After a short delay, waiting for the appearance of a second Sambrook wagon, the driver threw off half the lumber, making a second trip to the crusher. He was warned by Officer Hogan not to repeat his offense, but he stated, probably with all truth, that he did not superintend the loading and that he had to take out whatever timber was placed on the wagon at the mill. Hereafter the Sambrook wagons are to be watched. The 1,000 feet which the single horse was hauling yesterday would have been a good load for a team, particularly as the timber was green, water-soaked hemlock. It is said further offending in this matter of overloading horses will be followed by arrests, in respect of the identity of the person owning the abused animals.

WEAK AGAIN YESTERDAY.
Boston Market Suffered in Sympathy With New York.
Coppers suffered somewhat again yesterday, in sympathy with New York weakness. There were slight declines in many stocks. Paine, Webber & Co. said: "The crop scare and the bear rumors to the effect that Morgan and Rockefeller had disagreed were used to shake out more weak holders of stocks today and a new low record of prices was made in the New York market. There was most excellent buying on the decline and we are of the opinion that the worst is over. The coppers held remarkably well. There were a host of unfiled buying orders in practically all of the coppers at the lowest prices reached. We do not think that the bull movement in the coppers is over yet and we believe that good stocks bought on this reaction will show a profit within a few days." Hayden, Stone & Co. wired the Laidley Commission Co.: "The weakness in New York this morning was reflected here in some extent. If we get any big break in New York we cannot expect an advance here, but the buying was good in coppers. We look for higher prices while the rally lasts in New York, but we would take profits on bulges. The New York banks have large loans out and we believe they will gradually call them. This would be sufficient to stop any advance in coppers." A. E. Jones & Co. said of wheat: "The strength which developed yesterday was continued again today. The shorts were again free buyers and foreign houses bought considerable. The news as regards foreign crops was quite bad, especially concerning the prospects in France. The market has every appearance of working to a higher level, although it may have a little setback, on which we would advise purchases, from this advance."

MAY BE DEPORTED.
Four Chinamen, Charged With Illegal Residence, Held Here.
Charles Sing, Wong Mou, Wong Do and Ho Tui, Escondida Chinamen, will likely be brought before Judge Wandy in the United States court this morning and asked to show reason why they should not be deported to their native land, it being charged that they are illegally residents of the commonwealth of Michigan. The Celestials were brought up from Escanaba yesterday and were placed in the county jail, pending their hearing. They were arrested Wednesday morning on the complaint of Chinese Inspector Frank M. Jewell and Emigrant Inspector Charles Williams of the Soo, who had spent a number of days at Escanaba investigating their antecedents in an endeavor to ascertain whether a case could be made out against them. The quartet was employed in three Chinese laundries. All but one of the prisoners have admitted that they have no papers entitling them to residence and the fourth has not his papers in his immediate possession. It is said that three of the Celestials will certainly be deported and that there is a good chance that the whole quartet will have to go. Yesterday Marquette's boss Chinaman, Sam Lee, interested himself in his countrymen's misfortunes. W. S. Hill will look after their case in the United States court and if any of them are entitled to remain in this country they will receive full justice. According to the Escanaba Mirror Charles Sing and Ho Tui claim to have lived in the states thirteen years, Wong Mou eleven years and Move Do eight years. The raid of the Soo officials nearly cleaned out Escanaba's Chinese population, as there are but four Celestials left in that city. Yesterday the United States court was still busy with the case of James Finn vs. the Sutherland-Innes company. The last of the arguments were heard and the jury will go out this morning, and the purpose of Judge Wandy to charge its members the first thing. The grand jury has finished its labors. It found five true bills of indictment. It is impossible to make detailed announcement of the cases until the arrests are brought about. Twenty-five gas lamps for bicycles—going at a bargain. E. G. BIG JUNE EXPORTS
SUPERIOR DISTRICT HAD A GRATIFYING TRADE LAST MONTH.
SALES ABROAD TOTALLED \$1,690,410
WHEAT AND OTHER CEREALS ARE IMPORTANT ITEMS.
England Was, as Usual, the Largest Consumer, Taking the Greater Part of the Breadstuffs.

June was another good month for the customs district of Superior. The volume of exports was not as large as in May, but still it reached an imposing figure and the prospects are favorable for a continuance of the gratifying trade. June exports aggregated \$1,690,410, compared with \$2,008,414 for the previous month. The June imports had a value of \$43,128, as against \$35,873 in the former period. Old England was again the district's best customer, its imports from the several lake ports being valued at \$1,242,411. Next on the list came the Canadian provinces, Quebec, Ontario, etc., their purchases being valued at \$220,598. Scotland was third, \$114,176; New Zealand, the only other importer, being on the list at \$13,225. Two ports captured all the export business. They were West Superior and the Soo, the former being credited with \$1,021,060, the latter with \$669,350. The greater portion of the exports were carried in American steam vessels, they handling trade aggregating \$778,650. After American steam vessels come cars, \$569,350, and then foreign steam vessels, \$242,410. The import trade was handled, practically all of it, at the Soo, that city being credited with \$42,968. DeCours captured a paltry \$116 of the business and Marquette \$44. The dutiable imports totalled \$17,381, the free, \$25,747. Of the total, \$27,428 was handled by American steam vessels; \$3,819 by American sail vessels; \$3,229 by foreign steam vessels and \$11,655 by cars. For the time being the cereals and meat products are the important items on the list of the district's exports and they make up the greater part of the total. The exports of machinery, which bolstered up the district's business a few months back, are now of secondary importance. Some of the Details. The June export of corn was of notable proportions, 554,000 bushels, valued at \$264,070 having been sold. This export was valued at \$236,428 in the previous month. Of course wheat was the largest single export on the list. An aggregate of 978,167 bushels, worth \$730,881, was sent out, England taking \$44,700 bushels. The sales of wheat in the month of May aggregated \$1,205,658. Along with wheat comes corn of which 56,150 barrels, valued at \$190,142, were sold, it going to England, Scotland and the Canadian provinces. England also took 240 tons of middlings, paying for it, \$3,872. Other items on the enumeration of exports are movers and vans, \$9,600; books and printed matter, \$1,157; rye, 91,000 bushels, \$48,230, this export in May being \$31,386; fire brick, \$5,221; cars, \$17,775, a marked increase over May, when their export amounted to but \$400; fruits, \$1,322; pig iron, 344 tons, \$3,779; steel bars, \$3,354; structural iron, \$4,489; electrical machinery, \$1,034; general machinery, \$24,062, as against \$28,346 in May. The export of lead totalled 1,021,453 pounds and it was valued at \$7,027, this against \$89,758 in the previous month. Meat products are listed at \$136,158, the May record being substantially the same. Flaxseed is down at \$6,212. One gallon of whisky was valued at \$3. Lumber, 1,017 M., was sold for \$13,397; shingles, 739 M., for \$1,428; doors, \$5,806. An important free import was logs, 750 M., \$7,300. On the dutiable list were fresh fish, \$3,783, and pulp wood, 502 tons, \$8,370.
