Peking, China, Oct. 30 .- The demand of the national assembly for a complete constitutional government has been aceded to by the throne. An imperial edict was issued today, apologizing for the past neglect of the throne and granting an immediate constitution with cabinet from which the lords are to be excluded. A second edict grants par-on to political offenders connected with the revolution of 1898 and subsequent revolutions and to those compelled to join in the present rebellion.

Trust Men Declare in Court That the Proposed Mode of Reorganization Will Restore Competition-Independents, Dealers and Producers Say It Will Not.

New York, Oct. 30 .- The proposed plan of reorganization of the tobacco trust submitted by the American Tobacco com-pany and co-defendants to the governnent's anti-trust suit was both praised and condemned today before the circuit court judges of the United States for the outhern district of New York.

Conflicting Opinions Expressed. After Attorney General Wickersham ad filed the government's answer to the lan, counsel for the defendants pleaded with the court to accept the dissolution proposal. 

A permanent committee of national representatives meets monthly to rule on whatever contingencies may arise under the terms of the protocol. Pressure has been brought to bear upon the committee from many sources to remove the ban on Russian sugar, although more than two years are yet to run under the treaty. The conference in Brussels is expected to decide whether or not it is expedient to ease the market with Russia's great resources. Their ruling will largely determine the appetite of mil-

ions of sugar-eating people. In this country the sugar market is practically stagnant. It is a period between sugar seasons. The domestic beet crop is coming on the market, and the Western trade is quietly absorbing the output of the local beet sugar refineries. The refineries of the East are nearly bare of supplies and will continue so until the cane of Cuba and Louisiana has been harvested. The prices quoted are merely nominal quotations; there is very little ugar on hand for delivery.

A large refiner said that if it were not for the best interests of their customers who bought extensively at the high range of September to maintain prices n a fairly steady fashion reductions would come rapidly. The European beet output is forecasted at 6,034,000 tons, against more than 8,000,000 last year. Cuba should produce 800,000 to 1,600,000 tons, against 1,900,000 tons looked for previous to the recent drought. Our own beet crop is reckoned at 559,000 tons.

Personally Directed. This La Follette campaign is unde the direct management of the senator himself. No important move is made without consulting him. He drops around to headquarters nearly every day about 5 o'clock in the afternoon to approve or disapprove the day's work and to offer suggestions. Thousands of letters go out every day, and other thousands are received. The first business of he organization was to obtain the names of as many anti-Taft Republicans as possible in each state. With these names at hand an effort is now being made to establish a La Follette organization in the fact that they are trying to convince Republicans everywhere that President laft cannot be re-elected if nominated. This line of campaign of course carries direct inference that if the president shall be renominated the so-called La Follette Republicans do not intend to

The executive man in the La Follette organization is Walter L. Houser, who was formerly secretary of state of Wisconsin. On each corner of his desk any day may be seen a stack of letters a foot high. "These letters all came in today,' he says, and, undoubtedly, he tells the truth, "This pile, he continues, as he lays his hand on a stack of letters on the left-hand corner of his desk, "if printed would fill about two pages of a newspaper. They are all short and to the point. Their publication would create a political sensation. No, we do not want them printed. We are not seeking publicity. We have striven ever since we opened these headquarters to keep out of the newspapers."

Aiming for Direct Primaries.

It is the plan of the La Follette or anization to obtain direct primaries for the election of delegates to the national convention wherever possible. State laws now provide for such primaries in five states, and according to Mr. Houser, a good many other states are likely to hoose delegates in this way. As has already been announced, the La Follette people intend to offer a resolution at the eeting of the Republican national committee here in December instructing Republican state committees to provide for the election of delegates by direct vote. That the committee will reject this resolution is pretty well understood, but this rejection, the La Follette people say, will not prevent state committees in several of the Western states and in some of the Southern states from providing for direct primaries for the election of delegates. "We realize that in a large numper of states we will have the old Repub. lican machine to combat," said one of the La Follette managers. "We think we know something about the business of organizing, and we expect to meet these established machines on their own ground. We plan to have a La Follette organization in every state within the next two months."

Taft Will Be Urged to Fight.

Up to this time it has not been the usiness of anyone to devote special attention to the Taft campaign for renomination. No organized campaign to obtain delegates pledged to his renomination has been started. The president and his friends have simply been trusting the various Republican state organi. zations and the rank and file of the party. This La Follette business has sprung up since the president left Washngton upon the adjournment of the special session of congress. The general ex-pectation is that when Mr. Taft gets ack here he will consent to the forma-



WHY ORE LEASE IS CANCELLED. Forthcoming Reduction in Freight Rates

Made Step Inevitable.

New York, Oct. 30. Among the reaons advanced for the cancellation of be Hill ore lease by the Steel people, he one entitled to most credence, per-caps, is that a probable reduction in order reight rates makes the step a wise one The royalties already provided by the lease were most certainly high enough. With freight rates from the Mesaba district to lake ports lowered from eighty to sixty cents per ton, it would mean a still higher royalty by twenty cents per on to the corporation on Hill ore. Un er the compact, the Steel company pays \$1.65 per ton in 1907 for ore running er cent iron, eighty-five cents of which the trustees keep as royalty on ore re-moved. The balance of eighty cents goes to the Great Northern railway, which hauls the ore from the mines to lake ports eighty miles distant. Annual. y, the 1907 royalty of eighty-five cents he freight charge remains stationary.

acreases by 4 per cent or 3.4 cents, but The important fact is that the Steel orporation does not pay the freight harge direct to the railroad. It pays blanket sum covering both royalty and transportation to the trustees, who n turn pay freight charges. It makes no difference to the corporation, so far as cost of Hill ore is concerned, what the freight rate is. If it costs less than eighty cents to pay the freight, the difference can only be regarded as royalty The commerce commission will probably reduce all ore rates from eighty to sixty cents per ton from the Minnesota iron fields to lake ports before long. The Great Northern railway cannot accept eighty cents from the ore trustees while than it can force other shippers to pay it. The result is at once obvious—the inde pendents get their ore twenty cents cheaper while the Steel corporation reeives absolutely no benefit from the development.

Thus it works out that instead of pay ing a royalty in 1912 for Hill ore of \$1.02, fifty-nine per cent grade, as called for by the lease, the Steel company would really be paying \$1.22. Now assuming that the Hill lands contain 500,000,000 tons and that they are exhausted in thirty years, the average royalty per ton will be \$1.36. With twenty cents added the average will be \$1.56. It means that the Steel corporation instead of paying a total of \$680,000,000 for the entire 500,000,000 tons, as it would under lease is all taken out in thirty years it would pay \$780,000,000 or \$100,000,000 more.
