Declaring Patience Has Ceased to Be a Virtue, and That the Only Way to Gain the Right to the Ballot Is to Make a Strenuous Fight for It, Convention at Des Moines Decides to Resort to the Methods Made Famous in England.

Des Moines, Ia., Oct. 28.-Stirred by the flery speeches of the more aggressive members, the Iowa Suffrage association today adopted a resolution favoring the militant methods adopted by

methods. "The day for passive methods is past," declared Rev. Pleanor Gordon, of Des Moines, president of the association, "I am for adopting more radical methods." "And I," added Mrs. Julia Clark Hallam, of Sioux City, "would go to jail for the suffrage cause. But if I were arrested, I would resist the officer to the last."

The resolution follows: "Resolved, That the women of the Iowa Equal Suffrage association, wishing to strengthen the cause, do endorse obstructive methods in the effort to secure legislation, and do further resolve that arrangements be perfected to earry out such methods." 

From Saunders it will branch is heavily timbered, but the expense constructing a line through there would not be very great.

The principal part of the company's business on this end of the division is the ore traffic, which is handled to ex-cellent advantage because of down-grade from here to Escanaba. The company is using unusually large locomotives in order to reduce the number of trains between the two plants, and they are now pulling between sixty and seventy tifty-ton cars from the mines to the port. This represents a tonnage almost three times as great as that handled in each trainload on the South Shore system between here and Marquette.

During the past few years the Northwestern has greatly improved its service in the territory between Escanaba and Milwaukee. The evening passenger train running between this section and Chicago leaves Escanaba in two sec tions, one of them going over the old line, and the other via Manitowoc, taking in a number of towns that could not be reached without running several branch trains from the main system. The train making the direct run gets into Chicago twenty-five minutes ahead of
