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

THE NAVY IN THE SIXTIES.

Some Interesting Figures on the Work of the Six Squadrons.

Early in the war six squadrons were stablished, which were maintained until he summer of 1865. These were the North Atlantie, South Atlantic, East Gulf and West Gulf spuadrons, and the Mississippi and Potomac flotillas. Besides these, 418 vessels were purchased by the government at an aggregate cost of \$18,366,618.83. From 7,600 men in service of the navy in 1861, the number was increased to 51,500 in 1865. and the men at work in the government avy yards were increased from 3,844 to 6.880. In January, 1865, there were in the six squadrons enumerated 471 vessels carrying 2,445 guns. Four foreign squadrons, the European, the Brizilian, he East Indian and the Pacific squadcons, were in operation, though, of ourse, but a small force of ships could be maintained at these distant points.

From the beginning to the end of the var there were about thirty vessels of ill descriptions fitted out by the south o prey upon the commerce of the north. and although but seven of them-the Sumter, Nashville, Alabama, Florida, leorgia, Tallahassee and Shenandoahwere at all formidable, the operations of he fleet of privateers were very disastrous. 
