So it came to pass that when the power of the Boers broken Roberts was withdrawn and the task of bringing the war to speedy close by terrorizing the burghers was committed to Gen. Kitchener, Procamations were issued declaring the brutal purpose of the British general. which was to drive from their homes the families of Boers who continued in arms against the British, to apply the torch to their homesteads and lay waste their farms. It was expected that this would force the Boers to an unconditional surrender, bringing th war to a speedy close with British

But it is beginning to be evident that the "Weylerian" policy of Kitchener has tended to strengthen the resistance of the Boers, instead of having the effect anticipated. 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
