WHEAT CROP PROSPECTS.

The estimate which places the yield of wheat in the United States this year close to the 700.000,000-bushel mark makes such an increase over all previous rops that it will attract earnest attention throughout Europe, as well as in this country. These figures are based on computations made by several independent authorities, and may be presumed to be approximately correct. Some of the estimates, indeed, place the crop considerably above the 700,000,000 line, but one which would reach that figure would far exceed the yield of any former year.

America's largest wheat crop thus far | Marinette. was that of 1898, which was 675,000,000 oushels. Then came a heavy drop in the yield, and that of 1900 was 522,000,000 bushels. The largest crop previous to 1898 was harvested in 1891, which was 612,000,000 bushels. These two years-1891, and 1898-are the only times, previous to 1901, in which the wheat yield has passed the 600,000,000 mark. In 1897 the yield was only 427,000,000 bush- tion at Michigamme, on account of anels, while in 1893 it was down to 396. 000,000. The average of the past few ears has been in the neighborhood of 00,000,000 bushels. Manifestly a crop of 700,000,000 bushels would be a marelous boon to the producer and a great


