It would be very unfortunate if it should ever become the rule that sena tors are to withhold amendments to roposed treaties lest the discharge of their duty and the exercise of their independent judgment upon the subject may be offensive to the American negotiators of the instrument. Such a rule would require senators to abdicate functions with which they are charged by the constitution and for the fearless exercise of which they are responsible to their immediate constituencies and the country. It would nullify the constitutional provision on the subject and practically constitute the executive department the treaty-making power, which under the constitution it is not. Coming to the question of how the proceeding of the senate in changing mportant clauses of the treaty would be regarded by the British government,

London, Dec. 30.-Intense excitement still prevails over the suspension yesterday of the London & Globe Finance corporation and the peril of other large firms connected with Lord Dufferin's

On the stock exchange there was a wild scramble to unload in the West Australian market, with few buyers, and firms closely connected with the London & Globe found themselves in difficulty. 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
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
