BILL PASSES HOUSE MEASURE TO PROVIDE REVENUE FOR PHILIPPINE CARRIES. MOTION TO RECOMMIT IS LOST. BILL FOR DEPARTMENT OF MINES AND MINING INTRODUCED.

Washington, Dec. 18.—The bill to provide revenue temporarily for the Philippine Islands passed the house today by a vote of 163 to 128. Five Republicans, of Massachusetts, Littlefield, of Maine, Heat-wole, Eddy and Stevens, of Minnesota, voted with the Democrats against the bill, and three Democrats, Robertson, Davey and Broussard of Louisiana, with the Republicans for it.

Democrats Were Taunted. In the course of the debate today the Democrats were several times taunted with their failure to present an alternative proposition for the pending measure, but just before the vote was taken on the passage of the bill the attitude of the minority was defined in a motion to recommit, offered by Representative Richardson, the minority leader.

Do Not Want Independence. Representative Hepburn said, when the gentleman on the other side shouted for liberty for the Filipinos, he would like to know by what authority they made their demands.

Portland, Ore., Dec. 18.—Miss Ross came here four months ago, and attended Rev. Father O'Reilly's church. She desired to enter the order of Poor Clare and she sent her to a convent in Chicago on Nov. 23. He urged her to tell something of her antecedents but she refused, only saying she came here from New York.

OHIO SENATOR CHOSEN CHAIRMAN OF COMMITTEE TO REPRESENT LABOR AND CAPITAL. New York, Dec. 18.—The general committee chosen by the conference today to consider plans for hearing the differences between the capitalistic and labor interests, organized today, elected officers and issued a general statement of its mission. Senator Hanna was chosen chairman with Samuel Gompers first vice chairman.

NEW TELEPHONE LINE. Minneapolis, Dec. 18.—It was learned here tonight that owners of independent telephone lines in Wisconsin, Minnesota and Northern Michigan will unite to form a long distance toll line in the Northwest to compete with the Erie system in this city. Every independent line in Wisconsin and Northern Michigan is said to be interested in the merger.

HANNA AT THE HEAD UP TO AMERICANS. GERMAN NEWSPAPER THINKS UNITED STATES SHOULD INTERVENE IN SOUTH AFRICA. Berlin, Dec. 18.—A curious article has appeared in the Kreuz Zeitung, which, although it cannot be called even a semi-official newspaper, sometimes reflects government views.

SCHLEY'S TURN NOW ADMIRAL FILES BILL OF EXCEPTIONS TO FINDINGS. OF MAJORITY OF COURT COVERS EVERY CONCEIVABLE POINT AT ISSUE. Raynor Says Deposition of Client's Case Is Unparalleled In Annals of Civil or Criminal Law.

Blockade Was Maintained. The bill further contends that overwhelming evidence was presented to the court to show that a close blockade of Cienfuegos was maintained; that the majority of the court entirely ignored the testimony proving that the British steamer Adula was allowed to enter Cienfuegos to obtain information regarding the Spanish fleet; that the order of Admiral Sampson, known as No. 7, was an imperative order for Schley to hold his squadron of Cienfuegos whether the Spanish fleet was in that harbor or not; that the majority of the court ignored the admitted fact that the commander of the Eagle did not communicate the situation at Cienfuegos to Schley; that they ignored the fact that Captain Evans failed to communicate to Schley the meaning of the signal lights on the shore at Cienfuegos; that Schley, as proven by evidence, had no knowledge of these lights until the night of May 23, 1898; that the majority of the court are silent in their reference to masking the movements of the flying squadron in front of Cienfuegos.

Relative to Coaling. The bill goes into detailed details of the majority of findings relative to coaling at sea. It also declares that the majority erred in stating that Schley received no positive information from the scout's ships as to the enemy's presence in Santiago harbor, because Sigbee had reported to Schley that the Spanish fleet was not in that harbor; that no reference has been made to the orders of the secretary of the navy forbidding the hazarding of American ships against the shore batteries; that the majority opinion is ambiguous with respect to the loop in that it holds said loop was made to avoid getting into dangerous proximity with the Spanish vessels without stating whether such an act was due to the personal fears of Schley or his desire to preserve his ship intact and ready for further work; that the majority entirely ignored the overwhelming testimony in arriving at the opinion that Schley erred in commencing the engagement on July 3 with port batteries, and that the Brooklyn did not lose either distance or position with the Spanish ships in making the turn; that the majority of the opinion is ambiguous upon the subject of the backing of the Texas, in that it does not state whether the danger of a collision was real or imaginary; that Captain Cook's testimony on this point was entirely ignored; that the finding in connection with the Hodgson controversy was repeated in the majority of the testimony; that the majority opinion of Schley's conduct was characterized by vacillation, dilatoriness and a lack of enterprise not justified by the evidence; that the majority opinion is silent upon the charge by the judge advocate, coming within the purview of the first specification, that Commodore Schley was derelict in the discharge of his duties; that the majority entirely failed to determine who was the commander-in-chief in the battle of Santiago which finding was necessary to determine the conduct of Schley; that the majority rejected the whole of the testimony on behalf of the applicant, and the testimony of the applicant himself, and that by so doing, perverted the ends of justice and deprived him of his common law and constitutional rights; that he has been found guilty upon specifications substantially abandoned by the judge advocate, and that the testimony of a few hostile witnesses has been made prominent.

Proceedings Were Irregular. The bill states that the proceedings of the majority are irregular; that Schley's rights have been prejudiced and his testimony in many particulars not considered; that the evidence is absolutely insufficient to sustain the majority opinion; and that a grave and irreparable injustice has been done.

Our government has been notified by Germany that a German fleet has been ordered to Venezuelan waters to enforce payment of claims of German subjects against Venezuela, and that if it should be necessary to seize a Venezuelan port to bring the little South American republic to time the procedure will be resorted to.

Mr. F. H. Clergue of Sault Ste. Marie is, according to newspaper bickerings, arousing the jealousies of rival nations. Mr. Clergue is a man of deeds and is erecting on the Canadian side of the Sault a large steel plant and other industries, his progress being watched on the American side, remarks an adjacent newspaper, with "jealous misgivings."

## Ishpeeming and its Environs.

**TOO MUCH WATER.**  
A Spring Struck at the Foxdale Mine, Humboldt, Causes Trouble.

**BAD FAIR WEATHER.**  
The Storm Yesterday Kept Many Neagaunee People Home.

Quite a heavy flow of water was encountered one day recently at the Foxdale mine, Humboldt. The water came from a spring near surface. For a day or so after it began to flow into the workings the pumps could not take care of it, so an extra pump was put in. The miners were compelled to lay off a few days, but they are again at work.

A raise was being put in and it appears that the ore led almost to surface. It was known that the spring was near there but it was not supposed that the water would break through.

The Foxdale has not been a very wet mine heretofore, though more water will come into the workings now than ever before. The spring is one that cannot be drained and as the water is coming through the crevices in the rocks there is no way of keeping it back.

The mine is said to be looking finely. The veins are showing up better now than they did when the present operators took hold of the property.

The equipment has been greatly improved during the past six months and the ore can now be mined economically and hoisted rapidly, if necessary. The new hoists and other equipment installed early in the fall are working satisfactorily and no trouble is anticipated on that score.

The buildings at the property have been put in first-class repair. A new engine house recently constructed will meet all requirements in that direction for some time to come.

The Foxdale will be wrought all winter. From thirty to thirty-five men will be employed during the winter months, though a larger force will be worked next summer.
