it and in reporting it to Officer Humes, the first policeman he encountered, said that a house had been burglarized.

Humes, endeavored to find Maney, but when after a little looking he could not find him, started up street to investigate the report on his own account. Above Washington he met Officer Jules Odette, whom he told about the report, and Odette joined him in the trip.

OFFICER ODETTE'S STORY. Odette says they had got up as far as Arch street when they were confronted by a group of men. One of them thrust a pistol into his (Odette's) face and said: "Thumbs up." The fellow also seized him by the collar with one hand. Instead of turning up his thumbs Odette says he threw off the fellow with his left arm and reached down with his right hand for his revolver. This threw the thug's pistol hand back of Odette and in line with Humes. In this position he fired, the bullet entering just about the lower part of Humes' left shoulder. With this the men ran.
