New York, Aug. 15.—Reports about onsolidation of Western Union, Postal Telegraph and Bell Telephone interests are based on the following facts, which are vouched for by a high authority: Recently persons understood to repr ent the American Telephone & Tele graph company, which is the name o he general Bell company, made an in formal proposition to the Western Unio Telegraph company to merge the three great companies mentioned. The Bell eople, it is said, realized that inde endent telephone movements were mak ng serious inroads into their particula: eld and something must be done check this rivalry. It was thought that an alliance with the telegraph compan ies would present such a strong front that independent telephone projects would therefore be unable to make any while the Bell cor ern Union and Postal Telegraph compan ies would all benefit from the union.

Mr. Gould did not think well of such an alliance with telephone interests, but it is believed if anything is done it will ern Union can easily branch out into the telephone field on its own account. For some time there has been a play on foot for the Western Union to estab lish a long distance telephone service and some of the new bonds are believed to have been issued for this purpose.
