U. P. VETERANS' ASSOCIATION MEETS HERE THIS MONTH.

FINE ENTERTAINMENT PLANNED.

A NUMBER OF DISTINGUISHED VISITORS ARE EXPECTED.

Naval Parade and Fireworks Display the Night of the 21st, With Parade, Picnic and Campfire for the 22nd.

President C. D. Blanchard of the Upper Peninsula Veterans' association is busy with the preparation for the reception of the G. A. R. men on the occasion of their annual reunion here, August 21 and 22.

Arrangements are now all but complete and prospective visitors may be assured of a most pleasant stay in Marquette. The coming of the veterans will be one of the best of the association has ever held and it should be largely attended.

The Grand Army men will have several distinguished guests, chief among whom will be General Leo Rassieur, of St. Louis, Mo., present commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic.

The distinguished army men will address their upper peninsula brethren and will participate prominently in the camp fire to be held in the opera house the evening of the 22nd.

Business and Pleasure.

The programs offer a judicious mingling of business and pleasure. The majority of the visiting veterans will arrive the morning of the 21st. Up to noon their informal reception and assignment to lodgings will give the local committees all they can do.

In the afternoon the first formal meeting will be held in the opera house at 2 o'clock. Here an address of welcome will be delivered by Mayor Mangum.

COUNTS STILL COMING IN.

FROM THE HEALTH OFFICER.

He Addresses the Public on Matters of Common Interest.

Marquette, Mich., Aug. 15, 1901. To the Public—It has been demonstrated during the past few days that there is much sanitary work to be done here. Hundreds of privies should be connected with the city sewerage system.

Your health officer is satisfied that there is much sanitary work to be done here. Hundreds of privies should be connected with the city sewerage system. They are not now so connected, although the system is immediately at hand.

Many manure piles and garbage heaps should be removed away from the settled residence sections. The dump grounds at the corner of Park and Pine streets and further out on Pine street, as well as other grounds in the city which are being used continually contrary to the provisions of the city charter should be cleaned up.

Unless these nuisances are abated you may have at any time an epidemic of typhoid fever, diphtheria, severe bowel troubles, or other equally dangerous diseases.

Do you earnestly desire this work done? Your health officer cannot do it unaided.

If he depends upon one neighbor complaining against another, he can do very little. Where one nuisance might be abated many more would be stirred up in hatred and wounded feelings, worse, perhaps, than the thing which it was originally sought to remedy.

There is a better way, which is above all semblance to personality and which can give no just cause for complaint.

There should be here fifty earnest people who not only want a clean city, but who are willing to give some of their time and some of their money, if necessary, to this end.

This number should include representative citizens from all parts of the city, the more doctors and lawyers the better. Your health officer has been patted on the back and commended for the work begun, but he is not satisfied with this.
