The rumbles heard afar in Lansing for some days past suggest that if the house was to elect a speaker tomorrow his name might not be Campbell.

While the published reports of the uprising at Constantine permit of forming but a hazy idea of what it was all about, we are warranted in concluding that the ruction gave Sick Man of Turkey a bad chill.

Some weeks ago Representative McCabe introduced in the house at Lansing a perfectly good uniform ballot box bill which, if enacted into a law, would throw additional safeguards about the sanctity of the ballot and would apply the lessons that the press of the state was a unit last fall in asserting should be applied.

No doubt about it at all, Mr. Fairbanks of Indiana would do very nicely at St. James. He has a front of imperturbable dignity, a faculty of being able to talk on almost any subject and sufficient means to keep the embassy larder well stocked.

The liquor interests in Sanilac, Charlevoix and Calhoun counties, all of which went "dry" in the recent local option elections in lower Michigan, propose to contest the apparent results, on the ground of certain irregularities in the manner of taking and counting the votes.

A plan is being discussed at Lansing for making the primary school fund bear the expense of its administration, instead of making that expense a charge against the general fund.

Some weeks ago Alderman Downey, of the First ward, introduced a resolution in the council requesting the health committee to investigate into the conditions surrounding the conduct of the dairy business in Marquette and to make a report.

Despite the fact that the enemies of the bill are putting up a strong fight on it, it is generally believed that the valorem taxation of telephone and telegraph companies will be made an accom-

plished fact by the present legislature. The factor weighing heaviest on the side of the bill is the fact that it has been made, by the declarations of party candidates and the party platform, a party measure, which cannot be denied at this hour without reflecting on the Republican organization and laying it open to just criticism.

DEFUNCT MINING COMPANY.

An Ishpeming stockholder of the Turbagnin Gold Mining company, which owns property in Colorado, has been advised by the Union Trust company of Chicago that the corporation is not able to pay interests on its bonds, issued some time ago. The stock was sold here about three years ago and the company later issued bonds for a large sum. Some of the Ishpeming shareholders purchased bonds in the hope that by doing so they would help the enterprise and eventually save the amount they had invested in the stock. Interests on the bonds is now payable and coupons sent to the Union Trust company have been returned with the statement that the Turbagnin people are unable to redeem them.

"Many of the former Ishpeming and Negaunee people located at Coleraine and other places on the Western Mesaba range are doing well," said a former resident visiting in Ishpeming this week. "Most of them have better positions than they had on this range and their wages are higher. Several of the men who were unable to save money while living here now have good bank accounts. It costs them less to live in that district than it did on the Marquette range and they have fewer opportunities to spend their money. More than 50 per cent of the nearly \$300,000 now on deposit in the Coleraine bank is the savings of the workmen of the district. The deposit accounts are increasing steadily and practically all of the better class of men who came from the Marquette range have money in the bank.

"Superintendent Greenway did not make a mistake in the selection of his principal assistants from this range. I have been over all parts of the Mesaba district and I don't know of a mine or group of mines that is being handled to better advantage. The superintendent and his men have been at a disadvantage since operations were started there, but in spite of this fact the work has moved along splendidly. A large number of the men Mr. Greenway took from here are holding responsible positions. The district is being built up rapidly, and within a few years the mines will be large producers.

Tonnage Tax an Injury.

"At the present time the people of the Mesaba range are disturbed over the tonnage tax bill, which, if it passes the senate, will surely result in much injury to the working men, as well as to the mining companies. The corporations, and particularly the Oliver company, have spent millions of dollars in improvements in Itasca county, and as yet they have not shipped any ore to speak of. Most of the residents of the towns are working men, who have built their homes and are paying for them on the instalment plan. If the tonnage bill becomes a law it will prove a big injury to these men.

"The ore in our end of the range is of a low grade. We have to wash it after it is taken from the ground and we are obliged to wash four tons before we get one ton of marketable ore. "Itasca county is now paying to the state more than its fair share of taxes. Our rate last year was 30.29 mills on the dollar, and we turned into the state treasury \$67,203.79. Of that amount \$15,816 was returned to the county. Some of the other counties in Minnesota received a larger sum back from the state than they paid in in state taxes. The counties in the iron district pay a higher percentage of state taxes than those in other parts of the state.

"In my opinion the iron ranges are being discriminated against. The people of the range are fully justified in protesting against the tonnage tax bill, as it would doubtless be the means of putting some of the mining companies out of business. We have in Itasca county five or six small independent companies that would surely perish. The law would hit the Cuyuna range even harder than the Mesaba, as many of the operators there will have to expend large sums before they can become shippers."

ICE BREAKING UP RAPIDLY IN LAKES

WEATHER CONDITIONS ARE FAVORABLE FOR AN EARLY OPENING OF NAVIGATION.

FOUR LINES SIGN ENGINEERS

Package Freight Vessel Owners Waive Open Shop Contracts—Insurance Rates This Season.

According to reports from the stations of the government weather bureau, the ice is rapidly disappearing on the western portion of Lake Superior and the rain that fell yesterday will go far toward breaking up the ice.

At Duluth the lake is clear except some broken ice along the Wisconsin shore and the Duluth and Superior ends are open.

Weather conditions are favorable for an early opening of navigation, but with the exception of the Pittsburgh Steamship company none of the vessel owners are making any special effort to put their ships in commission.

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Four of the freight package lines have come to an agreement with their engineers, the Anchor Line, the Lehigh Valley Transportation company, the Western Transit company and the Rutland Transit company.

Insurance rates on the Great Lakes for 1909 will be the same as 1908, that is to say, 5 per cent on hulls and 1/2 per cent on protection and indemnity.

FORTY YEARS TO GROW MERCHANTABLE PINE

EXPERIMENTS NEAR DETROIT SHOW THAT REFORESTATION TAKES PLACE MORE RAPIDLY THAN GENERALLY SUPPOSED.

While white pine has largely disappeared from Michigan, there still remains great areas of hardwood and hemlock, along with big tracts of cedar but these, in turn are being attacked with such vigor that two or three decades hence promise to find the state well nigh denuded of its forest growth.

Contemplation of this tremendous wealth serves to bring a true appreciation of the enormous increment that would result were a complete reforestation of the cut and burned lands possible; yet when the matter is brought to the attention of the public it fails to arouse particular enthusiasm.

On the grounds of the Lothrop estate, near Detroit, a forest of seedlings, set out twenty-five years ago, now has thousands of young white pine, Norway and hemlock trees that display a diameter of from eight to ten inches at a height of about twelve feet from the usual trade stump, and this timber today is worth more in the market than the best cork pine has brought up to recent years.

Together in artificial reforestation, but maintains that fire protection and trimming and underbrushing will soon produce reforestation, though artificial means might be brought to the aid of the work after the natural growth has formed a shade protection for the seedlings.
