In the attention that has been paid to the Panama canal treaty another treaty, hardly second to it in importance, received but scant notice. An agreement whereby the long standing dispute concerning the Alaskan boundary line will be submitted to an arbitration board has been reached between the American and English state departments. It is proposed to have each party to the controversy represented by three members on the board and there will be no seventh member to avoid a deadlock, a provision which will strike some as negatory of the entire work, but which is really to be commended. The position taken is that unless the testimony and evidence received by the board is such as to win one member at least to either of the groups of three arbitrators the situation will be one which shall render it advisable not to have a decision arrived at now. England is known to be after a seaport on the Pacific coast of our Alaskan possessions and her commissioners will make every effort to secure such a port. However, the feeling in the states is greatly opposed to any such concession, and there would any general dissatisfaction with any finding of the commission that would allow it. It is quite possible that the arbitration board will be unable to accomplish anything, on account of the two groups of commissioners standing pat on their own programs, but then it is not unlikely that some compromise, solving all the mooted points in satisfactory manner, can be arranged. In any event the rather odd makeup of the board secures the states against being misled by any arbitrary action of a seventh commissioner, and if the negotiations came to naught we can try some other plan later on.

HERE'S TO EDWARD JARVIS. Last of the Staff of the Old London and Dover Coaches. Edward Jarvis, the last survivor of the staff of the London and Dover mail stage coaches, recently entered upon his ninetieth year, says the London Chronicle. He lives in Water Lane, Ospringe, near Faversham, and is still very active and in full possession of all his faculties. He remembers the time when some forty coaches traversed the London and Dover main road every four and twenty hours. He started as a stable boy, and afterward became a postilion. He recalls with satisfaction the fact that he had often been specially selected, in the first stages of the journey from Dover to London, to mount and guide the leaders attached to express coaches, in which were distinguished foreign travelers—ruling sovereigns, princes and ambassadors. Next to Queen Victoria, he remembers more about Prince Listerland than any of the other illustrious personages. The prince was the French ambassador to England from 1830 to 1835, and made repeated journeys by the coaches. Jarvis received the personal thanks of the late Queen Victoria for riding on the step of the coach by which her majesty was travelling in order to be of service in dealing with a rather playful mare that was included in the team. 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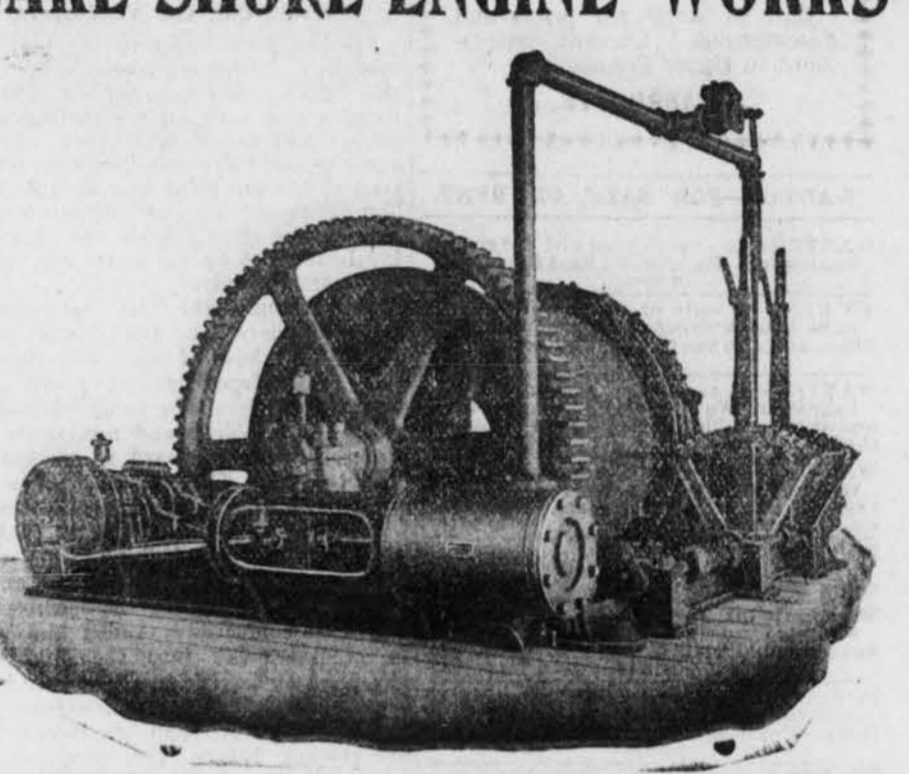
