At the present time the army consists of about 100,000 men, and it is scattered in seven different parts of the world. Out of a total of 530 company organizations, according to a recent report, only 148 are at home.

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That our people are not afflicted of imperialism or militarism is, as a contemporary aptly observes, well shown by the slight interest they take in the fact that both houses of congress have passed an act providing for the increase of the army of the United States to not less than 60,000 or more than 100,000 men.

Speeches were made in congress, as a matter of course, predicting that the new army will overthrow the republic and that liberty will be put to death by the sword or rifle carried by the one man in a hundred.

The people of the United States, with few exceptions, believe that a regular army of 60,000 or 100,000 men, according to current circumstances, is not too large either for present usefulness or to serve as a basis for future emergencies.
