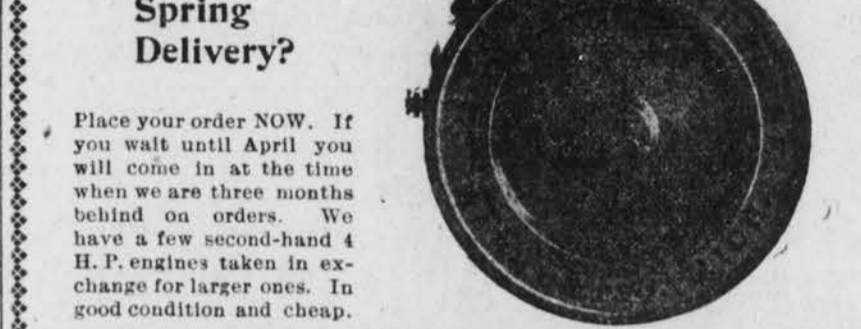

YOUNGSTERS EMPLOY A SMOOTH SCHEME TO SWINDLE A MERCHANTILE HOUSE.

Some young boys who have adopted a method of swindling one of the local business firms had better mend their ways, as they will surely be caught at their game if they attempt it again.

Some time ago the firm in question started to give a three per cent cash discount on every \$1 purchase. Slips are handed the customer by the clerk. A VETERAN COMMERCIAL MAN SPEAKS OF THE INJUSTICE OF THE TAX ON TEA.

H. D. Colby, one of the oldest and best informed tea salesmen in this part of the country, was in town the other day calling on his trade. Mr. Colby, who is now representing the E. A. Smith company of Milwaukee, has made a life long study of tea and coffee and is better qualified to talk on this subject than is the average tea merchant. In an interview with a Mining Journal reporter, Mr. Colby expressed himself of the opinion that the ten cent tax on tea would not be repealed at this session of congress. "But" said Mr. Colby, "it should be, for it is the most unjust of all the war taxes. It is a tax that the poor man is obliged to pay. For example, before the war, tea dust sold for six cents a pound. Today it retails for sixteen, the tax raising it to this excessive figure. A great deal of this dust was used by the poor, who are now either compelled to give up drinking tea, or else are forced to pay a very high price for an inferior article.

"With the better grades it is different and the tax is not felt by those who use them. Take, for instance, a man who has been using a fifty-cent tea. He goes to the store, calls for his brand, but instead of getting a fifty-cent article, he gets a forty-cent tea, thereby paying the tax unaware. The result of this tariff is to drive the poor man into drinking other beverages, and of selling to the better class of trade an inferior brand.

"I think," added Mr. Colby, "that the jobbers and importers all over the country will take united action to have the tax repealed at the next session of congress."

Mr. Colby will spend the holidays with his family in Milwaukee.

PAYMENT IS DEFERRED.

Auditing Board Places Hope Batch of Small Pox Bills With Special Committee.

ARE NOT ITEMIZED ACCORDING TO THE LAWS REQUIREMENTS.

Supervisors Think That Some of the Statements Are Somewhat High and the Creditors Will Likely Be Asked to Reduce Their Figures.

BERNARD COOK OF REPUBLIC GETS \$144

The members of the auditing committee of the board of supervisors allowed but one small pox account at its session Saturday. This was a bill for \$144 presented by Bernard Cook of Republic for his services as nurse for thirty-six days of twenty-four hours each at the rate of \$4 a day. It was made out in detail and was properly endorsed, while the charge appeared fair and reasonable. All other statements were referred to a special committee of three members of the auditing board to include the chairman, Mark Elliott, and two supervisors who are yet to be designated by him.

The creditors who submitted the balance of the \$5,431.04 of small pox accounts will have to wait some weeks for their money and many of them will find that they will have to reduce their charges before the supervisors will be willing to settle in full. The main source of dissatisfaction Saturday was the fact that, with the exception of Cook's statement, none of the bills were properly itemized. The law requires that they be made out in detail and the supervisors manifest every disposition to insist that it be carried out to the letter.

Grocerymen will be asked to specify where they sent their merchandise, clothes for whom they sold their garments, physicians whom and where they made their calls, and so on through the list. The supervisors will endeavor to ascertain just why they are called on to appropriate each dollar of the county's money which will be required to settle the accounts. There was no disposition Saturday to question the honesty of the several charges. The board's action was simply a matter of business and of compliance with the law.

While there was no extensive discussion of the reasonableness of the bills it was quite evident that the supervisors thought that some of them had to do with medical attendance and nursing were somewhat high. Then there were manifest cases of overcharges, which will be summarily dealt with. One instance may be mentioned. A Turin township party turned in an account for over \$200 for "toting" provisions to a couple of patients who were sick for some days in that section. The committee which will investigate the matter will whip the padding out of this account in approved style.

Some members of the board could not understand why medical attendance on small pox patients should come as high as \$20 a day. One supervisor

quoted a physician whom he had questioned on the subject as stating that this rate was "exorbitant." There was little discussion under this head but it is possible that the special committee may work along these lines in connection with the accounts submitted by the physicians of the county.

There was some discussion of settling accounts incurred on behalf of people who are unable to pay their own bills. Mr. Potter informed the committee that it was its manifest duty to allow bills referred to it through the proper channels although he stated that the supervisors would have a legal claim against all parties competent to pay the sums which had been expended in cancelling obligations incurred on their behalf. In Marquette county to date no small pox patient has defrayed any part of the expense incurred in his treatment.

In all probability there will be some cuts as a result of the investigations of the special committee to which the entire batch of accounts has been referred. It is evident that the supervisors do not intend to pay for frills tacked on just because the world at large happens to have a wholesome fear of small pox. "Services received" will mean exactly what is conveyed by the two words when the county's money goes into circulation in settlement of the small pox accounts. Of course it is impossible to forecast with any reasonable degree of accuracy what the supervisors will do or whose accounts will suffer but it is a ten to one shot that there will be considerable trimming.

The payment of Cook's account, the only one allowed Saturday, will be an object lesson to all who have dealings with the supervisors on account of the present epidemic. It means that all reasonable bills, properly itemized, will be approved upon presentation while a neglect of either of these essentials will be responsible for more or less delay in the final settlement. If this lesson is borne in mind it may save the county's creditors time and worry in the future.

A small pox patient was brought down from Wilson's camp, one of the group which is being operated by Charles Hebard on Pine river, yesterday. He was dumped out in the streets, where he was picked up by one of the policemen, who informed Health Officer Brown of his condition. The sufferer was then quickly whisked off to the pest house.

According to his story his rash developed Friday. The camp foreman told him he would have to leave for Marquette. Yesterday a sleigh was prepared and the fellow, who was given no choice in the matter, was ordered to pack in for the long forty-five mile drive. The management of the camp was entirely wrong as far as the case and sanitary measures were concerned. If they considered it necessary to bring the sufferer here they should have at least taken precautions toward the end that the health officers should be properly informed of his arrival in the city.

Wilson's camp must be in first class condition for an outbreak of the disease, as all the lumbermen were exposed to contagion by the man who is now being treated at the Marlowe place.
