Friday Governor Warner went on record for Taft, in the following statement, given out at Detroit: "I am for Secretary Taft for president."

Along a different line but equally significant in indicating the drift to Taft in this state is a poll of twenty-four counties conducted by newspaper correspondents.

The next few weeks will doubtless settle which candidate will get the great bulk, if not all, of the votes of the Michigan delegates to the national convention.

PUBLICITY AT ANY COST. Horatio S. Earle, road commissioner, isn't long out of the lime light.

Friday of last week Mr. Earle exploited the constitutional convention as a possible means to publicity. He sprang fullarmed into the arena as an advocate of mandatory submission of the county road system in all counties of the state where the system has not been adopted.

Mandatory submission would doubtless be found to amount to very little, even if the new constitution should be adopted. It is beginning at the wrong end.

As we have often remarked, Mr. Earle is a good road commissioner and as such the state owes him gratitude for some excellent things accomplished.

WILL REMAIN AT HEAD OF SKI ASSOCIATION

OWING TO ABSENCE FROM THE STATES OF VICE PRESIDENT OF THE NATIONAL SKI ASSOCIATION CARL TELLEFSEN WILL RETAIN PRESIDENCY UNTIL THE ANNUAL MEETING.

Because the vice president has gone to Canada to reside, Carl Tellefson, who a short time ago sent his resignation as president of the National Ski association to Aksel Holter, the secretary, has consented to retain the office until the annual meeting in Duluth Feb. 11.

Mr. Tellefson has been president of the national association since it was organized here four years ago, and has been a hard worker in its interests. He has aimed particularly to foster the amateur spirit in the various clubs, and disapproves of giving money prizes for the tournaments. In connection with his resignation, an Ashland paper said:

"Carl Tellefson of Ishpeming, Mich., has tendered his resignation as president of the National Ski association of America to Secretary Holter of this city. Mr. Holter knows of no reason for the president's action, and he hopes Mr. Tellefson will reconsider it and remain at the head of the fast growing association until the end of the season, at least. The national convention and election will be held in connection with the national tournament in Duluth Feb. 11. The vice president of the association, John C. Lohrauer, is at present located in Inter-National Falls, Canada, and it is not expected he will return to the states before the convention. Mr. Tellefson was the first president of what is now the strongest ski club in Norway, as far as membership is concerned. The Tringham club has several thousand enrolled on its list. Mr. Tellefson is one of the best, if not the best, judge of skiing in America and has been one of the foremost in promoting the sport in this country. He has held the presidency of the National association since its organization four years ago."

PRESIDENT HOLDS HARMONY SACRED.

Third-Term Declination Prompted by Impending Factional Strife.

Washington, Dec. 22.—President Roosevelt desires harmony within the Republican party. He wants to leave it strong and firmly, compactly, organized. He expressed himself in this connection when he said to a caller: "Of all the things abhorrent to me, that of Grover-Clevelandizing my party is worst."

It can be asserted with authority that so determined is the president, and so irrevocable is his mind made up not to accept a nomination, that he will go to the extent Mr. Blaine found necessary when, after twice indicating his intention in open letters not to be a candidate, was obliged to address a similar letter to the national convention of his party.

The president also wants to work in harmony with the leaders of his party in the senate and house of representatives. This was made apparent in the last few days as never before. When asked to interfere and influence certain action by the congress, through sending for members, he has refused absolutely to do so. Even in the financial legislation he has refused to urge the senate leaders to definite action. He has told those who urged that course that he stands upon his message, in which he pointed out the needs of the situation and waited for the congress to act. The congress alone must accept the responsibility for failure to act.

One of the factors which called for an early third-term statement was the Clayton resolution in the house, declaring against a third term. The president knew that its lengthy discussion could not be long delayed. That discussion would undoubtedly involve his attitude and his sincerity in his election night announcement would be strongly questioned. He issued the statement before the return of Mr. Taft, so that it could not be truthfully said that he issued it in the interest of Mr. Taft or at the request of the Taft people. He was prompted further to issue it, at this time, because of the attitude of Southern Republican leaders, who declared for early Republican conventions, at which they propose to declare for Mr. Roosevelt for president. He preferred to leave them no excuse for such action.

It is admitted that the recent advance in the market has been due almost entirely to buying by the short interest, and for this reason it is not generally expected that the advance will be sustained. Strenuous efforts are being made to maintain the market around present levels until after the first of the year. However, we are not as yet out of the woods."

Paine-Webber's Wheat Summary.

Paine, Webber & Co.'s Chicago correspondent said Saturday concerning the wheat market: "After some selling on the strong and early advance by the bull leaders, sufficient to check the upward tendency of the market; the selling out of a line of wheat by one of the trailers of the

bull crowd, and profit taking of a general character by longs who have been right on the market all week, the closing price was identical with that of yesterday, showing a remarkable staying quality in the market, in the face of the local offerings. Liverpool was 1 penny higher for both spot and futures. Every continental market was strong and higher, with an advance of 2 1/2 at Berlin. Both public and private cables confirm the continuation of unfavorable harvest conditions in Argentina. With fine weather, plenty of cars, fancy cash prices at the terminal markets, the spring wheat receipts show a falling off from last week and last year. This to some extent confirms the claim that a smaller proportion than usual of the crop is back in first hands and the country elevators, and indicates a very strong domestic situation in that quarter. Toronto and Montreal are both sending very bullish news on London and Hamburg advices and inquiries for wheat from the other side. Duluth sold 200,000 bushels of durum wheat for export today. A Duluth authority says that Canadian wheat grading under No. 4 is spooling in transit and that the buyers are fighting shy of it. We think the position of the bull leaders unchanged, the situation strong, the reaction today entirely due to profit taking before the close and a renewal of the bull market likely for Monday, unless foreign conditions are much improved."

BOSTON COPPER NEWS.

Davis-Daly Estates Copper company now has about 2,000 stockholders, of which two-thirds are in New England. Soon after the company was formed two years ago there were about 200 stockholders. Several hundred names have been added to the list in the last two months. President Coran says: "I expect to have a resumption of mining operations at the Davis-Daly property by the first of the year. The affairs of the company are being gradually straightened out. I have just received advices that the leasers on the Lizzie mine have made another important strike. In sinking the shaft three feet of new ore has been encountered, which averages 4 per cent copper. Every indication on the Lizzie claim gives evidence of the making of a big mine there. The opening of a lode thirty feet wide 100 feet from the surface, which averages 2% per cent copper its entire width and the ore improving with depth, is certainly a remarkable development and alone assures a future for the Davis-Daly company outside of any other workings." The chairman of the farmers' committee returns to Salt Lake today, when the Utah consolidated case may be settled. It is said that a majority of the committee members are disposed to stand pat on demanding \$150,000 bonus and \$25,000 counsel fees. However, strong pressure is being brought to bear to induce the farmers to accept the company's \$100,000 offer. Should they refuse there is no doubt that the smelter will close down as soon as injunction becomes operative, Jan. 18. The Butte Coalition Mining company has contracts with both of the Amalgamated smelters in Montana for the treatment of its ores—the Washoe plant and the Boston & Montana smelter at Great Falls. Considerable inquiry has arisen as to the nature of the smelting contracts which the Butte Coalition has

with the Amalgamated interests by reason of the decision of the management of the Butte Coalition company to suspend mining operations simultaneously with the announcement that all of the Amalgamated mines, with the single exception of Boston & Montana, would cease operation, this including the Washoe smelter. The cost of production at the various parts of the Butte Coalition property has ranged from 8 to 13 cents a pound, charging construction and improvement to operations, and the controlling interests in this concern thought it better policy to close down until prices for copper metal improve from the 13c level now prevailing. As the Boston & Montana takes out considerable Butte Coalition ores through its openings that portion of the latter company's product is smelted at the Great Falls smelter and amounts roughly to about 25 per cent of the Butte Coalition's total output. When operations are finally resumed by the Butte Coalition it should be at a lower cost per pound of refined copper as by that time the new tramway shaft should be complete and through this shaft alone a considerable saving in the cost of hoisting is expected to be effected.

House of Concrete Blocks—The first house to be constructed in Menominee of cement has been built by A. A. Juttner on Kirby street. The house is entirely of concrete blocks and is a very imposing structure. Mr. Juttner began the manufacture of concrete blocks last spring and a large number of Menominee residents have been using the blocks for the construction of foundations for their houses. The blocks are very good for this work and a large number will be manufactured this coming spring. Reads Like a Hoax—A correspondent at Gladstone sends out the following: "Mrs. Olson, wife of Ole Olson, one of this city's leading merchants, was severely injured this morning by a cow which became frightened at a passing automobile. Recovery is said to be impossible. Mrs. Olson went to the barn early this morning to milk the cow. A few minutes later the animal became unmanageable through fright as the automobile came chugging along and the woman was knocked to the floor, trampled upon and hooked. Physicians were hurriedly summoned but at noon they gave up hope and death is expected soon."

TWO CHARITY BALL BOXES BRING \$200

BIDDING HAS ALREADY BEGUN AND RESERVED SPACES WILL PROBABLY SOON BE SOLD.

TICKETS ARE GOING RAPIDLY

Floor of the Big Ball Room Is Now Being Scraped and Put in Shape—Buildings Will Be Well Heated.

Bidding for boxes for the big charity ball to be held at the new plant of the Lake Shore Engine Works Friday night, Jan. 3, has already begun and several of the boxes have been sold. At least two of them went for \$100 each. In all there will be about twenty-five boxes and it is probable that they will all be disposed of within a short time.

Many Tickets Sold.

Tickets for the ball have now been on sale for about a week in many of the downtown stores and it is reported that the number sold is encouraging. The big ball has awakened almost as much interest in the other cities of the upper peninsula as it has in Marquette. This is largely due to the efforts of the advertising committee. The outside cities have been placarded and billed and the newspapers of the peninsula are all carrying reports of the big event. It is certain that there will be hundreds of visitors from all parts of upper Michigan in Marquette on the night of the ball.

The big task of decorating the machine shop, which will be the ball room, is now well under way. A great deal of this work is being done on the hard wood floor. All rough spots are being scraped and sand papered, and when this is finished the surface will be treated to make it smooth and glossy. Without doubt by the time of the dance it will be the biggest and best dancing floor in the city.

Erecting Boxes.

Carpenters are busy erecting the boxes about the walls of the building and the band stand, which will be in the center of the west wall, is now well under way. Recently the general committee sent out a request for the loan of flags and bunting to be used on the interior of the building. These will be used when the final touches are begun and, with others to be secured, the ball room will be gay with flags and streamers.

Superintendent Retailic, of the city's electric light and power department, has a force of men wiring the buildings, and the work of coloring the hundreds of incandescent electric lamps which will light the interior has begun. The connections with the power plant from which the various buildings will be heated are being made.

In this connection the general committee states that all of the buildings which will be used, the machine shop, the office building and the pattern shop, where

supper will be served, will be thoroughly heated. After one's arrival in the ball room it will be possible to go to any of the other buildings under cover, as they will all be connected by covered ways. As stated before, the trains, vehicles and sleighs will be able to enter the foundry building and this building will connect with the ball room by means of one of the covered ways.

Twenty-Eight Selections.

The music committee has arranged every detail with the Calumet & Hecla band and the thirty musicians will arrive in the city before 8 o'clock on the night of the ball. They will have their supper on the train on the way here and will be taken directly to the plant. The twenty-eight selections, which will comprise the program, have all been arranged and will be given as announced in The Mining Journal recently. The concert will begin at 9 o'clock and will last an hour and a half. The grand march, which will mark the beginning of the dancing, will take place about 10:30 o'clock. There will be no intermissions. The music will continue from the time the concert begins until the ball is over. During the supper hour it has been arranged that the band will be divided into two parts, one relieving the other while supper is going on.

SKATING ON CINDER POND.

Boys Clear Away Snow to Form Ring and Ring of Steel Is Heard.

Almost for the first time this season the steely ring of school boys' skates was heard yesterday along the lake shore. The skating was confined to an area near the shore of the Cinder pond. Here the boys have cleared away the snow from an oblong space and they have a fair sized rink. During the day there were a score or more boys of all sizes skating, but the crowd thinned somewhat late in the afternoon. By that time the effect of the sun began to be noticed and at one edge of the cleared space a pool of water gradually formed.

Cinder pond is the only part of the bay that is frozen and it was only the holder spirits yesterday that ventured far out upon its surface. There is a considerable quantity of loose, floating ice in the harbor, but unless there is a marked change and much colder weather sets in, it will be sometime before it packs. Several weeks ago for a day or so there was ice upon Dead river pond and about one day's skating. The pond is again frozen and there were a number of skaters upon it yesterday. There will be lame backs and aching ankles today as a result of the sport yesterday.

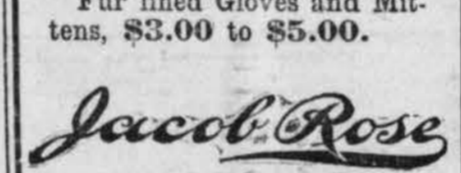
