Its candidates for president and vice president, according to the plan as announced, will be Theodore Roosevelt and Governor John A. Johnson of Minnesota.

MILK DEALERS INDICTED. Chicago Dairymen Charged With Combining to Raise Prices.

Chicago, Dec. 22.—The grand jury has returned indictments against fifteen members of the Illinois Milk Dealers' association for conspiracy to do an illegal act injurious to public trade. The indictments are the result of the investigation recently commenced by State's Attorney Healy into the causes for the recent advance in the price of milk. In its report the grand jury said: "In our opinion the testimony submitted conclusively proved the existence of a combination for the purpose of advancing the price of milk."

All of the men and incorporations indicted are members of the Illinois Milk Dealers' association, and all were said by witnesses before the grand jury to have been present at a meeting of the association in this city immediately preceding the recent advance in the price of milk. The members of the association, however, assert that prices were not discussed and that no action regarding pric-

es was taken at the meeting. The Borden Condensed Milk company one of the firms against which indictments were returned, is a New York corporation and is capitalized at \$25,000,000 It has two representatives in the mem bership of the local association.

The offense charged against the milk dealers is punishable by a fine of \$2,000 or imprisonment in the penitentiary from one to five years, or both.

Hitherto the Children's Canteen society has been able to cope with the task in fairly satisfactory way by means of subscriptions from private sources, but the calls on its funds are this year so great that it will be unable to supply many of the

In the first week of December, ac cording to official statistics, in from 245 out of 285 primary schools no fewer than 11,947 children attended school in most cases without breakfast and in all cases without the prospect of obtaining a midday meal at home. Of the number stated, 4,498 received a simple daily meal from the fourteen canteens belonging to the above mentioned society; the other 7,449 were totally unprovided for, and are yet.

WILL STAY THERE

European Authorities Look to See the United States Maintain a Fleet of Exceptional Strength in the Pacific.

Possibility Is Seen of a German-American Alliance Offsetting the Anglo-Japanese Compact, and Already It Is Great Britain's Reported Intention to Revive the Esquimalt Naval Station and Quietly Assemble Many Ships at That Point.

London, Dec. 22.-The departure of America's armada from the east to the west attracts the earnest attention of every European naval power as to its potentiality and significance. The best authorities here anticipate that America hereafter will maintain a fleet of exceptional strength in Pacific waters while the Atlantic fleet will be reformed by

new up-to-date ships. In the meantime, the first note of alarm emanates from Canada, whose agent general here is quietly sounding British government regarding its intentions, pointing out that the Canadian Pacific coast line is practically unguarded. The government is considering his position, for, though relations are now exceptionally peaceful, there is no knowing when trouble may arise, it being impossible for the British government to rely upon Japan's aid in an emergency, as the Anglo-Japanese treaty does not reach the Canadian freeboards. Moreover, in view of the Canadian objections to Japanese immigrants, it is unlikely that the mikado will stretch







Washington, Dec. 22—President Roosevelt desires harmony within the Republican party. He wants to leave it strong and firmly, compactly, organized. He expressed himself in this connection when he said to a caller: "Of all the things abhorrent to me, that of Grover-Clevelandizing' my party is worst."

accept a nomination, that he will go to the extent Mr. Blaine found necessary when, after twice indicating his intention in open letters not to be a candidate, was obliged to address a similar letter to the national convention of his party. The president also wants to work in harmony with the leaders of his party in the senate and house of representatives. This was made apparent in the last few days as never before. When asked to interfere and influence certain action by the congress, through sending for members, he has refused absolutely to do so. Even in the financial legislation he has refused to urge the senate leaders to definite action. He has told those who urged that course that he stands upon his message, in which he pointed out the needs of the situation and waited for the ongress to act. The congress alone nust accept the responsibility for failare to act.

One of the factors which called for an early third-term statement was the Clayton resolution in the house, declaring against a third term. The president knew that its lengthy discussion could not be long delayed. That discussion would undoubtedly involve his attitude and his sincerity in his election night announcement would be strongly ques-tioned. He issued the statement before the return of Mr. Taft, so that it could not be truthfully said that he issued it in the interest of Mr. Taft or at the request of the Taft people. He was prompted further to issue it, at this ime, because of the attitude of Southern Republican leaders, who declared for early Republican conventions, at which they propose to declare for Mr. Roosevelt for president. He preferred to leave them no excuse for such action.

The ancient war on rats, meanwhile, has entered a new phase in Europe. Hosbegan in Denmark not long ago, for in Denmark partly smoked pork is a commen article of diet among the people and from this food has come the diseas of trichinosis, which has raged among the Danes to an alarming extent. The responsibility of the rat was first shown by a scientific person named Zuschlag, who probably knows more about this animal than all the rest of us together. Mr. Zuschlag brought charges against the rat and investigation seemed to conthe rats should be killed in Denmark and the Danish government accepted his con-

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The war began in Copenhagen and an adjacent city. The government ordered a bounty for every rat slaughtered, and, in eighteen weeks, 103,000 of the detested rodents were killed, the bounties amounting to \$3,689. Thus far the experiment is regarded as successful. The government proposes to spend \$8,000 annually for three years; and each county and borough council will appropriate money for the campaign. Mr. Zuschlag estimates that money is saved by rat extermination inasmuch as each rat, on the average, eats about half a cent's worth of food and material a day, so that in one year 103,000 rats that were killed in the two Danish cities in eighteen weeks would have destroyed \$195, 000 worth of property. Such an argument is very effective with people of practical minds. There is no doubt, of course, that rats eat almost everything: they are, perhaps, the most nearly om-nivorous of animals. This suggested that the injection might be valuable in the treatment of insane persons. So experiments were performed for the first time upon human beingsat a local institution for the insane. To people in this region the bill introduced in congress will seem to be a good deal of a mystery, as, while there has never been a formal report on an Au Train-Bay De Noquet canal, it is generally the opinion of engineers that the plan is wholly unfeasible, and members of that profession who have given some study to the project have pronounced to that effect. In the region to be traversed by such a canal there are no great bodies of water that could be utilized to feed a lock canal. If such a waterway were dug it would have to be a lake level canal, and the cost of such an undertaking would be stupendous.

The bill now in congress was intro-duced by request of Representative Ham-ilton, of the Michigan delegation, and it contemplates the construction of the canal by private interests. The parties seeking the right-of-way are said to be partly Michigan and partly Illinois people, and among them are George W. and Edward Dolan, Jr., Edward and F. B. Sprague, Lawrence E. O'Meara, John H. Mauritius and Lincoln H. Titus. It is said that they will go before the ways and means committee and push their bill. None of the parties named are known
