There is a very curious picture among the remains discovered in the ruins of Herculaneum, representing the interior of a carpenter's workshop, with two genii cutting a piece of wood with a frame saw, and on an altar preserved in the Capitoline museum at Rome there is a perfect representation of a bow saw, exactly resembling in the form of the frameand the twisted cord for tightening it those used by modern carpenters. Up to a Late Hour Last Night Girl Had Not Regained Consciousness and It Is Feared Received Fatal In-ORDINANCE WILL BE ENFORCED NOW Annie Sudtell was seriously and very likely fatally hurt last evening. She was riding on her bleycle when a young man named Clifford Dish-

rate of speed on his wheel and collided with her. She was knocked about fifteen feet and landed in the street unconscious, and up to a late hour last night had

bruised but not badly hurt.

Chief Maney, who chanced to be right at hand, arrested Dishneau for fast riding and put him in the lock up. There is great danger that he will face the court on a more serious charge than violation of the bicycle ordinance.

The accident occurred about 8 o'clock at the corner of Front and Spring streets Miss Sudtell had just mounted her wheel at Trethewey's store to go up Front street and was crossing over to the farther side of the street when Dishneau came tearing down and collided with her. He was riding without either bell or lamp and gave warning in no way of his approach. The young woman is near sighted and in the dusk it is supposed was unable to see him. At any rate she gave no cry of alarm and the first anyone knew of the accident was when the crash came.

She was picked up and carried up into a doctor's office where for two hours every means possible was used in the effort to bring her to her senses, but without effect. She was then taken to her home, No. 905 North Third street.

No bones were broken but the indications are that she suffered a hemmorage at the base of the brain. She was still alive at 1 o'clock this morning but the hopes held out for her recovery were by no means strong.

NO MORE FAST RIDING.

This accident will probably put a stop to all fast riding on Front street and from now on wheelmen may look to see the bicycle ordinance, which has been more or less of a dead letter, rigidly enforced.
