

During January the company received 10,600 tons and delivered during January only 1,200 tons, showing an accumulation under the storage warrant system of 9,400 tons

The four principal pig iron associations, Eastern, Western, Bessemer and Southern, are still curtailing production and the output for January is estimated at not much greater than for December. In the southern field prices appear some what more uncertain because of the failure of the members of the former pool to renew the price agreement broken in southern iron makers are slowly working out their contemplated consolidation project, but meantime the makers have been unable to check the inroads of northern furnaces on business north of the Ohio river, and prices are more likely to recede than advance.


