City Brevities

H., will be held at Keough's Hall this evening. F. J. Schulteis has returned home from a five weeks' visit to the Pacific coast. Miss Jessie Pommeroy, of Green Bay, Wisconsin, is the guest of friends in this city. The Rival Juniors defeated the Independents at the Longyear grounds yesterday afternoon, 7 to 5. Miss Maude Sambrook left last evening on the Tionesta for a visit with friends at Albany, New York. Frank Wallace, of Chicago, is the guest of his mother, Mrs. James L. Cuddaly, No. 122 West Washington street. The Neighbors' club was entertained at the home of Mrs. Cal Potter, corner of Pine and Park streets, yesterday afternoon. A. J. Rough has returned from Hibbing, Minnesota, where he has been employed for a year past in the mines, and will shortly go to Houghton, to complete his course in the mining college. Mrs. Mary Murley, who has been the guest of her daughter, Mrs. H. E. Fox, has gone to Scanlon, Minnesota, for a visit with her sons, prior to returning to her home at Loveland, Colorado. County Clerk Frank Jenks says that the trout fishing is so far very poor. The snow has barely left the woods and the streams are as yet very high, with the water unusually cold. Trout fishers have met with the best success in the small lakes. Edward Mitchell, of Powell & Mitchell, left last night for Duluth, Minnesota, to be present at the opening of the bids for the repairing of the breakwater at Ashland Wis. Mr. Mitchell's firm has bid on the work, which will necessitate an expenditure of about \$75,000. Captain J. E. Nolas, one of the ablest of the officers who aided in making the Salvation Army rally held in this city recently a success, has been transferred from Escanaba to Houghton. The new post is in the line of a promotion and the army is stronger in Houghton than in any other city in the upper peninsula. Mrs. George E. Buell left yesterday morning for her home at Zalon, Wis., after a week's visit as the guest of her sister, Mrs. Charles McCormick, North Third street. She had come in response to notices of the critical illness of Mr. McCormick, who has been in very poor health since the first of the year. Mrs. Buell was a former resident of Marquette. She removed from the city ten years ago, and this was her first visit here since that time. Mr. McCormick's condition is still quite serious.

Small Fire on Washington—A chimney in the building in the rear of No. 328 Washington street, owned by Sidney Adams estate and occupied by a number of families, caught fire about 10 o'clock yesterday morning. By the time the department arrived the flames had worked through to the roof, which was burning merrily. It took but a few moments to control the flames when a hose was turned on them. The damage from fire and water was slight.

Marquette vs. Baraga—The Marquette and Baraga teams will clash at the new grounds Sunday afternoon in a contest that should prove the best so far this season. The line-up of the Baraga team is about the same as last season, when it was generally rated one of the best in the upper peninsula. Marquette last year played a number of games in the series, breaking about even on the score, and the rivalry between the two organizations is strong enough to make the snappiest kind of ball.

Crossing in Bad Condition—Firemen state that something should be done to re-establish the grade at Fourth street crossing on Washington. The pavement at this place has been worn down to a point at least six inches below the level of the cement crossings and the hose cart is compelled to slow down on approaching it or run the risk of having the hoses thrown by the jar. The members of the company say that should the season strike the crossing going at full speed at night and without warning every man on it would be hurled to the pavement.

Dangerous Explosives Prohibited—The use of dynamite canes, cannon crackers and pistols using blank cartridges will not be allowed at the coming Fourth of July celebration. The dynamite cane, a device of recent invention, was responsible for the ruining of a number of ladies' dresses during the celebration here last year. Chief Manning states that the canes are loaded with small dynamite caps that discharge a fine dust that sometimes strikes and renders them practically valueless. The cannon crackers and pistols will be prohibited to lessen if possible the list of accidents and runaways. Small crackers, cap pistols and all kinds of fireworks will be allowed.

Challenges the County—A match race between Air Motor, owned by A. C. Shepard, of Standish, and some Marquette county horse, will be a feature of the Fourth of July celebration in this city, if an opponent can be secured for Air Motor. Mr. Shepard is willing to bring his horse here at but a little advance over railroad transportation and will race it under any conditions which the management may see fit to impose. In a letter to Postmaster Mangum, Mr. Shepard advises that 2:30 and 2:25 trots and a free-for-all form part of the card at the fair this fall. These classes, he believes, would fill quickly and bring out excellent fields. Mr. Shepard will exhibit some Tonlon geese, a breed never before shown here in the poultry department of the fair.

Well Received at Hancock—The Houghton Gazette has the following comment on Miss Roselle Knott's engagement at the Keredge theater, Hancock: "Roselle Knott and her excellent company pleased a good sized audience at the Keredge theater, when Barrie's pretty comedy, 'Alice-Sit-by-the-Fire,' was presented. It is a delightful comedy, well worth seeing and those who witnessed the production felt well repaid for having done so. Miss Knott, who is really Mrs. Knott, was at her best, as was also her daughter, Miss Viola Knott, who

appeared as Amy Grey. These ladies are the center around which the plot revolves, and the work of both was all that could be desired, and both were greatly admired by the audience. The remainder of the cast was as good as has been seen here this season."

LOOKS FOR SPECIAL SESSION.
Senator Fuller Believes Governor Warner Will Call One.

That it will be necessary for Governor Fred M. Warner to call a special session of the legislature next spring to secure the enactment of a proper primary election bill and other reforms proposed by him is the opinion of Senator O. B. Fuller in a letter written to a friend in Escanaba this week. It is said by Senator Fuller that the "boxer" element of the legislature has succeeded in securing the hands of the present administration to prevent the passage at this time of any bills generally desired by the people, and which Governor Warner, Senator Fuller and other supporters of the administration wish to enact into laws.

Senator Fuller believes that the present session of the legislature is likely to come to a close at any time, as the strength of the "boxers" is fully appreciated and it is believed that it will be useless to further prolong the session in the hope that their attitude will be materially changed. He writes: "We may adjourn here today, as the 'boxers' have tied things up so we will not be able to do anything. All we can do is to get them on record a few times more. There is no question but that the governor will have to call a special session next spring."

One of the most important measures favored by Governor Warner is a working primary election law, for which a demand has gone up from the people throughout the state. Believing that the cause of the present administration can best be injured by preventing the passage of general bills demanded by the people, the Hill, Atwood and other allied forces of the state opposed to Governor Warner, have centered their attack upon the primary bill as favored by the governor, with the result that when a test vote was taken in the senate a deadlock was recorded, and it is believed that there is but little hope of breaking the tie vote on this measure. Governor Warner's bill providing for the establishment of a twine plant at the Jackson prison, a measure especially desired by the farmers of the lower peninsula, has been successfully held in the committee room and all pressure that has been brought to bear up to this time to force a vote on the question in the senate has been fruitless.

In other matters of equal importance the hands of the administration have been securely tied and should the same tactics of the "boxers" be adhered to for another ten days the legislature will be adjourned after the opponents to the measures demanded by the people and favored by Governor Warner have been securely placed on record as standing against them. With a special session of the legislature called by Governor Warner and the people of the state placed in possession of the facts, it is believed that sufficient pressure can be brought to bear upon the "boxers" to force the passage of the primary bill and other important measures at the special session.
