He Scores the British for Arming the Blacks and Burning Farms and Has No Faith in the Promises to Induce Surrender.

London, Aug. 18.—The Freeman's ournal of Dublin publishes an interview between ex-President Kruger and William Redmond at Hilversom, Holland, in the course of which the former executive of the South African Republic expresses gratitude for the Irish sup-Kruger said he regarded the Irish as "brothers in oppression," and urged the Nationalist members of the British parliament to continue their "efforts in

the cause of justice and truth." Asked concerning the effect of Lord Kitchener's recent proclamation and Secretary Chamberlain's speeches, Kruger replied: "My people are not to be frightened by such proclamations or peeches, which will only encourage iem to continue fighting. The British ave used armed natives against the urghers from the beginning, but we have not used armed Kaffirs. It has always been against our principles to use black men against white."

No Dutch Conspiracy.

Kruger emphatically denied the exista Dutch conspiracy against British influence in South Asked regarding Great Britain's promses as to the treatment of the Boers after surrender, he said: "I know Great Britain's promises, and you in Ireland ought also to know them. The British promise to lend us money to put things right; then, if it were not repaid, our land would be taken. They ask us to allow the rope to be put around our nerks, and call that freem. We should be slaves."




