



CARPENTERS GET MORE WAGES.

Buffale, April 30 .- Two thousand carpenters and 500 plumbers will strike omorrow for more wages. The carpenters demand 37½ cents per hour instead of 30 cents. The plumbers want an advance from \$3 to \$3.50. Fourteen contractors, employing about a thousand men today agreed to pay the wages demanded by the carpenters.
