Gentlemen: -- Last year an informal agreement was made between your body and this department covering the services of Mr. Frank Kreig on land trespass work in the county during the season when he was not employed as a fire warden. We feel that his work was quite valuable in detecting trespass on state owned and tax delinquent land and in securing the payment of delinquent taxes.

We are recommending that a similar agreement be made covering the period from November 15th until about May 1st or such time as the services of Mr. Kreig are again needed on fire suppression. This department will pay one-half of the salary of \$100 per month and all necessary expenses if the county will pay the other half of his salary.

We should be glad to have your Board take action on this proposal and advise this office as soon as convenient.

Your Budget and Executive Committee to whom was referred the letter from the Typographical Union No. 359, Sault Ste.Marie, Michigan, report as follows:

The Upper Peninsula Development Bureau had already contracted with a printing firm in Ann Arbor to have the "Hiawatha Lure" printed before the communication from the Secretary of the Typographical Union had had a chance to be considered by your Budget and Executive Committee. We understand that two Marquette County firms presented a bid to the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau, but that the successful bidder, whose print shop is located in Ann Arbor, was given the contract because of a slightly lower price.

We also find on investigation that the Marquette County Board of Supervisors at their Annual Meeting, provided a definite contribution in the Annual Budget to the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau before your Committee had a chance to study the protest voiced by the Typographical Union. It is also a fact that the appropriation provided for in the Annual Budget was not made conditional that the printing of the "Hiawatha Lure" should be done in the Upper Peninsula.

We, therefore, recommend that the County Clerk be instructed to inform the Secretary of the Typographical Union at Sault Ste. Marie, that the Marquette County Board of Supervisors find upon investigation that nothing can be done this year that would make it possible to have the Upper Peninsula Development Bureau's Lure Book printed North of the Straits.

Dear Sir: -- In reply to your letter of October 26 we wish to answer your questions in order, as follows:

(1) We are of the opinion that the Superintendents of Poor of Marquette County can hire and set the salaries of its employes without regard to the recommendation of the Board of Supervisors.

follows:

Section 8233 of the Compiled Laws of 1929 provides in part as

"They (superintendents of poor) shall have the general superintendence of all the poor who may be in their respective counties, and shall have power, and it shall be their duty: * * * "

"Seventh, To draw, from time to time, on the county treasurer for all necessary expenses incurred in the discharge of their duties, which draft shall be paid by him out of the moneys placed in his hands for the support of the poor."

The above statute clearly gives the superintendents of the poor the power to employ servants and to set their salaries. The fact that the supervisors are given power by statute to appoint the superintendents of the poor to their office, does not give them the power to control their acts.

(2) We are of the opinion that the County Road Commissioners of Marquette County can employ and set the salary of the superintendent without regard to the recommendation of the board of supervisors.

Section 4003 of the Compiled Laws of 1929 gives the supervisors of Marquette County the authority to appoint the board of county road commissioners but it does not, in any way, limit the general powers of county road commissioners.

We wish to call your attention to Section 3984 of the Compiled Laws of 1929 which reads in part as follows:

"The board of county road commissioners shall constitute and be a body corporate * * *. They shall appoint a competent superintendent, skilled in road building, who may or may not be an engineer who shall under the direction of the board, supervise all road building operations in the county. * * * "

The board of county road commissioners have the power, by statute, to employ the superintendent. The fact that in Marquette County the supervisors have authority to appoint the county road commissioners, does not give the supervisors authority to control the acts of the road commission while in office.

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan.

Sirs: Relative to disposition of money received on account of motor vehicle license taxes and gasoline taxes returnable to this county for the calendar year 1937, and in conformity to Public Acts of Michigan numbers 7 and 8 of the Extra Session of 1934, your Board of County Road Commissioners recommend:

Pursuant to such acts, one half of each settlement on account of the above mentioned monies, is to be credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, betterments, and construction of County Roads.

Further, pursuant to such acts, that the remainder, hereinafter called the second half of such monies, as returned to Marquette County, shall be applied as follows and in the following order of priority:

First priority of second half -- The sum of \$36,855.69 shall be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund to pay principal, interest and disbursing fees on the

General County Highway Bonds for payments due thereon, to and inclusive of the interest payments payable in April 1938, which interest payment comes due prior to anticipated receipts on monies from these sources for the year 1938.

Second priority of second half -- The difference between the second half of such above mentioned monies and the amount of money to be credited to the Highway Bond Retirement Fund is then to be divided and applied as follows:

(a) One half of the difference mentioned in second priority of second half, immediately above, is to be credited to the County Road Fund and used for maintenance of County Roads adopted in conformity to Act 130 P.A. Michigan 1931.

(b) The remaining half of second priority of second half, as mentioned immediately above, shall be divided as follows:

100.000%

The money credited to the County Road Fund to be used for administration, maintenance, improvements, and construction of County Road in conformity to the statutes.

The money to be paid to the cities to be used as provided in said Acts 7 and 8 of Extra Session of 1934.

Gentlemen: -- In the matter of several petitions which were referred to the Board of County Road Commissioners and your Committee on County Roads and Bridges.

The Board of County Road Commissioners and the Committee on County Roads and Bridges met in the office of the Commission at Ishpeming December 8th, 1936 and considered these various petitions.

In the matter of petition of Matt Lappi and Jacob Koski, relative to work on Road AL in Champion Township.

It appears that there might be a posibility of working this in, under the W.P.A. setup and your Committee recommends that this matter be left in the hands of the Road Commission and if and when it appears feasible, that the matter be taken up by said Road Commission. In the matter of petition of Matt Mackey relative to plowing eleven roads in Humboldt Township. This petition was considered by roads.

It appears that the Road Commission has already included four of these roads in the plowing schedule for the current winter, these being roads where plowing is possible, that their plans with the W.P.A. contemplate improvements on two more of these roads, and that the Road Commission has included in their winter schedule all that it is possible to grant of this petition.

In the matter of petition from John Laitinen and fifty-five other residents of Ewing Township, and an additional petition from W. J. Stephens and sixty-two other residents of Wells Township for extension of Road DA across the Escanaba River and to an intersection with Road 557.

This matter was reviewed and your Committee and the Board report that it is not possible to undertake this work at the present time for financial reasons and that to handle the construction of the bridge as a W.P.A. project does not appear to be feasible because of the fact that the cost of materials for the bridge would run higher than is allowable under a W.P.A. setup.

In the matter of petition from Sanna Ranta and twenty-four other residents of Richmond Township requesting reconstruction of nine roads in Richmond Township.

It appears that these roads are all of such character that plowing is now possible and that plowing is being done on all except a few portions near the end of some of these roads, and that the Road Commission contemplates improvements on these portions if it is possible to work them into the W.P.A. project and that this possibility is limited by the advisability of keeping the labor supply in the vicinity available for the proposed water supply project in the Village of Palmer. It appears that in the main these roads are adequate for the requirements.

In the matter of petition of Theo. Warmanen and fifty-six other residents of Ewing Township relative to graveling Road DB, and a portion of Road DE.

It appears that this work is contemplated in the W.P.A. setup, that to date trucks have not been furnished by the W.P.A. in sufficient numbers to finish Road DA, but it is hoped that the work requested will be reached by the W.P.A. Nothing further is possible by the Road Commission at the present time.

In the matter of petition from Thomas Trewartha and nineteen others relative to widening Road PF.

It appears that this road is now in such shape that it can be plowed and that it is plowed and that the request is not necessary for winter service but it is desirable for safe two way travel.

Your Committee recommends that this be left in the hands of the Road Commission to include in the W.P.A. setup, when possible.

We recommend concurrence in the above action in each of the

Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance made an inspection of County Property on October 20th. The Committee was accompanied by the Chairman of the Board, Dr. Paul Van Riper.

The Champion Beach Property was first inspected and found all equipment and property in first class condition. The Committee was very much impressed

with the way that the equipment is being stored. The caretaker is to be complimented on the condition of the building and grounds.

The County Road Buildings and grounds were then inspected and also the new garage which was built under the supervision of the County Road Commission using W.P.A. labor. The Superintendent should be commended for the fine constructions of this first class building.

The Marquette County Airport was next visited. Men were working on the caretaker's residence and the garage was completed. The hangar was in practically the same condition as when the Road inspection was made. Up to the time of the inspection by the Committee no steel had been received for the roof.

At Morgan Heights Sanatorium we did not make an inspection of the Hospital Buildings but did inspect the boiler plant. We found that the interior had to be repainted and this has been done. The Chairman later made an inspection and found same in first class shape.

On the 21st of October we inspected the Fair Grounds and buildings and found same in first class condition with the exception of the dining room. Therefore the Committee does hereby recommend that the ceiling and walls be covered with some suitable building material, thus making this building more inviting to the public.

The Court House group was inspected, including the new roof that has been put on the County Jail and the Sheriff's residence. The Committee made a suggestion with reference to fastening the cornice, which has been done.

The County Infirmary was inspected and found everything about the grounds and buildings the same as usual, in first class condition.

The Skandia Garage which was under construction at that time was inspected, and found that this building as well as the caretaker's residence are first class in every respect and a credit to the county.

The Committee was very much impressed with the work accomplished under the supervision of all Department heads in charge. We consider the County fortunate in having men in charge who are vitally interested in their work.

Gentlemen:

Your County Planning Committee met on January 8th, 1937.

The following steps have been taken relative to proceeding in the matter of a zoning ordinance and zoning map in compliance with the authority granted by the electorate in the referendum held on September 15th, 1936.

Considerable confusion seems to exist in the County as to what the purpose of this County zoning is to be. In stating the question on the ballot in the election, it was necessary to ballot on making an entire State statute effective in this County, and the question was stated using the title of the statute. The statute permits the zoning regulations on the height, area, size and location of buildings in metropolitan areas.

The confusion mentioned above arises from the fact that this is a statute permitting zoning in all the varying conditions existing in the State outside of city limits. It is the opinion of your committee that the only thing to be desired in Marquette County at the present time is zoning for land use, and that the other permitted types of zoning are not at the present time applicable to this County.

It is the intent of your committee to prepare an ordinance and zoning map which will be subjected to hearings in each of the townships and cities of the county and with all of the information then accumulated a final draft will be prepared to be submitted to your Board. This ordinance and map will be predicated on zoning the county into three land use types, namely; forestry, recreational and unrestricted.

We recommend concurrence of your Board in the procedure outlined.

To produce the above mentioned result your committee has resolved itself into one sub committee which will work with the Prosecuting Attorney for the preparation of a tentative ordinance, and into three sub committees which will work with the County Agricultural Agent, the County School Commissioner and the County Road Commission in the preparation of a tentative zoning map. As soon as these sub committees formulate the ordinance and compile the map your committee will proceed with hearings.

We recommend concurrence in our suggested procedure in this matter.

We have also appointed, K. I. Sawyer as Secretary of the Committee. Mr. Sawyer will act without compensation for this service.

WHEREAS M-95 from Republic to Iron Mountain has, with the exception of a small gap, been reconstructed into a fine modern road with wide, safe grades, good alignment and surface; and,

There still remains on this Road M-95 the comparatively short portion extending Northerly from Republic to U.S. 41, which has never been rebuilt since it was cut through the woods years ago, and this portion of the road is narrow and crooked, having sixty-four curves and turns in approximately eight miles, and there are several dangerous situations arising from very narrow one way traffic bridges and excessively dangerous railroad crossings on curves and at the base of hills, and the dangerous character of this stretch of road has contributed to many and serious accidents, and,

This M-95 is the principal route of travel between the Marquette and Menominee Iron Ranges, and points beyond, and the above mentioned portion of this road carries heavy local travel between Republic and Marquette Range points, and,

There are at the present time between two and three hundred men working on W.P.A. and resident either in Republic or Humboldt Townships traversed by this road or within easy access to this road, who could be employed to advantage in reconstructing this portion of M-95; and.

Articles in the newspapers have indicated that surveys are to be initiated by the State Highway Department for the re-routing of this road and such articles indicate that the time when this road will be reconstructed is uncertain and possibly distant in the future;

County THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of Supervisors of Marquette

That, we commend the Honorable Murray D. Van Wagoner, State Highway Commissioner, for initiating steps for the surveying of this highway and that,

We petition the Honorable Murray D. Van Wagoner, that he take into account the vital need to the Marquette Range of the reconstruction of this road and the availability of relief workers, and that he place this road under construction at the earliest possible date.

- 1. Two year closed season on partridges and then have season open and close on the same day throughout the entire State of Michigan.
- 2. That spearing of fish in inland lakes be prohibited throughout the year.
- 3. That no game fish be taken in any inland lake during the month of May of each year.
 - 4. That the bounty on coyotes be raised to \$20.00 per head.
- 5. That a bounty of 50 cents be placed on woodchucks, hawks, owls, and weasels and a bounty of 25 cents on crows.
 - 6. That legislation covering the above be given immediate effect.

We also wish to go on record as against the following provisions:

- 1. License fee and licensing of professional hunting and fishing guides.
- 2. License fee for any person seining minnows to be used for bait.

We further recommend that copies of this resolution be sent to P. G. Hoff-master, Director of Conservation at Lansing, Michigan and to the Board of Supervisors of Keweenaw County and Mackinaw County.

At a meeting of the Budget and Executive Committee held in the Court House at Marquette, on Friday afternoon, January 29th, certain matters referred to this Committee by the Board of Supervisors, were considered.

We are pleased to report that we did not have to take any definite action on the subject matter in the letter from Mrs. E. Sandell, former County Register of Deeds. If the Board will recall, Mrs. Sandell, through her attorney, Mr. Clarence E. Lott, made a request that the abstract fees for the years 1933-34, which she had deposited with the County Treasurer, be returned to her personally. Mr. Perkins, Chairman of the Committee, reported that Mrs. Sandell had asked him to interview her, and she stated that after reconsidering the matter in her own mind, she had decided not to make the specific request for the abstract fees for those years. In view of the new developments in this particular instance, we recommend that the Board of Supervisors let the matter drop, and that Mrs. Sandell's communication be filed.

The Committee also reviewed the communication presented to the Board by J. E. Hayden, former County Treasurer, in which he asks for a reimbursement in whole or in part of the proportion of the salary paid to the Deputy Treasurer out of his own pocket, but after viewing this matter from all angles, we recommend to the Board of Supervisors that this request be denied.

With reference to the County Treasurer's bond and the matter of designating definite depositories for County funds, because the Committee was unable to contact the

Prosecuting Attorney, it was decided that the Committee would make no definite recommendation to the Board of Supervisors. It was further agreed, however, that if before the next meeting of the Board of Supervisors, an emergency arose by the cancellation of the Treasurer's bond, which is now in force, that the Committee meet and decide definitely with the Prosecutor, as to the proper procedure.

We understand, however, that the bond has not been cancelled, and for that reason have taken no definite action, and furthermore, we did not make any specific recommendation to the Board of Supervisors.

Presumably, the question will arise again at the next meeting, and the Prosecuting Attorney will have additional information to submit to the Board.

AND WHEREAS, the continued decrease in the number of deer in this peninsula will be a serious economic loss; would do much to affect all wild life, and directly and indirectly will affect the tourist traffic to the peninsula, and destroy, in part, the lure to this section as a recreation and summer sports area.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors of Delta County in meeting assembled, January 4, 1937, go on record as favoring the enactment of legislation amending the game laws of this State so as to provide for an alternate closed and open season for killing of deer, such seasons to conform to the deer seasons in the State of Wisconsin, and when open, that each licensee be permitted to kill one deer regardless of sex.

MARQUETTE COUNTY BUDGET AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Ishpeming, Mich., May 5, 1937.

Honorable Chairman and Marquette County Board of Supervisors, Marquette, Michigan.

Gentlemen:

Your Budget and Executive Committee upon considering the matter of increasing the amount allowed for feeding prisoners in the County Jail, taking into account the increase in the cost of food, recommend, that the rate of 50 cents per day be increased to 65 cents per day effective upon adoption by the Board of Supervisors as of June 1st, 1937.

With reference to the communication of Wilfred Murray,
Spanish-American war veteran, regarding the restoration of the tax exemption to SpanishAmerican war veterans to comply with Section 7, Act 206, of the Public Acts of 1893, and
Section 3395 of the compiled laws of 1929, after conferring with the Prosecuting Attorney,
we recommend the County Clerk be instructed to notify Mr. Murray to take the matter of
exemption up with the local assessor of Board of Review in the assessing district where
his property is located.

Your Budget and Executive Committee also recommend that in view of the fact that the Board of Supervisors failed to recommend an annual salary for the County Drain Commissioner at the last Annual Meeting of this Board held in October 1936, that the Auditing Committee be empowered to pay a reasonable amount per diem and for expenses, whenever the County Drain Commissioner turns in a report for which he can legally qualify for payment of services.

The Committee also recommends that the request of the Register of Deeds for extra clerk hire be denied. An investigation of the work performed by this office indicates that there is less need for extra clerk hire than there was last year. For the first four months of 1936, the fees received for recording deeds, mortgages, etc., averaged \$512.36 per month. For the first three months of 1937 the fees turned in to the County Treasurer's office by the Register of Deeds, averaged only \$219.79 per month, which would indicate that the amount of work required for recording deeds, mortgages, etc., is only 40% of the previous year. In view of the fact that the Annual Budget adopted by the Board of Supervisors provides for a salary and larger compensation for extra clerk hire than was put in for the year 1936, and in view of the fact that the work in the Register of Deeds office is considerably less than the previous year, we recommend that the Board of Supervisors do not make any additional appropriation for extra clerk hire, and

that the amount established in the Annual Budget of October 1936 is amply to carry on all of the work in this office.

Mr. Chairman: --

Upon the death of Mr. Thomas M. Redmond which occurred on March 24th, 1937, Marquette County lost one of its valued and highly respected citizens.

Tom, as he was universally known, was born at Hancock, Michigan, on April 2, 1895 and moved to Marquette at the age of twelve and had since made his home here. Graduating from the Marquette High School in 1913, he later became established in the insurance business and was so engaged up to the time of his death. Mr. Redmond was considered an authority on insurance matters and often acted in an advisory capacity in the writing of various lines of insurance.

On June 25th, 1918, Mr. Redmond enlisted at Camp Custer and served his country overseas until April 2, 1912, when he returned and was honorably discharged on April 19, 1919, when he resumed his activities in the insurance business.

On June 25th, 1935, Mr. Redmond married Miss Elsie Simister who survives him, as does a sister, Mrs. W. D. McIntosh, of Los Angeles, California.

As a public spirited citizen Mr. Redmond was outstanding, his qualifications being such as spelled real service in whatever his undertakings happened to be. As chairman of the Marquette County Chapter of the American Red Cross and as one of the trustees of the Marquette County War Chest Fund his services were invaluable, and were always given with one idea in mind, that of service to his fellow men.

His untimely death has left a vacancy in the life of this community that will be hard to fill.

Therefore be it resolved that we, the members of the Marquette County Board of Supervisors, hereby express our profound regret at the passing of Mr. Redmond, and that a copy of this resolution be spread upon the minutes of this meeting and a copy sent to members of the deceased's family.

For the cities, debate was had in the matter by Attorney Potter, Mayor Jacques, Mayor Agnoli and Mayor Pro Tem. Kenney.

For the County Road Commission, debate was entered by

Messrs. Spear and Sawyer.

Captain Nicholas spoke on the duties of the joint body

in the matter.

After hearing all matters adjournment was taken until June 22nd. Your Committee and the Road Commission again met and pursuant to action on that day;

Honorable Board of Supervisors, Marquette County, Michigan. Gentlemen:

Your Committee on Legislation and County Parks met with the Board of County Park Trustees on June 18th, 1937.

Together we visited Champion Beach Park where we found the park fully prepared for the summer season and in good condition. Electric service for trailers has been installed and all buildings and appurtenances are in good repair.

We visited the Dexter emergency landing field where we found the field outlines cut with harrow work, and from there visited the County Airport and then the Big Bay Park.

At the County Airport we found that runways have been stabilized, all buildings in the W.P.A. program, except the hangar, built and in use and work on the hangar moving along well.

The Board of Park Trustees discussed the matter of fees and regulations at the airport and there is hereto attached a schedule of fees and regulations which are now in effect. Relative to these regulations, it is pertinent to point out, that the matter of liability on the County arising from such things as taking a fee or percentage of revenue from carrying passengers, etc., has been gone into and liability does exist if the County becomes a party to such use by taking money therefor. The matter of insurance against this liability is being gone into and will be analyzed against probable revenues. Until insurance against this liability is secured the Board of County Park Trustees will not take any revenue from such sources as carrying passengers, air circuses, etc., and the revenue derived will be solely from storage in the hangar and sale of gasoline and oils.

At the Big Bay Park we found the grounds very considerably improved, the caretaker's house reconstructed and in good order, and plans underway for construction of two comfort stations.

We also considered the matter of certain pending legislation and authorized the Chairman to wire Senaotr Wixtrom of our approval of House Bill 119 which would allocate a portion of the sales tax money for County Road purposes.

AIRPORT CHARGES AND REGULATIONS, SEASON OF 1937

--Charges--

Applying to aircraft owned in Marquette County and using County Airport as a home port and for persons putting their own planes in and out of hangar.

Locally owned planes for which storage is paid in the hangar and for which fuel and oils are bought from the station on the airport may be operated off the airport for any purpose permitted by their license without other airport charge.

Locally owned planes may be staked down off runways, provided fuel and oil is purchased from the airport station.

No plane may be kept regularly at the airport which does not comply with the above.

Applying to aircraft using County Airport but not as home port.

wing spread--

No operator shall operate any plane or other aircraft which is not owned in Marquette County and using the County Airport as a home port; for hire, to carry passengers for pay by the trip, for exhibition, or for any other purpose producing a money gain to the operator or owner of such aircraft, until arrangements therefor have been made with the airport management and permit secured, provided that this regulation shall not operate to prohibit the landing and taking off of passengers on this port where such passengers travel originated at some port outside of Marquette County.

The County of Marquette assumes no liability for fire

Storage of plane in hangar for plane of not over 50 ft.

or theft occurring to or on any plane, aircraft, conveyance, or part thereof, or contents thereof, using this airport and appurtenances. The moderate charges for services tendered are based on the aircraft or conveyance, owner assuming all risks of fire, theft and liability.

All planes landing or using this field must register.

All laws, rules and regulations of the United States Department of Commerce Aeronautics Branch, and of the Department of Aeronautics, State of Michigan Michigan, apply to the use of this airport.

The agricultural committee met Monday, July 19, in the county agricultural agent's office in the Court House. The meeting was called to discuss various activities of the county agricultural agent.

The grasshopper situation was discussed and it was learned that there were sections of the county where the grasshoppers were numerous enough to cause damage. Poison bait has already been made at Lawson in Skandia Township and will be made in Ewing Township on Thursday of this week.

The grasshopper situation can be taken care of without a special appropriation as the county has on hand \$688.38 worth of bran, or approximately 30 tons. There is stored at Ishpeming and other places 26 barrels of calcium arsenite besides several barrels of molasses, so we have more bait material than will be used this year. If any supervisors have complaints of grasshopper damage, they may turn them over to Mr. Walker and he will take care of the situation.

This last year the county agricultural agent has had over four hundred 4-H Club enrollments scattered over almost every township in the county. Club achievement days are held every fall and spring in various sections of the county. Cash prizes are given to outstanding club exhibits and to outstanding individual exhibits. Prizes of expenses paid at Camp Shaw during 4-H Club encampment are also made to thirty boys and girls over fifteen years of age who are given the title of county honor members in the various projects, such as clothing, handicraft, canning, potato, garden, forestry, health and for various contests.

The State Department of Agriculture handles the Race Horse money and about \$35,000 of this Race Horse fund is appropriated to 4-H Club work in the State. Marquette County 4-H club work received \$490. of this fund this last year. This money can be used for prizes, camp expenses, and various other purposes, but not for transportation to Camp Shaw. A school bus can be hired at Republic to take the 4-H Club members of the county to Chatham on Monday, August 2, and return on Saturday, August 7, for \$30. This has been done for several years and the committee recommends that the county agricultural agent be authorized to hire the bus again this year and the sum of \$30 be allowed for the hire of the same.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON BUILDINGS, GROUNDS AND INSURANCE.

To the Honorable Board of Supervisors

of Marquette County, Michigan. Gentlemen: -- Your Committee on Buildings, Grounds and Insurance beg to submit the following report on their tour of inspection of buildings and grounds, made in the following places: Champion Beach, County Road Commission property, Air-port, Morgan Heights Sanitarium, Fair Grounds, and County Infirmary. At Champion Beach, we found conditions in wonderful shape, grounds all cleaned and buildings kept up to the highest standard; crowds at the Bath House this year have been exceedingly large. At the County Road Build ings and Grounds, we also found everything in good shape. At the Air-port, everything is about complete and pretty well enclosed. At Morgan Heights Sanitarium, buildings are in good shape; grounds clean, and very pleasant to look at. At the Fair Grounds, we found grounds and buildings all cleaned up, which is saying a good deal as the County Fair had just closed only a few days before. This Committee would recommend that before the opening of the county fair next year, that some competent person be engaged to make a thorough inspection of the grand stand to see that it is absolutely safe to withstand the large weight that it has to carry. At the Court House, we find that at some date in the near future there will have to be some minor repairs in the Court room. At the Jail, a much needed coat of paint is about complete. At the Infirmary, we found buildings and grounds kept up to the highest standard.

In regard to insurance, it is our recommendation that all insurance written on a Co-Insurance basis be brought up to a proper amount to agree with the current values as shown on the last Lloyd-Thomas appraisal. Insurance on items not covered under a Co-Insurance clause to remain as is except in some unusual case or cases where a per-

ceptible increase warrants an increase.

In conclusion, we think the people in charge of the various departments mentioned in this report, should be given credit for the way in which they have taken care of the public's property.

Gentlemen: -- In accordance with the established policy of your honorable body, I submit herewith the following proposed budget for the office of Judge of Probate covering the period of the fiscal year ending August 31st, 1938.

The current business of the court and recently enacted legislation necessitates an increased allowance for clerk hire; wherefore the proposed budget allots \$800.00 to meet this situation. This fund is to be drawn upon the basis of not more than \$15.60 each week, or permitting the employment of a competent and experienced clerk not more than four days a week at sixty cents per hour.

The proposed budget also includes an item of \$300.00 for equipment. This sum will be appropriated for the purchase of additional document filing sections. At the present time we have only sufficient space to carry the court files for not more than the next four or five months. The cost price of the purchase of this equipment has not been to date ascertained. However, in comparison to the court's prior purchase of similar filing sections, the allotment of this sum should be sufficient to cover the necessary additions.

The other items included in the budget are substantially the same, with the exception of a few instances, as shown in the County Clerk's report for the preceding fiscal year.

Dear Mr. Sawyer: --Your letter of August 4 advised us that you did not intend to make an adjustment with the cities in your county for the year 1936 covering your use of funds under the so-called McNitt Priority in the Weight and Gas Tax Laws.

In view of the Attorney General's opinion, holding that the use of funds under Sub-section 4 of Section 34, Act 7, P. A. 1934, and Sub-section 4 of Section 19, Act 8, P. A. 1934, was illegal for 1936 and subsequent years, and in view of a decision handed down in Dickinson County, which held that the County was not entitled to use funds under these sub-sections, we wish to advise you that it will not be possible to approve further payments to you under Acts 7 and 8, P.A. 1934, until the payments to the cities have been adjusted.

We regret the necessity for this action, as this Department has nothing to gain by withholding your funds. However, the laws have placed the responsibility of seeing that the Weight and Gas Tax funds are legally expended on this Department, and no other procedure is open to us.

Your Morgan Heights Sanatorium Contact Committee hereby reports that during the past year, it has kept in touch with the affairs of the Sanatorium in various ways and that at a meeting of the Contact Committee held at the Sanatorium on September 28th, a thorough inspection of the institution was conducted and its affairs gone into in considerable detail.

Your Contact Committee reports to you that in its opinion the affairs of the institution are managed in an efficient and economical manner and it believes the thanks of the Board of Supervisors are due to the Board of Trustees of Morgan Heights Sanatorium. The Committee further reports that it is thoroughly satisfied with the management of the institution under the direction of Superintendent Robert F. Berry, M.D., and believes him to be a capable executive and a skilled surgeon. His ability as a surgeon is of particular benefit to the work carried on by the Sanatorium and it means that such skilled treatment is now available to the people of Marquette County who are afflicted with Tuberculosis; previously, it had been necessary to call in outside aid or send the patients to Ann Arbor.

We found the institution on the occasion of our inspection to be in excellent shape, both within the buildings and outside the same. Considerable improvements during the

past year have been made in the grounds.

Honorable Board of Supervisors,

Marquette County, Michigan. Gentlemen: -- In the matter of petition from O. H. Clish and others pertaining to the con-

struction of a road known as the Clish Road in Chocolay Township.

This matter was considered in joint session by the Committee on County Roads

and Bridges and the Board of County Road Commissioners held on October 21st, 1937.

This joint body recognizes that this petition is similar to petitions on which we have made previous report to your Board and pursuant thereto, we make a recommendation that this petition be referred to the Board of County Road Commissioners to be taken care of if and when funds permit it.

Gentlemen: -- Your Budget and Executive Committee to whom was referred the question of add-

ing and auditor to the County staff of employees, are recommending to the Board of Supervisors that the hiring of such an auditor be deferred for the present. The principal reason for this recommendation is due to the fact that no provision was made in the Annual Budget adopted at the October 1937 meeting of the Board, for an office of this kind.

Your Committee is not unmindful of the value of adding an auditor to the County pay roll to keep the Board properly informed on all matters of interest to the Board. We believe, however, that the advantages to be derived in hiring an auditor, would be defeated if his tenure in office would be uncertain. Only when his duties can be clearly defined, and only, if and when it can be arranged that a competent person would be hired, who would serve in that position for at least a reasonable length of time, would the County benefit from the establishment of this new department. Your Committee believes that the Board would only receive benefits comparable to the increased cost of maintaining a County Auditor's department, only when he would be given the position long enough to familiarize himself with all of the ramifications of the various county department, so that proper and intelligent reports could be made to the Board.

In some of the other counties where this particular office has been created, it has been clearly demonstrated that the County Auditor is only valuable to the Board in the same ratio that his services are continued over a considerable period of years.

Your Committee believes that this matter should be given further study because the thought behind the question has real merit in it, but for the present we do not believe the time is propitious for making a change.

SECOND -- We also recommend that any other motion or resolution or parts of resolutions in the minutes of the Board of Supervisors meetings relating to matters pertaining to the salaries of deputies, clerks and stenographers, be rescinded.

FOURTH--It is understood that the salary schedule as recommended, is to apply only to deputies, clerks and stenographers that are employed in regular county departments over which the Board of Supervisors has the legal right and authority to fix salaries.

Gentlemen: --Please accept our thanks for the grant of \$41,683.42, being the amount of money which is the balance left in the fund transferred to the County Road Commission account, for the purchase of snow removal equipment, by action of your Board at their February meeting.

We have utilized this fund to make the following purchases and the machinery is now all in our possession and is being used to good advantage under the conditions which exist:

\$41,683.42

With reference to the amount applied on tractor renewals, the County Road Commission has repaired and rehabilitated and put in working condition, Tractors 102, 103, 106, 107 and 108. In doing this work, we have purchased \$2823.86 worth of parts and spent approximately the same amount in labor.

Also in addition to the purchases which we made from your grant, and for protection of the people in the County under the conditions which exist, the County Road Commission purchased with road monies after the big blizzard, but before your grant was made, one Snogo, so that there are now three Snogos owned by the County.

In addition to the above, the County Road Commission has purchased an Angle Dozer attachment for the LaPlant Choate Plow and also summer pads for the Diesel Tractor so that this tractor outfit may be used in Angle Dozer work both on snow, ice and in summer operations. This outfit has approximately 50% more power than any tractor outfit previously owned.

The addition of the machinery which has been made possible by your grant, has placed the County Road Commission in a position so that the providing of snow plow service is now much more secure.

This proposal was referred to our Committee at the November meeting of your Honorable Board to report back at a future meeting.

Tentative drawings were submitted and the following new construction and repairs to existing conditions are recommended:

1. That the building be a two story addition of cinder block fireproof construction with stuccoed exterior.

2. Room to be 10x10x7 firred and metal lathed and plastered with cement 3. Bar joist construction throughout and ceiling to be insulated with a

built-up roof.

Each room to have one toilet and wash-basin, two cots, two stools and the tables fastened to the wall.

5. Two doors at entrace; one steel door with screen and one wood.

Steel sash to be used with a 6"xl8" light to eliminate use of bars and covered with a 16 gauge galvanized iron screen.

To facilitate this work, pantry in present house must be removed and cup-

boards built in kitchen of present residence.

Also that the present heating plant be adequately renovated in keeping

with the rest of the project. Your Committee has interviewed the Welfare Agent and the Probate Judge

and find our recommendations are in compliance with statutes relative to this project. The total estimate of this project ready for occupancy is \$2,174.40.

We recommend the adoption of this resolution and that plans and specifications be drawn up, but actual construction not to start until after organization of new Board and Committees.

Gentlemen: -- Your Salary Committee after considering the letter of the County Welfare Agent, which was referred to this Committee by the Board of Supervisors at the February meeting, beg to report as follows:

We recommend that the request for an increase in salary of the Welfare Agent's secretary be denied, because of the fact that the Board of Supervisors on November 15th 1937, adopted a resolution which embodied the following, to-wit:

"It is understood that the salary schedule as recommended, is to apply only to Deputies, Clerks and Stenographers that are employed in regular County Departments over which the Board of Supervisors has the legal right and authority to fix salaries. The salary schedule as proposed is not applicable to employees of departments over which the State and Federal governments has jurisdiction."

Because of the fact that the Board of Supervisors specifically adopted this resolution, your Salary Committee feel that the entire Board has already settled the question of salary for the Secretary of the County Welfare Agent's department, because, the Board of Supervisors has no jurisdiction over that particular department.

Furthermore, we wish to call your attention to the fact that in adopting the budget for the fiscal year September 1st, 1937 to August 31st, 1938, at the Annual Meeting held in October 1937, the appropriation of the County Welfare Agent's department was limited to \$1,100.00, which covered the salary of the stenographer, stationary, office supplies, telephone, telegrams and miscellaneous items. In the making up of this budget it was contemplated that the portion of the Agent's secretary's salary to be paid by the County, would not exceed \$55.00 per month.

We also recommend that the materials requested for conducting psychiatric tests, which were formerly conducted at the Branch Prison, be denied. We understand that the State has paid for these tests in the past, and we feel that if the Welfare Agent's department can show a saving by having the Welfare Agent himself conduct these tests, that the State should furnish the necessary materials.

The following communication from K. I. Sawyer, Superintendent of the Marquette County Road Commission, was read. It was moved by Supervisor Perring, supported by Supervisor St. Onge, that the communication be referred to the Highways and Bridges Committee and the Marquette County Road Commission.

Honorable Board of Supervisors,

Marquette County, Michigan.
Gentlemen: On July 25th, 1934 your Board approved a code of precedure pertaining to road work which had been passed by the Board of County Road Commissioners on July 17th, 1934

"If improvements are desired on any highways adopted after January 1,1931, more than can be paid for as specified in Paragraph 8, the cost of such improvement may be borne jointly by the Township in which the improvement lies and the County; arrangements therefore are to be made between the County and the Township in accordance with said Act No. 130. In every instance of such improvement the Township shall pay the percentage of the cost thereof as shall be determined by the Board of County Road Commissioners, provided that on Secondary Highways and Trails the Township shall not be required to pay less than 10 per cent nor more than 50 per cent of the cost of such improvement."

In negotiations carried on with the various Townships over the past several weeks pertaining to improvements on McNitt Roads under the McNitt Act, your County Road Commission has indicated that it was their intent to have this work split on a 50-50 basis, which is in accordance with the code as adopted, but not necessarily limited to that basis

by this code.

We have discussed this matter with several of the Supervisors and find that a 50-50 split would not result in a practical solution of this finance problem, and after thorough discussion we feel that there should be a difference in the amount of cost of improving McNitt Roads which should be borne by the different Townships and that it should include consideration of the ability of the Township to pay. Pursuant to that thought, we have taken the underlying idea of the Aldrich Act, under which the County participated building trunk line highways, as a basis and at a meeting of the Board of County Road Commissioners held yesterday, the following action was had:
"The Superintendent reported on negotiations concerning the participation of

the various Townships in the cost of making improvements on the McNitt Roads under the

McNitt Act.

The matter was discussed at length and on motion of Mr. Archibald, seconded by Mr. Elliott and unanimously carried, the following schedule for participation by the Townships was approved:

For Townships having a valuation up to \$400,000, 20 per cent of the cost of

improvement to be borne by the Township and 80 per cent by the County.

For Townships having a valuation of over \$400,000 and not exceeding \$600,000, 30 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 70 per cent by the County.

For the Townships having a valuation in excess of \$600,000 and not exceeding \$1,000,000, 40 per cent of the cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 60 per

cent by the County.

For Townships having a valuation in excess of \$1,000,000, 50 per cent of the

cost of improvement to be borne by the Township and 50 per cent by the County."

Inasmuch as this pertains to matters which will be coming before your Board from time to time, and inasmuch as these percentages are subject to review of your Board, and inasmuch as fairness between Townships requires that some uniform rule be applied, we request that your Committee on County Roads and Bridges be instructed to meet with the Board of County Road Commissioners for further consideration of the above.
