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MINING NEWS

MICHIGAN. The Michigan is the legitimate successor of the famous old Minnesota mine, which latter during its active period returned in dividends to shareholders nearly four hundred per cent of the amount originally invested, says Geo. A. Newett in Iron Ore.

It would be idle to state that the several openings of the Michigan were uniformly rich. Barren stretches occur in all of them, and this is equally true of the Osceola, Quincy, and every other copper mine on the Lakes. It should be borne in mind that 6,000 acres of territory are included in this property, running along the strike of the vein for more than one and a half miles.

On the Branch alone we trapped through more than a mile of rich openings, and saw the spot from which 2,800 feet of rock were excavated and tested, the product being 480 pounds of copper to the fathom of ground. All of the copper was not extracted, either, but even at this ratio the rich shoots of the Branch now in sight would yield copper to the value of \$8,800,000.

Conflicting reports concerning the Ontonagon properties may be conceded as the source of our inspiration; we approached the property for the cold facts and have them as above presented.

The location of the Michigan stamp mill is still an open one. Many of the best business men of the district would raise both hands to have it go out of the county. They argue that a stamp mill for Michigan on Keweenaw bay would mean another railroad for Ontonagon and the advantages to the county in the road would far outweigh those of the mill.

Two hundred names are now on the Michigan pay roll, and constant accessions are being made. No mine in the state is better managed than the Michigan. Samuel Brady, resident agent, is one of the strong men of this section and would command recognition in any circle.

The Mohawk mill is now handling about 915 tons of rock daily, the output coming mainly from Nos. 1 and 2 shafts and the stockpiles. Development work keeps pace with production and the ground reserves are increasing steadily.

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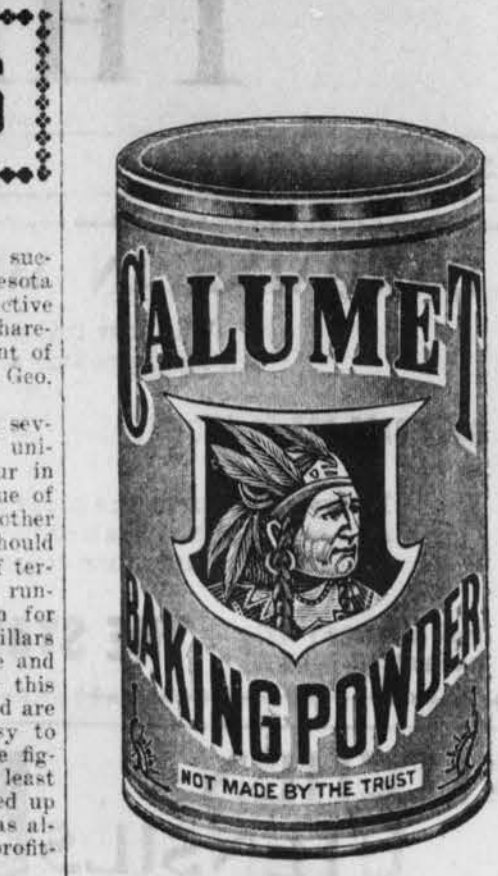

MINING GOSSIP.

There was a decline of 2s, 6d in the London copper prices yesterday, spot closing at £62, 17s, 6d and futures at £62, 7s, 6d. The New York market was quiet and more or less nominal, at 14.75 for Lake, electrolytic and castings.

A crosscut extended west from Wolverine's shaft No. 2 has cut an amygdaloid vein ten feet wide. Several tons of mass copper have been taken from the crosscut opening, besides stamp rock of good quality.

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MINING NEWS

(Continued from Page Two.)

The mine will be properly equipped for handling the output to the best advantage. It will not be long before the Victoria enters the producing list; but it can be depended upon that when the stamp mill is ready to go into commission the mine will be ready to supply it with plenty of rock to keep it pounding away on full time.

"Captain Hooper is handling the property to the best advantage and for every dollar which is being spent he makes it a point to get value received. He is developing a mine which is certainly destined to have a long and successful career, almost irrespective how the metal market may fluctuate."

PHOENIX.

The St. Clair shaft at the Phoenix mine is sinking to the eleventh level. Drifting is under way in the three bottom levels and good copper ground is opening. The west shaft is rapidly approaching the ninth level, with drifting in progress at the three lowest levels.

Six drilling machines are in commission in each shaft. The west shaft has lately penetrated a stretch of highly mineralized ground, the richest since the present company commenced operations. The mill is nearing completion and should be ready for operation within a short time.

The fissure veins opening at the Phoenix are narrow but heavily charged with copper and mining costs should be low. The management has been content to open the mine along conservative lines. The mill will treat 150 tons of rock daily at the start, and in connection with the large production of mass and barrel copper the returns promise to be flattering.

The Atlantic's exploration work on section 16 continues. The crosscut northwest from the shaft is in 2,900 feet. The work of driving the crosscut has been suspended owing to the excessive inflow of surface water.

It is believed locally that exploratory work will be resumed this summer on the Globe property, lying immediately south of the Champion mine.

The Globe was bought for an insignificant sum by John Stanton of New York, a few years ago, when copper mining interest was at low ebb, and it is reported that since he was offered a million dollars for the property.

The Globe boundary line are very rich, and it would not be surprising if the Baltic lode was found highly mineralized on the Globe tract.

Some diamond drill work was done last year, which resulted in the location of a few promising amygdaloids.

Development work is being pushed rapidly at the Mass Consolidated. All three shafts are sinking, and at the present rate of operations the openings should be sufficient to supply two heads by next winter.

The Mass is making 100 and 125 tons of refined copper a month. The company is in a strong position financially.

The preparation of the statement of the affairs of the failed banking house of A. B. Turner & Bro. of Boston is making very slow progress, and present indications are that it will still be some time yet before it can be sent to the creditors.

The unwillingness of the assignee to dispose of the firm's holdings on a market such as is now on, and his belief that the assets can be made to realize considerably more in the future, is in part responsible for the failure to get out a definite statement of the firm's condition.

At the best, however, it is understood upon excellent authority that creditors will realize only a very small percentage on their claims.

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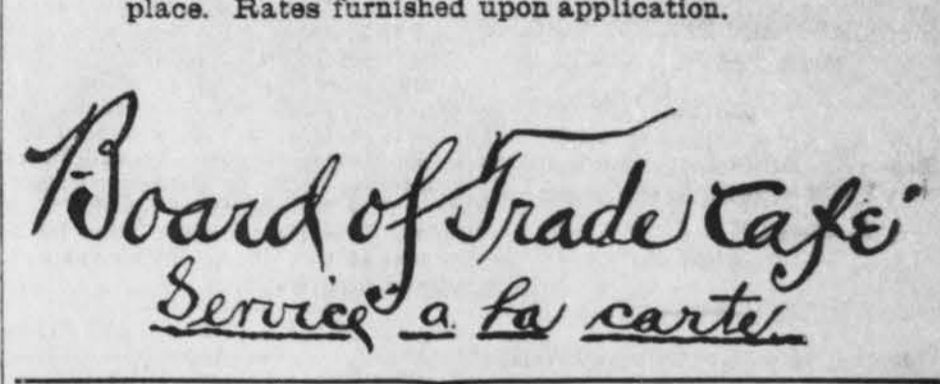

ALARMED BY CHAMBERLAIN.

Germany's cabinet officials are incensed by the prospect of a trade war with Great Britain as presented by Joseph Chamberlain in his Birmingham speech. They are not yet ready to precipitate such a war and they hope Premier Balfour and the rest of the British cabinet will refuse to accept the colonial secretary's suggestion. In this connection they say that if Chamberlain's plan were rejected he might be forced out of the cabinet and this is just what the Germans desire.

Mr. Chamberlain's suggestion came at an inopportune time for Germany. It presents to Chancellor Von Buelow a fresh and insalubrious problem, while the reconstruction of the commercial treaties with other countries is proceeding on well understood conditions.

Say Canada Acts Alone.

So far as any reply can be made to Mr. Chamberlain's contrast of the British attitude toward German interstate relations and Germany's treatment of Canada as though the latter was not a part of the British empire, it is said that Canada is an independent state in commercial relations. Canada fixes her own trade conditions and discriminated against Germany without asking Great Britain's consent.

The newspapers, which are usually ready to avail themselves of any opportunity to attack Great Britain or Mr. Chamberlain, either say nothing on the subject or use moderate language in concluding that Germany can injure British trade more than Great Britain can injure Germany's.

Warred Not to Excite Britons.

A hint seems to have gone out from the foreign office to the editors to say nothing which might irritate the British unduly and to simply wait and see what happens in the British cabinet.

Some of the papers affirm that Great Britain will be initiating a tariff war on all exporting countries, including the United States, if she supports her colonies in imposing preferential tariffs.

EVIDENCE WAS ALL AGAINST HIM

Prosecuting Attorney Bell Had a Strong Case of Circumstantial Evidence—Case of People vs. Fine Will Occupy Court Today.

Brown is a tall, rawboned fellow, who looks capable of giving a good account of himself in a melee. His job at Champion was a workmanlike piece of burglary and no one informed in regard to the case before it that it was his first venture in the safecracking line.

Brown and his pal showed up in Champion on the fifth. The pal made a couple of purchases at Levine & Davidson's store, in order to get the lay of the ground. In the night they sought the premises, forced the front doors and proceeded to crack the safe in a leisurely and highly professional style, being rewarded for their efforts by about \$165 in cash and jewelry to the value of many more dollars.

F. B. Spear & Sons, the agents for the Anchor line, expect the Tionesta here Thursday, when she will be open for inspection by the public. This will be the Tionesta's first trip to Lake Superior, and it is in the nature of a trial run, as the boat does not go on regular schedule until next month. The craft is by far the finest passenger steamer that has ever been scheduled for regular trips to this port and she has no peer on the lakes. She will likely be viewed and inspected with interest by hundreds of people. It is reported that the Anchor line will not likely let contracts for two sister ships of the Tionesta during the present season of navigation.
