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The strike commission is busy again. The evidence now being submitted is mostly repetition of evidence that has gone before. Nothing new is being developed, and the testimony is of a cumulative character.

If, according to the predicted program, Governor Taft is appointed to the supreme bench to succeed Justice Shiras, who is expected to retire in February, the Philippines will lose an able executive.

One of the most notable sporting events ever held on the upper peninsula will occur at the Soo, beginning Monday next. It is the annual bonspiel of the Northwestern Curling association, which includes the best teams of curlers on this continent.

The general staff bill, fathered by the administration and championed by Secretary Root, went through the house without friction Tuesday. The ease with which its passage was secured by the congressman who looked after its welfare emboldens the belief that it will be successful in the senate, a prediction which is being made without hesitancy.

Naval officers in Washington doubt the utility of wireless telegraphy for large commercial purposes; but they make no doubt of its usefulness to governments for communication between the shore and moving ships. This leads Admiral Bradford, chief of the naval bureau of equipment, to recommend that the government shall have possession and control of all wireless stations on the coast.

It exists is evidenced by the way in which sugar is accumulating. In Saginaw, the two companies, the Saginaw and the Valley, have each 5,000,000 pounds on hand, and the Schwaing factory has about as much. Other companies hold sugar in storage in proportion to their producing capacity.

The manufacturers, while they are making no parade of their opinions, are inclined to believe that the cane sugar trust is responsible for this state of affairs. They profess to see in the falling off of the demand for sugar an evidence of the ulterior work of their great competitor. They intimate that the trust has been stocking up the jobber and wholesaler with its cane product, thus shutting off any demand for beet sugar.

THREE RECIPROCIITY TREATIES.

Three reciprocity treaties are before the senate, and it appears to be understood that the administration is anxious to have all three acted upon as soon as possible. In the order of their negotiation, but not of their importance, these are the French treaty, negotiated under the reciprocity section of the Dingley tariff law; the Newfoundland-Bond-Hay treaty; and recently concluded and which is a renewal on somewhat broader lines of the old Bond-Breath treaty.

The French treaty has been long before the senate without action, a number of interests uniting their influence to prevent its ratification in the hope that the last extension of time for its consideration would expire and the treaty die without having come to a vote.

The Newfoundland treaty has received no consideration as yet, but when it does there is expected to be determined opposition from the Gloucester fishing interests, because it permits the importation of fish from Newfoundland free of duty, and especially codfish in a condition to directly compete with the codfish caught by the Gloucester fishermen and which is mostly marketed in similar condition.

The principal opposition to the Cuban treaty comes from the beet sugar interests, and how powerful that opposition is likely to be can be judged from the prolonged struggle over the bill which sought to accomplish only part of what is provided in the treaty, and which was put aside for the treaty because the administration had cause to believe that the bill could not get through congress at all.

BEE SUGAR MEN'S WALL.

A loud and prolonged wall is being heard from the beet sugar men below the Straits. It does not concern the proposed Cuban treaty, but is caused by a matter lying much nearer home. The kernel of the trouble is that the manufacturers cannot sell their product, which they are compelled to store, pending improvement in market conditions.

COLLEGE OF MINES.

Biennial Report of the Board of Control an Interesting Document.

The biennial report of the board of control of the Michigan College of Mines to the governor and superintendent of public instruction covers thoroughly the conditions at the institution during the fiscal years of 1900-1 and 1901-2 and the needs of the college for the fiscal years of 1902-3 and 1903-4. The report speaks of the need of a new department in metallurgy and ore dressing, and the present legislature will be asked to appropriate \$15,000 for a building and equipment.

There is imperative demand in order that we may properly care for our students a building which shall be devoted to this line of work. It should contain a proper lecture room, a laboratory and a furnace room equipped with furnaces such as are possessed by most of the other mining schools in this country, furnaces capable of work on a commercial basis.

Demand for Graduates.

The demand for the product of the college is shown by the fact that at no one time writing no one of its graduates is without employment, and that within a month of the last commencement the college received requests for men which it could not supply.

The number of students registered at the school has steadily increased. For the year 1901-2 it was one hundred and forty-six, while for the year 1902-3 it had increased to one hundred and ninety-seven. Michigan furnishes about two-thirds of the registration, the other third coming from the country at large.

Appropriations of 1903.

The legislature of 1903 met some of the most pressing needs of the institution in the way of extensions of equipment by making appropriation for the erection of two new buildings. One of these new buildings is to accommodate the department of Civil and Mining Engineering, the other the department of Chemistry.

Need of the College.

On the third floor of the main building, Hubbell Hall, formerly called Science Hall, the room vacated by the General Chemistry Laboratory should be fitted up as a Geological and Mineralogical Museum. The college has accumulated a great number of valuable specimens which cannot be subjected to handling without great danger of injury.

The work now handled by the departments of Mining Engineering and Chemistry has become so great that it is the purpose of this board to establish beginning with the next academic year a chair of metallurgy and ore dressing. For anything like adequate instruction in metallurgy the college has nothing beyond a few samples of products, and a very small wind furnace incapable of anything approaching a commercial scale of experiment.

Question of Residence.

The matter of distinguishing men who are entitled to be classed as "bona fide residents" of Michigan and to receive the benefits of the tuition rate prescribed by law for Michigan students from those who are not bona fide residents is frequently one of considerable difficulty and annoyance to the officers of the college and to this board.
