COUPLING WORKS

MARTIN SWEDER'S INVENTION PROMISES TO BE OF VALUE.

IS GIVEN PRACTICAL TEST.

IT IS DESIGNED TO OBTAIN REVERSE MOTION OF SHAFTING.

All Trials to Date Satisfactory—Device Is for Sale, but Probabilities Are That It Will Be Manufactured Here.

The reversible coupling, invented by Martin Sweder, proprietor of the Lake-side Iron works, and owned jointly by him and Sidney Adams, which was mentioned at length in The Mining Journal a few months ago, at the time of the shop tests, has been given a trial in actual marine service during the past few days and it has not been found wanting.

Mr. Sweder attached one of his couplings to the shafting of the Oudotte launch at Presque Isle. Friday of last week, its first tests were satisfactory, the device working perfectly, and it has continued to run well ever since. The coupling will be kept in use in this craft, which will henceforth be driven by a solid propeller wheel, instead of by one with two movable blades, which must be used with the ordinary facilities for obtaining the reverse.

Louis Oudotte, who operates the launch on which the device is now being tried out, expresses himself as greatly pleased with the working of the coupling and he says that he would never again try to get along without the invention. He says that he can obtain the reverse much quicker than has heretofore been the case and that the coupling is absolutely sure in its operation. It has never failed to work when thrown into action and on all occasions it gets into play immediately, stopping the headway of the craft and backing her within a few seconds. Mr. Oudotte considers that the device adds greatly to the efficiency of the gasoline engines and he believes that, when the inventor is ready to manufacture and market it, he will find that he will be pressed to satisfy the demand.

Friction Does the Work.

Friction is relied upon to obtain the results sought with the reversible coupling. The reverse, or backward, motion of the shafting is obtained by bringing surfaces into play. On the direct motion the shafting whirrs around as if there was no coupling attached, without noise or any other evidence of the device's presence.

When the coupling is brought into play there is a grinding noise and the shaft turns in the direction opposite its true course, to stop or back the boat. This noise is not particularly objectionable and it will be more or less eliminated by further improvements to the coupling.

Mr. Sweder does not assert that his device is perfected. He is constantly studying on improvements and he has already worked out a number of important changes since he has had the coupling in practical working order. He is now studying on additional alterations with a view of further simplifying the device and making it more efficient.

He expects to leave for Washington shortly to look after business in connection with his invention and to apply for further patents.

About a Year.

Mr. Sweder has been engaged in perfecting his coupling to the present stage of its development for about a year. He became interested in the task of working out the invention in a casual manner, but striking a promising line of thought, labored assiduously to turn out a practical device. He was on the right lead almost from the start and during the past twelve months has given all his spare time to study and work on his invention.

A reversible coupling has been something which the mechanical world has demanded for many years. There are numerous uses for such a device, and if Mr. Sweder's invention proves the thing wanted and demonstrates that it fills the bill, he will make a good winning as a result of his ingenuity.

He is well satisfied with the tests to date. In fact he has had great faith in his invention all along. The shop tests a number of months ago were all that could be expected and the inventor has been confident that the coupling would be operated with entire success in marine service.

He has been borne out in this belief by the trials in Oudotte's launch and he is now emboldened to proceed with a further improvement of his invention and plans for manufacturing and marketing it.

May Build Them Here.

The coupling is on the market and it would be sold providing the owners received an offer approximating what they consider the value of the invention.

A copper man of Boston recently bought Lake copper in London and had it shipped here. He got it cheaper than he could buy it in this country. The present price for the metal looks all right, in the face of the amount of copper Tamarack and Osceola are carrying in Dollar Bay, but, if the United Metals Selling company is able to maintain prices, the mining companies, who are not under contract at much lower prices, will make big money."

A. R. Jones & Co. said of wheat: "It needed only an anticipation of cash business to start wheat going again. The pressure was noticeable this morning for a time, but it failed to get the expected support from the cables. In fact, so strong was the wheat market that it helped all the others, and such a factor of increase almost four million in the world's visible was entirely lost. The traders are watching the exports more closely. The market seems strong at the close, but it may take a day or two for the bulls to get their courage up again and make themselves felt, as it did a week ago. The speculative situation favors holders."

GOOD RACES YESTERDAY.

Rob Rene Took the Honors in the Free-for-All.

It was a well satisfied crowd which returned from the Driving park yesterday afternoon, it being the consensus of opinion that the racing program at the matinee was one of the best and most enjoyable ever offered here. Conditions were finally favorable for the races. The weather was auspicious and the crowd was somewhat larger than that in attendance Monday afternoon. The sport was unmarred by any trouble or wrangling. The course was well managed and the heats followed one another with reasonable despatch. Joe Smith was present on the grounds and he succeeded in keeping the crowd amused while the horses were warming up, pulling off a series of his inimitable boys' races.

The event of the afternoon which attracted the most attention was the free-for-all in which were entered Rob Rene, owned by Louis Samm of the copper country, Little Johnny, owned by E. H. Forbes of the Soo, and E. W. L., owned by Robert Frensch of Marquette. The two former horses were run in the race for the 2:23 class Monday afternoon, their work being the prettiest of the matinee. Little Johnny won the event in two straight heats, the time being remarkably good, considering the heavy track.

Little Johnny was considerable of a favorite for the free-for-all yesterday, but the event went to Rob Rene, the best the Soo horse could do being to come in ahead of the field in a single heat. It is said that the little animal was out of condition, otherwise the result might have been different. However this may be, Rob Rene took first money and E. W. L. second. Little Johnny being compelled to be content with third place.

Little Johnny won the first heat in 2:24 1/2. The three next heats went to the copper country horse, the records being 2:22 1/2, 2:22 1/2, and 2:23, respectively. This race was well contested throughout. It was closely observed in all stages and at times was responsible for loud demonstrations of approval and enthusiasm.

The first heat for the race for the 2:30 class was won by Byron Belle. The second was taken by Joe J., who forged over the line a little to the good, but the next two heats fell to Byron Belle. Joe J. took his heat in 2:40 1/2, Byron Belle's records being 2:39 1/2, 2:39 1/2, and 2:40 1/2. In this race Joe J. got second money, Gas Light third.

In the race for the 2:50 class, Pioneer took one heat, Billy K. getting the other two and first money. Saladin was entered, but did not finish.

Had conditions permitted the promoters to pull the races off on the dates originally announced they would have done nicely with them and would probably have made some money, but the continued postponements, with constant and always increasing expenses, were calculated to put them in the hole. There were fair crowds out yesterday and Monday afternoons, but they were by no means as large as they would have to have been if the promoters were to square themselves. The only gainers by the programs were the people who had an opportunity to witness some good sport. Next time the horsemen hope for better luck.
